CEMETERY OWNERS PLAN

Lone Fir Association Contemplates Improving Graveyard.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Lone Fir Lot Owners' Association yesterday afternoon in the office of J. A. Strowbridge, the secretary, it was decided to call a mass meeting of the lot owners and all others interested in the improvement of the cemetery next Saturday night at 7:30 o'clock in the hall of Orient Lodge, at East Sixth and East Alder streets, to decide on future plans. The executive committee reported the cemetery to be in a bad state and in need of improvement. Subscriptions to the amount of \$2800 toward defraying the expenses of improving the cemetery have been received by the secretary of the association, and \$1700 of that amount has been paid. The lot owners are so widely scattered that it has been difficult to obtain their addresses

and names, but much of this work has been accomplished.

The Lot Owners' Association is in full control of the grounds, having acquired all the stock of the Lone Fir Association, and can proceed with whatever improvements the lot owners desire to have made.

Ad Club "Tour" Planned.

An advertising tour around the world is scheduled to be the feature of the Portland Ad Club's weekly luncheon at the Hotel Portland tomorrow noon. Something unique is promised by M. Mossesohn, who has charge of the arrangements. Among those at the luncheon will be consular officials of foreign powers. James Laidlaw, the British Consul, will speak on advertising in England; Consul M. Ida, of Japan, will take for his subject "Nippon Okeru Kokoku," and Vice-Consul E. M. Cederburg, of Norway, Vice-Consul J. W. Mathies, of Holland, and Vice-Consul Valde Lidell, of Sweden, will contribute to the programme.

FATHER'S HEAD IN DANGER

Former Census Enumerator Says Spirits Told Him to Shoot.

Because spirits told Adam C. DeBord that the proper thing to do would be to shoot his father's head off and he threatened to follow the advice, the senior DeBord, surety on the bond of his son, who is under charges of padding the last Federal census, yesterday told United States District Attorney McCort that he would withdraw the bond and his son was taken in custody and locked up. Adam DeBord was held to appear before the Federal Court under \$1500 bonds on a charge of padding the census. When he was an enumerator in 1910, his father was the principal bondsmen. The father told District Attorney McCort that his son had been attend-

ing spiritual seances and consulting mediums and yesterday morning his son informed him that the spirits had advised him to shoot his father's head off. The elder DeBord said he feared that his son would carry into execution the advice of the spirits and requested that he be released from the surety and that his son be locked up. The bond was cancelled and the younger DeBord was brought in by the United States Marshall's office and placed in the County Jail for safe keeping.

Oak-Street Cut in Sight.

It is probable that the work of cutting Oak street through from Park to Tenth will begin soon, as \$300,000 of the \$445,000 assessment has been paid, including \$30,000 paid by the Burkhardt estate. It is expected that the balance of the \$349,000 will be paid within a few days. The only hindrance to the work will then be the injunction suit of John Gustafman and John Clark. Should their suit be successful it would halt the work.
