OLYMPIA, Wash, Sept. IS.—(Spe-dial)—Dr. A. S. Oliver, a member of the staff of the State Asylum for the Insane at Medical Lake, has just com-Insane at Medical Lake, has just completed his task of examining the children in the State Training School at Chehalis for throat and nose troubles, and on the more than 50 affected haperformed a total of 77 operations. This shows that more than 25 per cent of the 325 immates are afficted with physical allments of some kind, ranging from trachoms and adenoids to hypestrophied and enlarged tonsils. One lad had a hare lip, and this was operated upon, as a result of which a nervous, fretful, sullen and backward youth has been transformed into a good natured youngster, intensely sager to learn.

Following the advent of Dr. Oliver at the institution \$7 letters were sent out asking parents to give their consent to the operations, and in 33 instances parents gave their consent, the parents of 18 refused, and no replies were received. gave their consent, the parents of 1s refused, and no replies were received from 12 letters. The orphans in need of surgical attention were operated upon. However, owing to the lack of facilities some of the more delicate operations were postponed until the new hospital is completed. 


