With Slack Demand .Stocks Lose Part of Advance.

SHORT COVERING CEASES

Northern Pacific, Reading and Steel the Weakest Features -- Announcement of Tobacco Plan Without Effect on Market.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Demand for stocks fell off materially today and the market lost the firm tone that was its characteristic hast week. Short covering, which was the mainstay of the market on its recent advance, ceased and there was virtually no inquiry at the higher level. The market also had to meet the effect of active realizing sales, and there was a reaction which scaled down recent gains 1 to 2 points.

Filing of the American Tobacco Company's reorganization plan in court was the one event of the day with an especial hearing upon securities values. The prophecy had been made that the filing of the plan would be followed by a marked improvement of sentiment, but the tobacco securities shared in the general heaviness of the list.

Northern Pacific was the heaviest loser of the standard railway issues, although the Hariman stocks and St. Paul were also weak. The stock rose to a point above the price of Union Pacific and closed with a net gain of more than 2 points. Hearings of the steel shares was not rejeved by the trade reports, which were more favorable.

BIGAMIST WEDS 5 TIMES

Handsome Harry Camerca Is Sentenced to Five Years in Prison.

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 16.—(Special.)
—William Harry Cameron, aged 28, and handsome, is said to have two wives in the State of New York, one in the Philippine Islands and admits he has two in the State of Washington. He also told Deputy Prosecutor Noite this morning when he was arrested on a charge of bigamy that he was di-vorced from one wife in Ohio. Cameron served four years in the Regular Army, a large part of that time in the Philippines.

Cameron about a year ago met Florence McMurray in Vancouver, Wash., married her after a short acquaintance and is alleged to have left her almost immediately. He came to Tacoma and February 27 this year wedded Jeanette Hughes. He soon deserted her, however, and went to Redmonds. The two wives both have letters written from there asking them to come and live with him. He was not aware that either knew of the ex-

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istence of the other, but chance threw them together. Cameron pleaded guilty to bigamy this afternoon and was sentenced to five years in prison.

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
