

CHINESE WOMEN HELP REBELLION

Cash Contributed Liberally by
Those in Cities on
Pacific Coast.

BONUS PROMISED LENDERS

Big Interest Will Be Paid If Repub-
lic Wins—Big Merchant Says
It Is Bad Time to Buy
Goods for Import.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 17.—(Special.)—Impelled by the same spirit which prompts the men to contribute from their hard-earned savings to the cause of the revolution, the Chinese women in San Francisco and Oakland are contributing liberally to the cause, and in addition are circulating subscription lists. In soliciting subscriptions the Chinese have adopted a unique financial policy which insures fair-sized donations. When sums in excess of \$10 are contributed, the donor receives an official certificate entitling him to his money back and a large per cent in addition, in case the revolution is successful.

Trade relations with China are likely to be disturbed for some time to come, according to Sing Fat, the head of the Chinese stores of the name and probably one of the wealthiest as well as the most influential members of his race in the United States.

"I would not advise American importers to make extensive purchases in China at this time," he said, "and neither would I advise Chinese merchants to buy goods in large quantities from America, for the simple reason that with the unsettled conditions there, the doubt of delivery exists to a large extent."

Purchases to be shipped from Southern China or received there might go through easily at this time, but there is a risk in the north. Local conditions are improving every day. Subscriptions for the cause are pouring in and the women of several Chinese households are aiding in the work of soliciting funds. This morning several Chinese ladies from Oakland called at the headquarters in Spofford Alley and made liberal donations to the cause.

Limbs Breaks With Boys.
At Riverside several boys fell from a tree limb that gave way under their weight and threw the crowd into confusion. The President stopped to ask if anyone had been hurt, and was much relieved to learn there had been no damage to the youngsters.

Governor Johnson and his party of state officials said good-bye to the President at Long Beach. Mr. Taft again thanked the Governor for his courtesy in escorting him through the state and the two shook hands vigorously. Both Governor Johnson, who is the insurgent leader in the state, and President Taft tried to keep away from politics during their association, but the Governor constantly was surrounded by his political friends in the southern counties of the state, where his support is strongest, while President Taft and Secretary Hillis frequently found themselves in the midst of discussions that might, by suspicious persons, have been termed just a wee bit political.

While the President was motoring to Long Beach and stopping at several villages en route this morning, Mr. Hillis remained in Los Angeles to talk with a number of the more active Republicans in the city.

In all of his travels since Senator Smoot of Utah formally nominated him to be the next National chairman of the Republican party, Mr. Hillis has encountered pledges of support. He has acknowledged these with thanks, but as yet has made no statement indicating that he is seeking or would accept this very difficult post.

Desert Trip Is Made in Night.
Mr. Taft tonight is being whirled across the great desert wastes of Southern Nevada. His first scheduled stop is at Ogden, Utah, tomorrow afternoon, when, after a brief visit, the journey to Butte will be resumed. On the way through Salt Lake City the train will stop only long enough to change engines.

The President's train is being protected tonight with the usual safeguards in the way of extra trackwalkers, extra switchmen and extra watchmen. These precautions are those taken by every railroad over which the President's train travels, although the reported attempt to dynamite a bridge over which the President's train was to pass Sunday night in California may have brought about just a little more vigilance among the men on duty tonight.

DYNAMITE LAID DELIBERATELY

Explosives Expert Says Two Trains
Might Have Been Wrecked.

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Oct. 17.—That a desperate attempt was made to wreck the 300-foot bridge at El Capitán, over which President Taft's special train passed early Monday morning, was the opinion of George W. Inge, an expert on explosives, who was employed by the Southern Pacific Railroad to investigate.

Mr. Inge returned this afternoon with Sheriff Stewart from El Capitán. The dynamite was so placed, he declared, that the underpinning of the bridge would have been torn away by an explosion and the train would have been dashed to the gully 40 feet below.

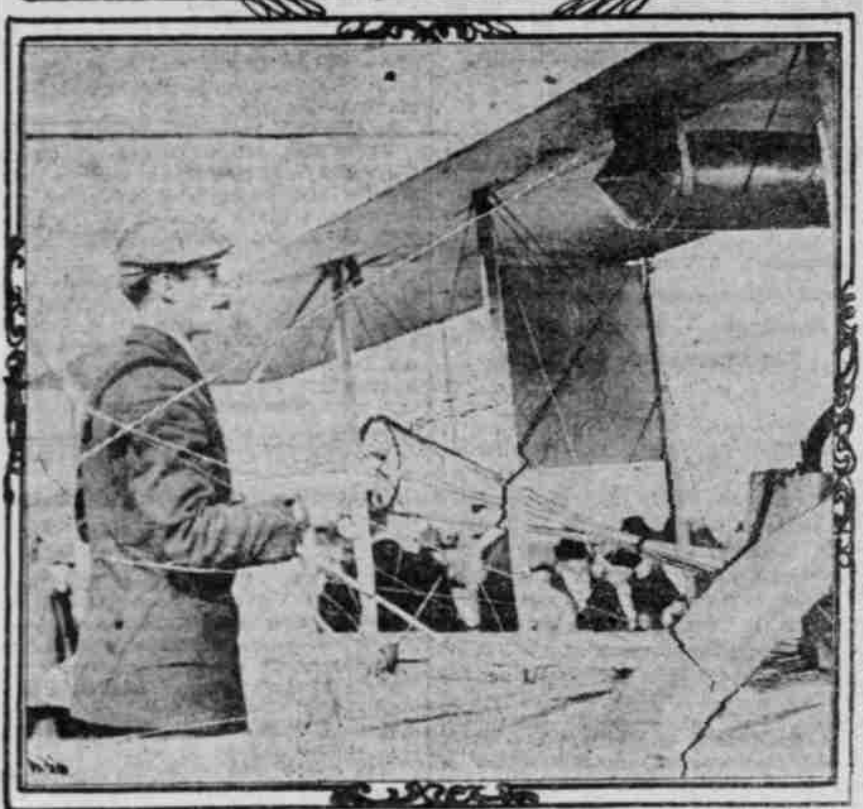
But for the timely discovery of the dynamite, Mr. Inge argued, the train following the first train over the bridge would also have been wrecked, as the block signals, he said, would not have been disturbed.

The President's train did not pass the spot until nearly four hours after the discovery of the explosive and it is not certain that his train would have been either first or second over the structure.

FLYER LOSES WAY

Aviator Rodgers, Wrapped in
Cloud Bank, Is Confused.

BIRDMAN IS OFF 48 MILES

After Getting Far Out of Course,
Citizens Signal and Put Him on
Right Track—Gasoline Lack
Is Cause of Delay.

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 17.—C. P. Rodgers, the aviator who is flying across the continent, flew 48 miles out of his course today after he had lost his bearings in a cloud bank. He was stopped by signals at Bonita, Tex., and given his directions, and then flew back to Gainesville, from where he could follow the Santa Fe tracks south to Fort Worth.

Rodgers left McAlester, Tex., at 7:30 o'clock this morning, after circling the town. He flew over Denison at high speed 8:35 o'clock, but at 9:30 he was able to alight near Pottsboro, seven miles south of Denison, because of lack of gasoline.

Inability to get any fuel kept the aviator there for nearly three hours. A supply finally arriving, he rose to continue his journey to Fort Worth. He became enveloped in some clouds almost immediately and lost his way.

WITNESS IS ARRESTED

Case of Chris Lewis Goes to Jury
After All-Day Session.

"Contradictory testimony yesterday marked the trial of Chris Lewis in the Federal Court on a white slave charge, but only in one instance was it possible directly to charge one of the witnesses with perjury. Frank Chataas, one of the witnesses for the defense, testified that he had not told Patrolman Gaynor, in the presence of witnesses, as Gaynor had testified, that Lewis "was no good," while on the witness stand he said his reputation was excellent. A warrant for his arrest was immediately sworn out and he was taken in charge by Marshal Scott. United States Commissioner Cannon placed his bail at \$1000 and fixed his preliminary hearing for 10 o'clock this morning.

The Lewis case occupied the court during the entire day, being given to the jury late in the afternoon. The testimony was of a revolting character, as the 17-year-old girl victim told her story in detail. A number of witnesses for the defense, all Greeks, contradicted the evidence introduced by the prosecution, but later the girl returned to the stand and pointed out several of them who, she said, had participated in her downfall.

FREMSTAD GETS DIVORCE

Singer No Longer Wife of Edson W.
Sutphen, She Reveals.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—(Special.)—Olive Fremstad, opera singer, arrived today on the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse and through her attorney, Evan Shelby, told reporters that she had obtained a final decree of divorce from her husband, Edson W. Sutphen, July 11 last.

PROBSTEL LOSES CASE

Judge McGinn Decides Ownership
of 36 Griswold Tract Lots.

In a decision yesterday Circuit Judge McGinn held that Frederick Probstel, in a deed given in 1857 had intended to convey all his property to his brother, Wendel Probstel, and decreed that the document be so reformed as to embody the intention of the parties, which he declared had been mistakenly set down by mutual error.

The case was that of Amanda E. White and several others against Frederick Probstel. It involved their right to the ownership of 36 lots in Griswold tract, on the Peninsula back of the Portland Flouring Mill Company's plant. The property is now worth between \$40,000 and \$50,000 at a conservative estimate.

"I find," said the judge, "that Frederick Probstel paid no taxes on this property in the more than 50 years which elapsed between 1857 and the time he laid claim to the title, and the fact that Wendel Probstel conveyed the property in question indicates that he firmly believed it had been included in the transfer from his brother. Let a decree be entered that the deed from Frederick Probstel to Wendel Probstel be reformed as prayed for."

ROOSEVELT ACCUSER CRAZY

Mrs. Ida Von Clausen Committed on
Alienists' Report.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—(Special.)—Mrs. Ida von Clausen, who had been in the Bellevue psychopathic ward for five days, was taken before Supreme Court Justice McCall today and committed to Bloomingdale Asylum upon the report that she is of unsound mind. Drs. Gregory and Holmes, the Bellevue alienists, said she repeated her tale of the plot in which Colonel Roosevelt and others are involved. She said the King of Sweden wanted her to marry his son and that the Emperor of Germany would send her a warship to protect her, on request.

CHINESE APPEAL TO LAW

Appeal Made to Court to Test Legality of Forced Ingress.

As forecasted in The Oregonian a few days ago, the Chinese of Portland have decided to test the constitutionality of the city ordinance that authorizes the

police to break into and trespass upon the places occupied by them on the supposition that gambling is being conducted there.

To bring this question before the Federal judiciary the members of the Shing Tai Company have filed a suit in the District Court against Chief of Police Slover, together with 14 of his officers and patrolmen to recover \$10,000 damages, and asking that they be restrained from in the future interfering in a similar manner with the property of plaintiffs.

The complaint recites that the plaintiffs are citizens of the Chinese empire and conduct a legitimate drug business

at 287 Everett street; that on August 12 the defendants trespassed on the plaintiffs' premises and damaged the property. An order was made to serve subpoenas on the defendants, and the matter will come up in the District Court in a few days.
