ROSEBURG FAIR DELAYED

HEAVY RAIN MARS DAY SET FOR OPENING EVENTS.

Hundreds of Exhibits Are Arranged and Speedy Races Expected to Attract Big Crowds.

ROSEBURG, Or., Sept. 26.—(Special.)—On account of the steady downpour of rain during the past 24 hours, the formal opening of the 18th annual exhibition of the Douglas County Agricultural Society was this morning postponed until tomorrow, when the weather gives promise of improvement.

Although thoroughly soaked, the racetrack is said to be in fair condition tonight and in the event of no more rain will be in proper condition for the speed events tomorrow afternoon. The racing card on the opening day includes trotting, pacing and running and the entries show some of the speediest animals ever seen on the local track.

All was activity about the fairgrounds today and not until late tonight did Secretary Marshall and his small army of assistants complete the work of arranging the hundreds of exhibits which arrived from all parts of the county today. Every stall in the livestock section is occupied to-night, while the racing stables are hardly amply to accommodate the large number of horses entered.

In the pavilion are hundreds of individual exhibits, including not only the products of the soil and the fruits of trees, but handwork of the Douglas County women, who are ever alert to occasions of this nature.

Every train arriving in Roseburg today brought its quota of fair visitors and in the event of clear weather, tomorrow's attendance probably will be the largest in the history of Douglas County fairs. Every school in the county will be closed during the day and every pupil will be admitted to the fairgrounds.

In addition to this occasion upon the part of the School Board, the merchants of Roseburg will close their establishments in the afternoon and business will be suspended generally.

ASTORIA, Or., Sept. 26.—(Special.)—The Astoria Water Commission held a special meeting today to open bids on the purchase of \$80,000 in 5 per cent. 20-year bonds that are being issued to raise money for making improvements to the water system. Two bids were received as follows:

S. A. Kean & Company, Chicago, \$80,000; Well, Roth & Company, Chicago, \$80,875. The latter bid was, however, a conditional one, so the bonds were awarded to Kean & Company. The Commission elected C. H. Higgins as a member of the Board from the Second Ward to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Isaac Bergman and it elected Frans Kankkonen as a member from the First Ward to fill the existing vacancy.

ROSEBURG FAIR DELAYED

HEAVY RAIN MARS DAY SET FOR OPENING EVENTS.

Hundreds of Exhibits Are Arranged and Speedy Races Expected to Attract Big Crowds.

ASTORIA, Or., Sept. 26.—(Special.)—Four men were sentenced to the penitentiary at today's session of the Circuit Court and two of them were sentenced to serve the limit allowed under the law, or 14 to 20 years, respectively.

Three of the men were Harry G. Moore, G. W. Healey and Jesse Cohen, who were indicted on four charges of robbing residences here in the Centennial and who are said to have broken into 43 houses in Portland during the Rose Festival.

Moore pleaded guilty to two indictments charging him with larceny in a dwelling. He admitted having been released from Folsom prison in March, 1909, and that he finished a term in the Walla Walla penitentiary August 1. He was sentenced to serve seven years on each indictment, or a total of 14 years.

Healey pleaded guilty to two indictments charging him with larceny. He admitted that he had been sentenced to the penitentiary from Portland some years ago, but was paroled. Later he served 25 months in the penitentiary at Walla Walla. Judge Eakin today sentenced him to serve 10 years on each indictment or 20 years in all.

Jesse Cohen, the third of the trio, pleaded guilty to two indictments charging him with larceny in a dwelling. He said he recently joined the Oregon National Guard at Portland and went to the encampment at Columbia Beach. As there was no testimony that he had been in prison before, the court gave him an indeterminate sentence of from one to seven years on each indictment. Cohen had posed as the innocent one of the trio, while Moore admitted his guilt and assisted the police in recovering some of the stolen property. This made Cohen angry and he told the District Attorney after the sentence had been pronounced, that Moore will not "leave the penitentiary alive."

Albert F. Bonnell was also sentenced to serve an indeterminate term of from one to seven years for robbing a house at Fern Hill.

BIG TIMBER DEAL CLOSED

50,000,000 Feet of Damaged White Pine Brings \$100,000.

SPokane, Wash., Sept. 26.—(Special.)—The McGoldrick Lumber Company of Spokane has closed a deal for the purchase of 50,000,000 feet of damaged white pine in the St. Joe National forest in Idaho. The deal involves \$100,000 and is the largest in the history of Douglas County fairs.

The price under the contract is \$2 a thousand feet, stumpage figures. The areas were burned over by the forest fire of 1910. Mr. Holcomb says the sale is the largest recorded for the St. Joe forest for months. J. P. McGoldrick, president of the company, said today: "Under our contract only such white pine timber as will yield a profit after salvage will be cut. At the present time we are unable to give an estimate of what the total cut will be. On Government areas it may go to 50,000,000 feet or it may not. Our contract is for stumpage rights on tracts owned variously by the government, railroad and private individuals. A camp has been opened on Slate Creek near Wallace. The number of men at this camp will be increased, and other camps opened from time to time as necessity arises in getting out the timber. It is possible that the cut will be completed before the expiration of five years."
