HUSBAND MURDERS WIFE AS FORETOLD

Mrs. I. A. Millichamp Pays Life for Failing to Heed Doctors' Warning.

MAN KILLS HER AND SELF

Woman Told to Leave Spouse to Escape Peril of His Mania Falters and Is Shot Down-Madman Foils Physicians.

Neglect to heed doctors, who warned her that her husband might be seized at any time with an impulse to kill her, cost the life of Mrs. Bethel McCoy Millichamp last Monday night in the Stanley Apartments at 701 Washington street. Her body and that of her husband, Irwin Alexander Millichamp, were found yesterday morning when the apartment was broken into by the janitor. A 28-caliber bullet was fired into the woman's brain by her husband, who then turned the pistol on himself

who then turned the platel on himself with fatal results.

But a few days ago Mrs. Millichamp informed Dr. J. Chris O'Day, who was treating her husband for a nerve allment, that Millichamp had appealed to her to allow him to kill her and commit sulcide. Dr. O'Day warned her to leave her husband immediately. Later he consulted with Dr. William House over the case and Dr. House exclaimed: "Tell that woman to leave that man at once or he will kill her sure." Neither warning was accepted by

Neither warning was accepted by Mrs. Millichamp, who, as her husband dropped his temporary moroseness, in-formed the physicians that they were

formed the physicians that they were wrong in their diagnosis.
"Trwin is down in the dumps again," Mrs. Millichamp telephoned to Dr. O'Day Sunday afternoon, and steps were taken immediately by the physician to induce the woman to rejoin her parents to be safe from the mania of her husband.

Doctor's Ruse Falls. Dector's Ruse Falls.

Dr. O'Day then telephoned to Millichamp and persuaded him to come to his house with Mrs. Millichamp.

"I could see," said Dr. O'Day, "that he was sunk in despond. In his eyes was the stare of a madman. I took him aside and spoke to him and finally I arranged that he should lay off Monday and come to my office. I had by that time concluded that he was a dangerous man and I had arranged that gerous man and I had arranged that Dr. House should meet him in my office, lnadvertently, as it were, and that we should then assume the responsibility of taking such steps as we deemed necessary for his own good and his

wife's safety. wife's safety.

"He evidently suspected our design, for he did not make an appearance. That was the last I heard of him until I read of the tragedy.

Millichamp had evidently planned the deed some time in advance. He and his wife had entertained friends at

his wife had entertained friends at cards Monday evening and he appeared in an unusually happy frame of mind. It is thought by Dr. O'Day that he affected that attitude to throw his wife and his friends off their guard. About 8 o'clock the visitors left. Soon after the neighbors heard Mrs. Millichamp playing the plane. The playing continued for a short time and then ceased. No one heard any shots.

From all appearances Millichamp slipped up behind his wife, placed the music of the pistol close to her temple and fired. Millichamp then turned the gun upon himself.

As far as is known there was nothing for Millichamp to broad over that would cause insanity. He was well thought of her officers of the Standard

would cause insanity. He was well thought-of by officers of the Standard Oil Company, of which he was city salesman, and was not, to the knowl-edge of his acquaintances, pressed for funds. His bank book, issued by the Merchants Savings & Trust Company, showed a balance of \$17, and another bank book showed a joint deposit by the Millichamps with the Canadian Bank of Commerce. There was but a single entry in this book, and no withdrawals. The deposit was for \$150, and was made September 10.

Mrs. Millichamp's parents reside in
St. Joseph, Mo., at 2651 Seneca street.
Her father is J. D. V. Patch, a wellknown artist. Millichamp's father and
a brother. F. Stanley Millichamp, reside
in Seattle. They arrived in Portland last night.

The couple married in Scattle, March 26, 1909. He was 22 years old and she was 27. Mrs. Millichamp had been mar-ried before and divorced.
