

ARAB CHIEFS WILL SUBMIT TO ITALY

Tripoli Government Is Established and Full Occupation Is Completed.

TURKS CHASED ON RED SEA

Fort Fires on Cruiser, Which Retalates by Sinking Gunboat—British Vessel Taken by Turks in Mediterranean.

LONDON, Oct. 6.—Despatches from Tripoli say that the Italians today completed the full military occupation of the place today by landing sailors and guns. The appointment of Rear-Admiral Boreddino as Military Governor followed.

After Italian seamen had been landed and occupied Port Surtania, the chiefs of the Arab tribes near Tripoli went aboard the Italian flagship and gave their submission. They begged the Italians not to resume the bombardment.

The German Consul, as the senior member of the consular corps, also visited the flagship and asked Vice-Admiral Faravelli to assume responsibility for the preservation of public order in the protection of foreign residents in Tripoli, which had been abandoned by the Turkish troops.

Italian sailors buried the Turkish dead with military honors. Twenty severely wounded Turks were placed in the hospital wards of the Italian warships. Injured Turks said further resistance on their part was impossible owing to the inferiority of their number and of their fighting equipment.

Hostilities are reported from the Red Sea. The fort at Hodeidah, a seaport of Arabia, fired many shots at the Italian mining cruiser Aretusa, which was cruising in the Red Sea to protect Italian commerce. The shots were without effect. The Aretusa replied with her guns, attacked a Turkish gunboat and sank her.

Turkey having taken the offensive in the Red Sea, where Italy had intended to remain on the defensive, the Aretusa and the dispatchboat Staffetta and repair ship Volcano, all of which are armed, and the smaller war craft available, have been ordered to chase the old gunboats that Turkey has in the Red Sea, and to attack the port of Yemen if necessary.

The Turkish battleship Feth-i-Bulend held up and searched the British steamship Orchis in the Mediterranean, and finding 40 barrels of powder on board, took the vessel to Malenka as a prize of war. The Orchis was bound for Constantinople, from Smyrna, and her owners here cannot understand why she was taken, so long as she was not going to an Italian port.

POTATO WILL BE HONORED

Harrisburg to Give Tuber Carnival October 18 and 19.

The potato will be crowned king at Harrisburg October 18 and 19, for on those days the Harrisburg Potato Carnival Association has planned festivities to pay tribute to the humble tuber. The carnival is being helped along by women, and the men have fallen in with their plans, after having been shown just how real good a carnival could be held with the potato as the central figure.

The president of the association is Mrs. Louise Maxson, and Mrs. T. J. Anderson is secretary. The carnival will be an exhibition of painstaking potato culture, portraying all the progressive methods of planting, peeling and preparing the over-valuable potato.

A liberal list of premiums and prizes is offered and the potato exhibit will be supplemented with "an enormous display of flowers, fruits and historical curios, and an elaborate programme."

RETURNS FAIL NEWELL

Hermiston Land Shows Income of \$100 Per Acre.

HERMISTON, Or., Oct. 6.—(Special.)—D. C. Brownell, of Umatilla, head of the Brownell project adjoining the Umatilla Government project, says that last year he cleared \$100 per acre from 110 acres of alfalfa, and that this season will prove equally as good. Mr. Brownell gives these figures as evidence of the recent statement of F. H. Newell, director of the Reclamation Service.

While Mr. Newell spoke particularly of the Umatilla project in his assertion that land was held at too high a figure, he also included all Eastern Oregon, and Mr. Brownell believes his farm shows land to be cheap at \$200 per acre when it gives such returns.

Oil Test to Be Made on Coast.

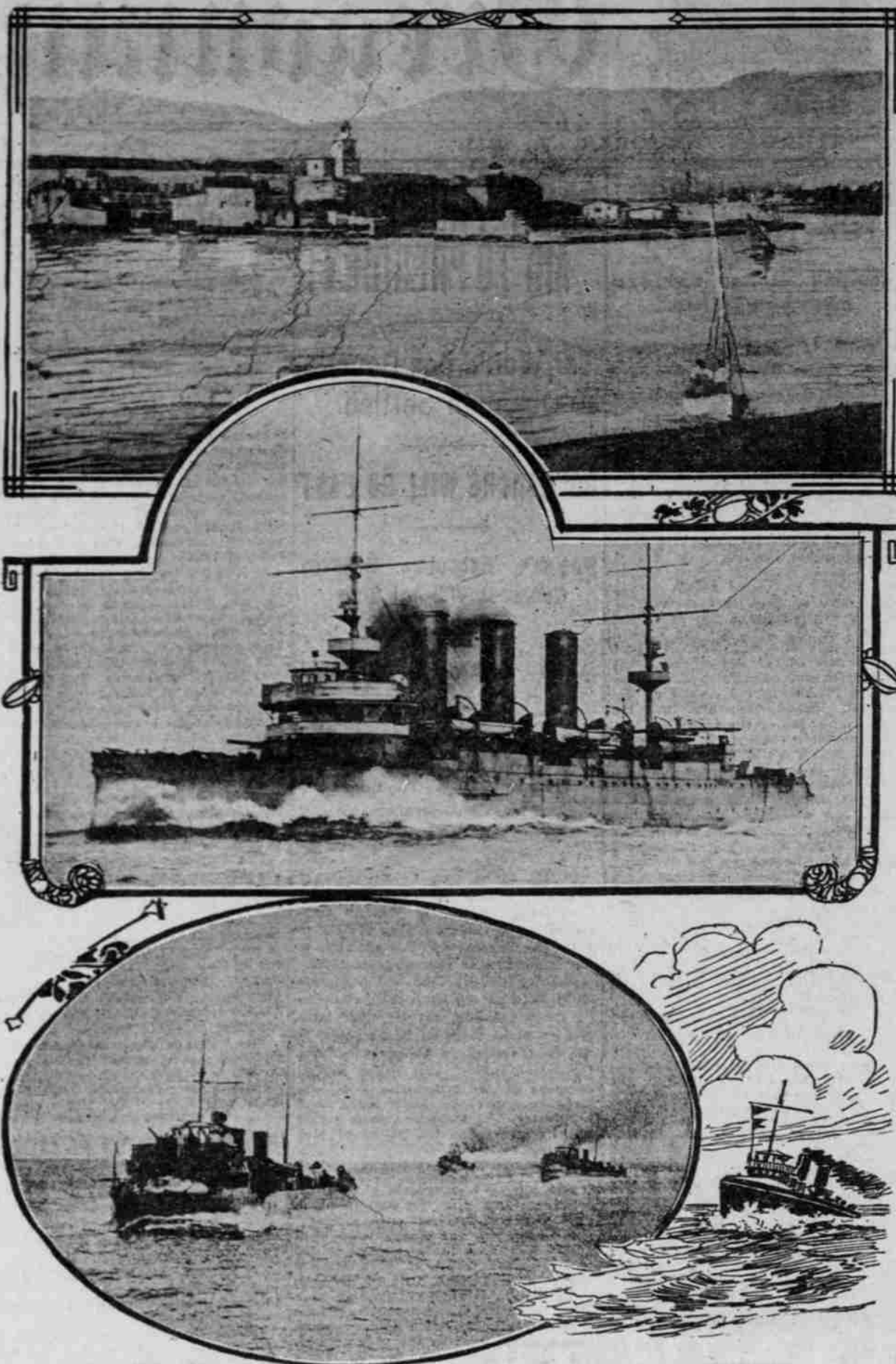
MARSHFIELD, Or., Oct. 6.—(Special.)—Prospecting for oil on Catching Inlet near this city is to be carried on by a company which is being formed by business men here. The services of an oil expert have been engaged and stock to the amount of \$20,000 is to be sold so that a thorough test can be made. So far about \$2,500 worth of stock has been subscribed and the company will be incorporated. The encouraging indications of the company drilling at Bandon has revived the interest in prospecting in this locality and the new company has determined to make a thorough test. Many oil leases have been taken up at different times in this county, and it is now likely that the question of whether or not oil can be found in commercial quantities will be tried out by the companies which are starting.

VOTES ARE COSTLY

Stephenson's 56,000 Average \$2 Apiece for Entertainment.

WHISKY JUGS CUSTOMARY

Campaign Manager Unable to Say Whether Liberal Expenditures Influenced Result—Game Wardens Will Testify.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Oct. 6.—After examining 725 items of amounts paid to individuals who collectively for campaign expenses received \$107,792, the Senatorial committee, investigating charges of bribery in connection with the election of United States Senator Stephenson, today heard testimony that money was used for "entertainment" and not for any corrupt purpose.

No itemized accounts were returned, but Rodney Sackett, one of the campaign managers, testified that he had been informed the money had been used for buying cigars and beer.

It was the custom in Wisconsin during the campaign, Sackett testified, to send jugs of whisky and kegs of beer to localities where favorable political sentiment was to be worked up. All this was given by Sackett as explaining Senator Stephenson's expenditure for primary nominations.

Whole Vote Averages \$2 Each.

When Senator Heyburn, the chairman, asked whether Senator Stephenson had spent almost \$2 for entertainment for each of the 56,000 votes he had received, the witness said that was one way of reckoning it. It was brought out that several ministers had been campaign workers, but it was not shown that they had anything to do other than urge voters to work for Stephenson.

"How many votes do you think Senator Stephenson got in consequence of his liberal spending?" asked Senator Heyburn.

"I don't know that he got any on that account," replied Sackett.

"What! Despite all that entertainment you do not know of a single vote he got for it?"

"Not any."

"Senator Rutherford asked if this wholesale treating were the custom in Wisconsin."

"Expense regarded as legitimate."

"Yes. It has been considered a legitimate expenditure to send supplies of beer and whisky to certain localities to show them that their leader was a good fellow," replied Sackett.

"Didn't that violate the anti-treat law?" asked Senator Heyburn.

"There was no such law."

"Now, the record shows C. M. Ham-bright was paid \$400 for campaign expenses. Have you any knowledge as to how much of that amount was spent for liquor and cigars?"

"I have no knowledge. That was a

taking out a big section of the river bank and flooding the country below. The \$500,000 property of the water-power company is believed not to be greatly damaged. It was said tonight that the main dam, which is a concrete structure 100 feet thick at the base and 50 feet at the top, probably would stand all the force directed against it.

Efforts were made to send warnings to farmers in the vicinity, but the telephone wires were the first to go down and the fate of many rural residents is a subject of apprehension.

Below Black River falls are several villages, including Roaring Creek, Irving, North Bend, Melrose, Holmen, Lottles, Midway and Omakaska. The high waters are due to strike these towns tonight, and forces of men have been sent out to strengthen the bridges.

Telegraph wires are down, and the only details available are being received over badly disabled telephone wires.

MEXICAN TRAFFIC DELAYED

Tormenting Rains Swell Stream and Wash Out Bridges.

TUCSON, Ariz., Oct. 6.—Railroad traffic with Hermosillo and Guaymas has been interrupted indefinitely by the storm which raged in Sonora Tuesday and Wednesday.

Torrents of rain swelled the Sonora River to flood proportions. A Southern Pacific bridge has been swept away and no trains can be run until a new trestle is built. Several Southern Pacific bridges spanning the Rio Yaqui have also gone out, according to unconfirmed reports.

Nothing is yet known of the damage done in the City of Guaymas, as it has been cut off from telegraphic communication since Tuesday.

TELLURIDE, COLO., THREATENED

Heavy Downpour, Following Week of Rain, Isolates Town.

TELLURIDE, Colo., Oct. 6.—Twenty-four hours of heavy downpour, following a week of rain, caused a rise in the San Miguel River that washed away miles of railroad track and swept heavy iron bridges down stream.

For a time Telluride was threatened with disaster. The Trout Lake reservoir of the Telluride Power Company filled rapidly to overflowing.

The town, it is said, will be cut from the world, so far as railway facilities are concerned, for weeks.

TRAFFIC NEARLY BACK TO NORMAL

Such Is Declaration Made by Railroad Officials—Strike-breakers on Strike.

MEMPHIS SHOPS DESERTED

Fear of Trouble When Union Men Are Paid Off in Chicago Leads Lines to Take Precautionary Measures.

CHICAGO, Oct. 6.—The approaching end of the first week of the shopmen's strike on the Harriman and Illinois Central lines, sees traffic practically normal, according to President Markham, of the Illinois Central, and Vice-President Kruttschnitt, of the Harriman lines. Although the number of shopworkers is depleted, they say there are enough men at work to make all repairs to rolling stock needed for use.

About 50 additional strikebreakers were put at work in the shops at Burnside today. They were not molested. Fear of trouble when the strikers are paid for their last month's work, caused the Illinois Central to make the statement that they will not be permitted to enter the works, but will be paid from a special car to be run along the tracks. The train will be guarded by a special detail of police.

Dissatisfied with conditions near the shops at Memphis, Tenn., Illinois Central strikebreakers struck today. At strike headquarters it was said more than 400 men walked out, practically the entire force. The walkout was without disorder.

In the various cities on the Illinois Central lines both the shopmen and the railroad officials express themselves as satisfied with developments.

Except for a demonstration in New Orleans, no disorders were reported. New Orleans and Houston, Tex., have been storm centers. Houston has a record of one guard dead, another hovering between life and death, three others badly wounded and several employees or former employees of the Harriman lines injured since the strike began.

DYNAMITE REQUEST DENIED

Indiana Judge Will Not Give Up Evidence to Los Angeles.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 6.—Judge Joseph Markey, of the Criminal Court of this county, this afternoon denied the petition of State's Attorney J. D. Fredericks, of Los Angeles County, California, that dynamite seized in this city at the time of the arrest of John J. McNamara, be removed to Los Angeles to be used as evidence in the trial of McNamara.

In his ruling, Judge Markey said the dynamite, exploding apparatus, revolvers, gun and the books of the Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers, confiscated by the police when McNamara, secretary of the Association, was arrested, would be needed here as alleged evidence in the prosecuting of him on indictments found by the grand jury of this county.

While he had no doubt the California authorities were acting in good faith, the court said he knew of no law by which the alleged evidence would be returned to this county after it had been transported to Los Angeles.

Lumberyard Employees Strike.

ALAMEDA, Cal., Oct. 6.—Promptly at 7 o'clock this morning, five minutes after they had filed through the gates for the day's work, 250 men employed at the Farjor & Co. lumber-yard laid down their tools and walked out on a strike, demanded by the Building Trades Council of Oakland. The cause of the strike was the refusal of the company to discharge a nonunion saw-filer.

Cotton Crop Will Move.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 6.—Cotton-growers, whose staple is piled up at stations along the lines of the Illinois Central and Texas & Mississippi Valley railroads since the strike of the employees began, were notified by General Solicitor Burch, of those roads, that, beginning with today, the embargo would be lifted.

DRUNKEN JUROR IS JAILED

Pullman Man Falls From Chair in Court—Contempt Charged.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Oct. 6.—(Special.)—John N. Gaddis, of Pullman, Wash., a prominent citizen of that place, it is said fell from his chair when F. H. Rudkin, judge of the Federal Court, dismissed him for drunkenness, and being unable to arise he was carried to the street and taken to jail where he was held for contempt of court.

Gaddis was drawn on the jury in the Federal Court of the District of Eastern Washington. He is held for contempt of court, but was released from custody last night.
