High School Lads Succeed in Taking Football Game From Columbia University.

SCORE OF MATCH, 2 TO 6

Coach Dimick's Men Come Back Strong in Second Half, but Are Unable to Register Points Before Session Is Ended.

Forcing the play in three of the four quarters, Jefferson High School football eleven defeated Columbia University in the second game of the interscholastic series yesterday on Multnomah field.
