BROTHER MICHAEL'S MEMORY HONORED.—For the repose of the soul of Brother Michael, P. C. of the order of St. Basil, died at the request of Archbishop Gross in 1884 to establish the Christian Brothers' Business College, and who died in St. Francis hospital, a mass was celebrated at the Cathedral Thursday by request of the Alumni Association of the Christian Brothers' College. At the close of the mass, Archbishop Gross extolled the work of Brother Michael in this city. Many of the former students of Brother Michael attended the service, and the faculty and students of the Christian Brothers' Business College attended in a body in honor of the departed teacher. Rev. George Thompson, pastor of St. Basil, Father McDevitt, pastor of St. Patrick, O'Hara, subdeacon, and Rev. Father Cronin, master of ceremonies. Archbishop Christie and Rev. Father J. D. O'Brien occupied seats in the sanctuary.

LARGER CLUB QUARTERS SOUGHT.—The East Side Business Men's Club has decided to seek larger quarters for the organization, and H. A. Calef, C. A. Bigelow and J. D. NAPIER'S SUMS DOUBTED

CREMATORY ACCOUNTS ARE UNDER INVESTIGATION.

Mayor Says Discrepancies in Sawdust Tab Are Numerous—Approval of Report Withheld.

Apparent discrepancies in the report of H. N. Napier, who resigned recently from the position of superintendent of the garbage crematory, have led Mayor Rushlight and City Health Officer Wheeler to begin a thorough investigation of the statements, which he turned in covering his transactions as purchasing agent for the crematory, from September to December. "I do not know what the result of the investigation will be," said Mr. Napier yesterday. "Mr. Napier says he can explain all the discrepancies we have found, and perhaps he can, but in the meantime, I intend to be shown, before accepting and approving his report."

In his report Mr. Napier lists sawdust obtained by him from the Portland Woodpile Company, at \$1 a load, which Mr. Rushlight declares he has found could be purchased for 75 cents a load. In another place several loads of sawdust are listed at \$1.25 a load, and again the account places a charge of \$1.50 a load for 67 loads of sawdust.

"I find that Mr. Napier has been charging the city for kindling done by his own team and by a man who was already receiving \$75 a month from the city," said the Mayor. "The sawdust item is one of the most unstable articles on the market, as far as price is concerned."

Mayor Rushlight also pointed out a charge of \$135.50 for the superintendent's salary, which he says was fixed at \$125. As an explanation for this it was said that the salary was figured according to the number of

days in the month, instead of at a flat \$125 a month. Salaries of other employees in the report also run from \$2 to \$3 higher than the flat rate.

"The figures in the report are incorrect in many other cases, and the accounts do not balance properly," said the Mayor. "Napier will have a fair opportunity to explain everything, but I shall certainly insist upon an explanation for many of the figures offered in his expense account."

Mr. Napier resigned September 30, and was given two weeks' vacation to which he was entitled, his resignation taking effect October 13.

Mr. Napier declined to discuss the subject beyond saying that his report was correct and that the discrepancies that the officials asserted they had discovered could be easily explained at the proper time. The whole trouble, he said, is due to their having drawn hasty conclusions from surface appearances that can be cleared by a more careful investigation.

BAILEY AGAIN FREE

Second Charge Against Dairy and Food Official Quashed.

WITNESSES NOT AT HAND

Judge Kavanaugh Dismisses Case When Prosecutor Says Conviction Is Improbable—Failure to Publish Bulletin Alleged.

J. W. Bailey, State Dairy and Food Commissioner, will not stand trial on a charge drawn under the state law relating to malfeasance in office. The indictment against him, charging failure to publish a monthly bulletin of the result of food tests as provided by the state law, was dismissed yesterday afternoon by Circuit Judge Kavanaugh after he had listened to admissions by Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald that the state has allowed the principal witness against the Food Commissioner to get beyond the jurisdiction of the court.

Attorney Fitzgerald told the court that there was small chance of the District Attorney's office obtaining a conviction. The prosecutor also called the court's attention to the plea of Bailey that the state has made no appropriation to defray the expense of publishing the bulletin.

Found Not Ample, in Plea. The Legislature in 1909 passed a law requiring the publication of the bulletin, the expense to be defrayed from the pure food fund, which is made up largely of money received in fines from food adulterators. Bailey has maintained that the demands on this fund have been such as to leave nothing to pay the cost of publishing the bulletin.

The indictment against Bailey quashed yesterday was the second returned against him. The first was dismissed on technical grounds, and when the case was called yesterday morning Bailey's attorneys commenced similar proceedings against the second charge. When court convened in the afternoon Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald's report of the absence of material witnesses was followed by Judge Kavanaugh's dismissal of the charge.

Public attention was first directed to the alleged shortcomings of the Dairy and Food Commissioner last winter, when Paul Christie, his principal deputy, resigned, giving as a reason for his action the incompetency of his chief.

Laxity Is Admitted. At that time Bailey was accused of utilizing the funds of his office for private purposes. He admitted the charge, interposing, however, many excuses, one of which was that he had merely gotten the funds mixed with his personal money.

The Commissioner was also accused of buying furniture for the state and appropriating it to his private use. District Attorney Cameron first intended to obtain indictment of the Food Commissioner for misappropriation of funds, but he changed his mind and had him indicted on the technical charge of failing to publish the bulletin, reindicting him for the same offense when the first indictment proved faulty.

Paul Maris later obtained a position with the pure food forces of the Federal Government, and is now believed to be in Colorado. Bailey's other deputy also followed the lead of Maris by resigning. The state professed need of evidence that could be given by these ex-deputies, and the prosecutor referred to them in referring to material witnesses who had left the court's jurisdiction.

3-STATE CHASE ENDS

G. T. KELLEY, ALLEGED OIL SWINDLER, CAUGHT SOUTH.

Man Who Testified Against Two Held as Fraud Promoters and Fled, Is to Be Brought Back.

Because he is said to have tried to evade repeating in the Circuit Court the testimony he had given on preliminary hearing in the Justice Court implicating W. H. Whiteaker and L. C. Hammer in an alleged oil-stock swindle of enormous proportions, G. T. Kelley will be brought here from San Francisco by Detective Eppa Kelley, now states charge as a principle in the alleged swindle and as such will be extradited.

Back of the arrest in San Francisco is a dramatic chain of tag-team prosecutions by Deputy District Attorney Page and Captain of Detectives Baty through three states. The absence of Kelley came to light several weeks ago when the cases of Hammer and Whiteaker were called for trial. At that time he was said to be in the Yamhill Valley, but he showed up in Astoria, where he went after him. Then the telegraphing commenced, which traced Kelley from place to place in Oregon, Kentucky and California, sometimes in incorrect information. As soon as he was located definitely a criminal complaint was sworn against him.

The defendant is charged with floating a \$500,000 corporation on the strength of having posted a few location notices on land more or less near the oil fields of Southern California. Kelley was the locator and received more than 100,000 shares for his work, while Hammer and Whiteaker repaid themselves for the act of signing the notices by taking \$50,000 shares. This stock was sold on a prospectus showing the company to own 800 acres of oil land. Kelley testified at the preliminary hearing that they did not own a foot of land, and made no effort to gain title other than the mere act of posting location notices.

WANDERING SALESMAN DIES

C. G. Moorman Passes at County Jail—Sutcase Is Missed.

Charles G. Moorman, a traveling salesman who was picked up at Sixth and Couch streets, September 19, by Patrolman Martin and placed in the City Jail, as demanded, died Thursday at the County Jail, where he was removed September 22.

A suitcase said to have been among his effects was missed at the City Jail when L. C. Johnson, of 349 College street, his son-in-law, applied for Moorman's goods. His other effects were turned over to the county officials when Moorman was sent to the County Jail, but no trace of the suitcase was found.

Moorman is believed to have checked the case at the baggage office near the Union Depot, and search will be made for it.
