20 AND 14 YEARS PENALTY

Ex-Convicts Arrested at Astoria for Burglary in Centennial Are Sent to Prison-One Is Oregon Militia Member.

ASTORIA. Or., Sept. 26.—(Special.)— Four men were sentenced to the pent-tentiary at today's session of the Cir-cuit Court and two of them were sen-tenced to serve the limit allowed under the law, or 14 to 20 years, respec-

Three of the men were Harry G. Moore, G. W. Healey and Jesse Cohen, who were indicted on four charges of robbing residences here in the Centennial and who are said to have brok-en into 43 houses in Fortland during the Rose Festival.

Moore pleaded guilty to two indict-

ments charging him with larceny in a dwelling. He admitted having been released from Folsom prison in March, 1993, and that he finished a term in the Walla Walla penitentiary August I. He was sentenced to serve seven years on each Indictment, or a total of is years.

One hundred thousand dollars is the amount involved in the deal according to the estimate of E. A. Helcomb, deputy supervisor of the St. Joe.

The price under the contract is \$2 a thousand feet, stumpage figures. The areas were burned over by the forest fires of 1910. Mr. Holcomb says the sale is the largest recorded for the St. Joe forest for months. J. P. McGoldrick, president of the company, said today: "Under our contract only such white






