FREE RIDES CARDED

Redmond or Bend Guests to Be Passed From Opal City.

LINE-BUILDERS ARE HOST

Construction Department to Provide No-Pay Transportation - Portland Crowd Leaves Tomorrow. Service to Be Rushed.

All who attend the "Railroad day" celebration at either Redmond or Bend will be carried free between Opal City, Redmond and Bend as guests of the construction department of the Oregon

Trunk Railway.

If the line is in condition to permit the operation of trains all will be taken to Bend at the expense of the company. At any rate, they will be carried out of Bend to Opal City without cost, as the road will be ready to accommodate them after the spike-driving ceremonies at that place next Thurs-

Free passage can be provided by the

Free passage can be provided by the construction department without violating the rules of the Interstate Commerce Commission, as in its present condition south of Opal City the road is not a common carrier. Not until after a tariff is published and the line is opened for regular business will it be necessary to comply with the commission's regulations.

A party of Portland business men will leave here via the North Bank road at 3 o'clock tomorrow morning and will proceed to Opal City on the regular Oregon Trunk train. Thence they will be taken to Redmond by the construction department and will attend the celebration to be held there Saturday. Redmond is preparing for the presence of 3000 persons. A score or more will go from Portland.

Empire Builder to Be Met.

Empire Builder to Be Met.

The party that will attend the meeting of the Central Oregon Development League at Burns next week will leave here on the North Bank road Saturday morning, stopping at Opal City and Redmond en route, it is probable the Portland excursionists will touch at other important points in the interior. They will meet J. Je Hill at Prineville Sunday night and proceed with him to Burns. A reception will be tendered them at Redmond.

Redmond has prepared an interesting programme for Saturday. Some of the features are a baseball game, bronco-busting contests, races and a parade of decorated automobiles. Products of the surrounding district will be exhibited. Prominent men will speak. Empire Builder to Be Met.

The nucleus of the Portland delegation that will attend the Bend celebration will come from Burns with
Mr. Hill's party. Many others will
leave Portland next Wednesday, going
to Opal City on the Oregon Trunk and
to Redmond by construction-train service. If possible they will be carried
into Redmond by the construction department. Officials have every reason
to believe that the service can be extended to Bend at that time, but they
are not yet ready to promise it.

The rails will be in Bend next Sun-day morning. Track laying is proceed-ing at the rate of 2.21 miles a day, which is considered a remarkable rec-

which is considered a remarkable record, as grading was done nearly a year ago. By completing the line to Bend Sunday, the Oregon Trunk will have been built from the south bank of the Crooked River—a distance of 25.6 miles, in 14 days. In addition nearly three miles of siding have been laid. The telegraph crews are following closely upon the heels of the trackingers. The wires have reached Redmond and will be in Bend by the time next week's celebration is held.


