Several locations are in view and decision will be made soon. The present quarters of the club are considered too small for the club, especially when public meetings are held. As far as the committee has investigated, there has been found that a club building will prove a good investment. One floor would be reserved for the club, and the other two floors for general business purposes. There is a general advance in rents in East Portland, as the club is a fixture, the members favor the building project.

COAL-TAX PAYMENT WANTED

The Sellwood Board of Trade will ask the City Engineer to prepare a present estimate for coal-tax pavement. At a meeting of the board Tuesday night a committee was appointed to take up the subject. At present coal-tax pavement is not recognized officially. At the meeting it was decided that coal-tax pavement is acceptable for a residence district. The cost is about 15 to 20 square yards. A committee of 15 was appointed to wait on the street committee and urge prompt action on the report of the committee for the opening of East Seventeenth street through Midway, as soon as the report is filed. It was announced that a large territory had been assigned to the coal-tax property appropriated for the extension and that the cost a lot will range from \$2 to \$5.

OLEOMARGARINE SELLERS WARNED

Manufacturers of oleomargarine are warned by the State Dairy and Food Commission that they must comply with the laws governing its manufacture. The commission has received information that oleomargarine is not sold in the state in conformity with the law when the price of butter is moderate. Now that the price has increased this substitute for butter is sold more readily. The requirements of the Oregon law are that sellers shall keep a record of the names and addresses of purchasers, together with the amount of the sale. Failure to do so is punishable by a fine of \$25 to \$100 or imprisonment for 30 days to six months, or both.

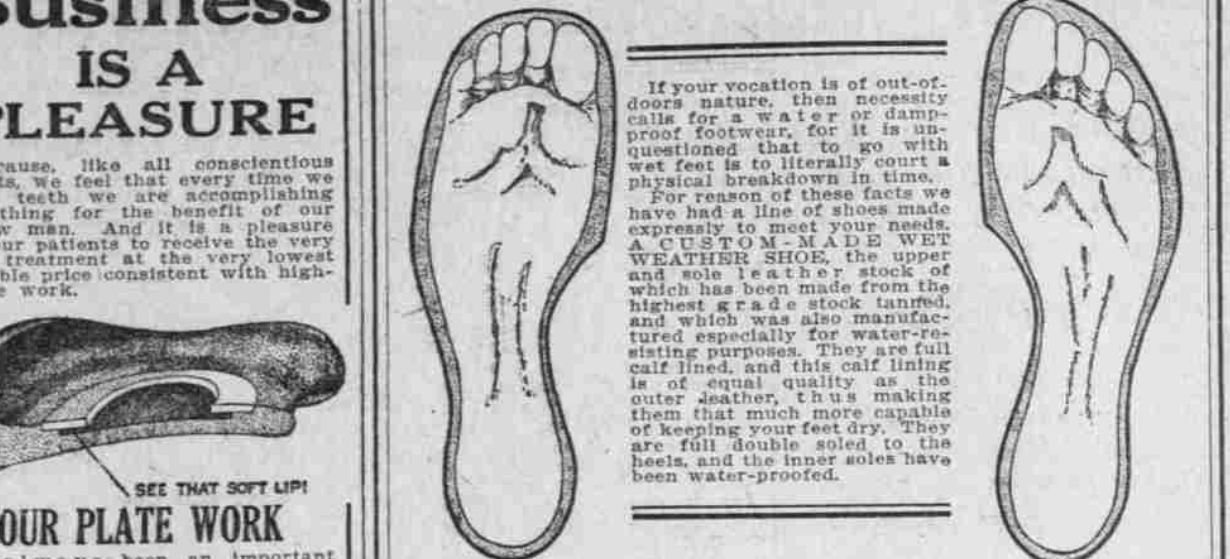
