

SINGLE TAX MOVE HIS, SAYS JACKSON

Speaker Before Realty Board Declares He, Not U'Ren, Fathered Measure.

"LAWYER" IS ATTACKED

Orator Declares Oregon City Man Mixes Too Much in Politics. Church Site Held for \$200,000 Deemed Wrong.

That W. S. U'Ren is playing politics in his advocacy of the single tax proposal was one of the sensational features of the discussion of the single tax before the Portland Realty Board yesterday.

In the course of his speech Mr. Jackson arraigned the large property owners on the general principle that they were concealing and evading and showed no disposition to aid the community in which they owned property.

Wrong Seen in Church Price. The Unitarian Church property, at the corner of Seventh and Yamhill streets, has been offered for \$200,000.

I believe in free trade and I believe in single tax. In fact, they mean the same thing. Single tax is a simple method of taxation. It will protect the producers and the workers. It will be the least expensive form of taxation.

I can pick out 100 property owners in this city who will give you a cent for anything. They are concentrated and agnostic and they think that they have no obligations to the community. Single tax would change matters with them.

Referring to absentee land owners in the United States, Mr. Jackson read from a list which included a dozen titled Europeans, who, he asserted, owned more than \$5,000,000 acres of land in this country.

When questioned as to Mr. U'Ren's activity, Mr. Jackson said that the Oregon City lawmaker was involved too much in politics.

When U'Ren says that he is the first to back the single tax movement in Oregon, he is mistaken, said Mr. Jackson. I have been backing it for over 20 years ago. I, myself, am the father of the single tax movement in this state.

Plan Called Makeshift. That the U'Ren single tax proposal is a makeshift for the sweeping taxation propaganda of Henry George, Jr., in which private ownership of land would eventually be eliminated, was admitted by single tax advocates who attended the meeting.

The advocates of the single tax doctrine want to have all property revert to the Government but they are loath to admit that they are not gentlemen, want to be dispossessed of title to your property, as the main purpose of the U'Ren measure proposes, you can vote for it.

Building Competition Denied. We are not prepared to abolish private ownership of land, but we are willing to accept such a condition, the single tax advocates would enforce the improvement of every lot in the city. The result would be that owners who lose their land or are compelled to erect a building whether it could be occupied or not. There would be no competition in building.

\$300,000 IS SEEN

World's Series May Net Neat Sum to Baseball Men.

PLAYERS' SHARE IS \$58,200

Provided Favorable Weather Is Had and Seven Games Are Played, Gross Receipts Promise Small Fortune for All Concerned.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—A rough estimate of the gross receipts when the Giants and the Athletics play the first world's series game at the Polo Grounds here next Saturday, provided weather conditions are favorable, is as follows:

Four hundred boxes at \$25 each, \$10,000; 16,000 lower grandstand seats at \$2 each, \$32,000; 10,000 upper grandstand seats at \$3 each, \$30,000; 5000 grandstand admission, \$2 each, \$10,000; 1,000 open stand seats at \$1 each, \$1,000; Total gross receipts, \$97,000.

Of this total the National commission's 10 per cent will be \$9,700; club owners' share, 50 per cent, \$48,550; players' share, 40 per cent, \$38,850.

Of this the big money is the hand interest developed today over the possibilities of New York ending the season with its record tied with that established by the Philadelphia Athletics.

While Philadelphia has no chance to improve its record since its season is ended, New York has four games to play with Brooklyn.
