WOMEN TELL AIMS

Improvement of Farm Homes
Is Contemplated.

ECONOMY TO BE STUDIED

Increase and Proper Use of Leisure
Among Subjects to Be Considered—International Congress Formed.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Oct. 19.—Members of the International Congress of Farm Women today effected a permanent organization. A constitution and by-laws were adopted. The suffrage question was avoided. The aims of the new organization are stated in the new constitution as follows:

"The International Congress of Farm Women, auxiliary to the International Dry Farming Congress, aims to improve the conditions, financial, physical, social and spiritual of agricultural homes. It aims to understand more completely the significance of the farm life of the Nation and the dignity of the position of the farm women as co-workers in the most potent and far-reaching of the National Industries, to increase the conservation of energy through intercourse, observation of processes, understanding of modern appliances and education in scientific management of the work; to develop the home further through conference with authoritative experts on dairy methods, poultry culture, kitchen gardening, improved methods of equipping the home, problems of nutrition, child welfare, individual education, including home economics, the increase and proper use of leisure and the valuation of social intercourse in rural communities.

"The organization stands also for a more generous state and National support and encouragement of institute and extension work among farm women."

Nephi, Utah. Professor Cardon advocated the raising of hard red wheats, which he said yielded better under dry-farming conditions and possessed superior milling and baking qualities. MILLS HUM WITH ACTIVITY

Lumber Trade in Northwest Reported Greatly Improved.

SEATTLE, Oct. 19.—The lumber trade in the Pacific Northwest shows marked improvement, according to reports from mills gathered by the West Coast Lumber Manufacturers' Association, which includes virtually all the large rail and cargo mills in Western Washington and Oregon, as well as many in British Columbia. The reports show that a large percentage of the lumbermen are shipping direct from the saw and that stocks are far below those ordinarily carried by the manufacturers. The volume of rail business is increasing so fast that manufacturers would not be surprised at an increase in prices. Rail shipments during September show a falling off compared with August, but were larger than in July and 12 per cent greater than in September of last year. The California retail trade is brisk, and cargo mills in Oregon and Washington now operating are cutting close to capacity. The demand for lumber from Australia, China and the West Coast continues brisk. Several fair-sized Government contracts are to be awarded in November, one for approximately 2,000,000 feet for shipment to the Philippine Islands and one for about 1,000,000 feet for shipment to the Panama Canal.

MORGAN TO HEAR ADVICE

Invitation to Trust Regulation Dinner Is Accepted.

POLICY BARS ROAD

Conservation Looms Black to Idaho Northern.

TOWNSHIP IS WITHDRAWN

After Grading Has Been Started and Thousands of Dollars Expended Railroad Is Advised It Is Field Trespasser.

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 19.—(Special).—The conservation policy used by the Federal Government in Idaho to conserve through withdrawal from entry all power sites, timber and lands claimed to be agricultural in nature, promises to prevent the construction of a railroad into one of the richest sections of the western part of the state and to hinder the rapid development of a very rich country. The Department of the Interior has withdrawn an entire township along the Payette River at Horseshoe Bend for power purposes and the Idaho Northern Railroad Company, which has contractors in the field building its extension through that township from Emmett to Payette Lake may have to abandon its plans. Indignation is rife over the policy followed by the Government in that particular section of the state. It is claimed that the land along the river withdrawn for power sites is the last location an expert engineer would select along the stream, because on almost any other spot far better sites could be selected. Yet the withdrawal has gone into effect, through an order but recently received here by the United States Land Office and the railroad is to be held as a trespasser if it persists in following out its plans to build its extension over the withdrawn land. Added to the troubles of the owners of the road is a suit that has been brought against the road to prevent it from building over another site along the same river.

Work Was Started. For many years the western section of Idaho, in which Long Valley is situated, has patiently awaited the coming of a railroad. Its great desire was

to be fulfilled with the advent of the Idaho Northern, a road now built from Nampa to Emmett, which secured a right of way out of the latter town along the Payette River to Horseshoe Bend and through Long Valley to the Payette Lakes, a famous mountain resort for South Idaho. But the withdrawal of the power sites threatens to blast the dream of the settler, for it may block the building of the railroad. To enter Horseshoe Bend and Long

Valley by a railroad it is necessary to follow the water grade offered by the Payette River. This mountain stream runs through a steep canyon and there is but room enough along the side of the railroad to build. The Idaho Northern surveyed this route to reach Long Valley. Plats and profiles of the right of way were filed with the land office, money raised for the building of the line and contracts let for the grading, laying of track, etc. Work was taken

up six months ago and pushed until today the extension begins to look like a railroad. Unexpectedly the extension was blocked, for part of the Payette River Canyon around Horseshoe Bend was withdrawn by the Government from all forms of entry or use as a power site. The land is unsurveyed public domain and the Government used the conservation policy to conserve it. To change the right of way of the railroad would

be, it is claimed, prohibitive in cost. There is but one route to build into the country desired and that is through the canyon, but this the Government withdrew. The plats and profiles of the railroad were never accepted by the Government and until they are the road is held as a trespasser.
