Sockeye Salmon on Way.

Deptity Fish Warden Rathbun, of the Oregon State Fish and Game Commission, has gone to Alaska to receive a consignment of sockeye salmon eggs to be hatched at the Bonneville hatchery. This is a second installment of 1,500,000 which this state receives from the Federal Government yearly. Oregon is still entitled to two consignments. It etili entitled to two consignments. It is hoped that by this means the Columbia River can again be stocked with this fish. Formerly they were pientiful, but gradually have diminished in number until there are comparatively few in the river. Wallowa Lake was at one time a favorite spawning ground for this species of salmon. Investiga-tion proved, however, that they no longer go there. The sockeye is conlonger go there. The sockeye is considered equal to the chinook salmon in quality, but seldom weighs more than seven pounds.
