

### \$3,000,000 DITCH PROJECT STARTED

Deschutes Rimrock Power Company to Irrigate Vast Three-County Acreage.

### LONDON FIRM BUYS BONDS

Concern Capitalized at \$1,000,000 to Undertake Work Planned by Government to Pump From Columbia Near Irrigon.

Taking up the work of developing an immense waterpower project along the Deschutes River which the Government projected several years ago, a company headed by ex-Representative to Congress M. A. Moody, of The Dalles, and LeRoy Park, of Portland, has been organized with sufficient capital behind it to assure success of the enterprise, according to an announcement made yesterday. It is announced that \$3,000,000 in bonds for the company has been underwritten by a London syndicate.

The company is capitalized at \$1,000,000 and is to be known as the Deschutes Rimrock Power Company. A meeting was held yesterday by the stockholders to work out the details of organization. As soon as the organization is fully completed, full details will be announced, with the names of the stockholders.

Government engineers prepared reports a few years ago for the establishment of a large power plant on the Deschutes River as a central transmission station for supplying electrical energy in pumping water out of the Columbia River near Irrigon on the immense area of level land in the northern part of Morrow, Gilliam and Sherman counties.

While the project was regarded as feasible nothing has been done because of the inability to obtain the necessary appropriation for such a gigantic enterprise. The Government still retains its right to control as much of the water power of the Deschutes River as it may want.

The company organized will construct its power plants near the mouth of the river, where they will not conflict with the Government's later operations. The company controls a large amount of land east of the Deschutes and directly south of the Columbia River. That tract will be developed and platted into small farms. According to present plans, about 15,000 horsepower will be developed. This will be increased later as the demand for additional power is made.

Work to Begin This Fall. "All the important details of the company are completed," said Mr. Park yesterday. "We have all the capital available that will be necessary to complete our plans. Besides providing power for pumping water out of the Columbia River on to our holdings we will have an immense amount of energy to supply other irrigation projects still further east of our lands. The Deschutes River is one of the greatest in the United States. It is capable of producing 1,000,000 horsepower, so you see we can use but a small share of the total."

Preparation for Convention Keeps 1912 Commission Busy. Some idea of the volume of business that is developing in the office of the Elks' 1912 convention commission is gained from knowledge of the fact that although the headquarters were open a short part of the time yesterday more than 200 telephone calls were answered, 40 letters were received and more than 10 persons called.

Harry C. McAllister, secretary of the commission, was busy all day getting the headquarters in shape. R. K. Kahl, exalted ruler of the lodge and chairman of the commission, assisted him in arranging the rooms. Dr. Harry F. McKay and W. O. Van Schuyver, members of the board, were among the first to pay official visits.

The rooms are on the fourth floor to the left of the elevator. One room will be reserved for the secretary's office and for the use of the committee, while the other will be occupied by the stenographers of San Francisco Elks is expected to be in the city before the end of the week to arrange for hotel reservations. More than 300 members of San Francisco Lodge, No. 2, will attend the convention.

### BOARD URGES PURCHASE

WOODSTOCK WATER PLANT'S PRICE IS \$20,716.35.

Proposal to Sell to City Will Be Brought Before City Council at Next Meeting. A proposal of D. B. Fleck to sell the Woodstock water plant to the city for \$20,716.35 was submitted to the City Council by the Water Board yesterday, but because the communication was not filed with City Auditor Barbur until after the official calendar had gone to press Tuesday, it could not be considered without a four-fifths vote on suspension of the rule. Councilmen Maguire, Clyde and several others are opposing the purchase of the plant, and voted against consideration of the measure, thus delaying consideration until the next meeting.

The price now made for the water system in Woodstock is for the plant exclusive of the real estate, pumping plant and tanks. Residents of Woodstock are anxious to have Bull Run water, but they have been informed by the Water Department that it will be impossible to lay mains within a year. If the Fleck system is purchased, however, the water can be turned in at once.

The report of the Water Board, signed by the four members, F. C. Adams, and Frank W. Wain, says: "The gross income from the plant for 1910 was \$10,000. The purchase price of the plant is \$20,716.35. Our engineer estimates the cost of duplicating the 2 1/2 miles of pipe by pipe of some size to be \$44,000, and as it will take a year or more to install new lines, during the purchase of the plant is desirable as affording an immediate supply of Bull Run water at the customer's city rates, whereas the present company is charging rates much in excess of these."

Engineer Clark of the Water Department said yesterday that he expected the labor lower reservoir to be completed early next month. Work is now being done on the west slope of the south basin. The grading crew is filling in the bank around the powerhouse and grade on the outer slope. The excavation for the basin is complete. The new upper reservoir is in use.

A request that the Water Board take the necessary steps for the purchase of four or five individual claims in the Bull Run Forest Reserve passed the Council yesterday. Some of the property-owners are said to be about to cut timber on their claims, and it is feared the removal of timber and piling up of brush will do injury to the city's water supply. It is proposed to secure this timber, if possible, at a price not over present market rates.

THREE IN ROW OVER PAVING. Plan to Discontinue Kenton Work Sent Back to Committee. A bill among Councilmen Clyde, Burgard and Joy took place at yesterday's meeting of the City Council, when Councilman Clyde declared that to refer to the street committee resolutions discontinuing the improvement of 13 streets in Kenton would favor the paving companies. He endeavored to make a speech on the effect of the Ellis paving amendment on paving of those streets, but was ruled out of order by Mayor Rushlight.

Councilman Burgard said Clyde was "way off his base" in his remark about the paving companies, and Councilman Joy characterized Clyde's statement as "unjust."
