

SHIELDS DENIES THREAT TO SHOOT

Lumberman Testifies Stephenson Supporter Tried to Intimidate Him.

ABSENTEE'S MEMORY FAILS

Democratic Assemblyman Who Aided Negatively in Election Holds Bribery Charges Were Unworthy of Denial.

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 20.—Robert J. Shields, mentioned in previous testimony as having been employed by Edward Hines, the lumberman, on special assignment, denied before the Senatorial investigation committee today that he had assisted improperly in the election of United States Senator Stephenson. He denied that he had anything to do with the agreement whereby Hines and Stephenson were each to contribute \$2,500 to "put over" the election, or that he received \$1500, or any other amount, as his share in such work. The witness admitted he received about \$700 to cover his expenses in working for Stephenson at the primaries in 1908, and that he was present at the joint session of the Legislature on March 4, 1909, when three Democratic members absented themselves and thus gave Stephenson a majority. He said that he did not know the Democratic members were absent until after the election.

'HEALER' LOSES TERPOT

Previous to Shields' Appearance, Wirt H. Cook, a Lumberman, of Duluth, Testified He Had a Talk with Shields on a Train Between Duluth and Chicago Late in 1908. Having in Mind a Story Told Him by Daniel Haley, Another Duluth Lumberman, that Shields Had a Dispute with Hines because Shields was to receive \$1500 for doing a job at Madison, but only got \$750 for it. Cook testified that he also told Shields, "How did you come out on that Madison job?" and Shields had replied: "That's all settled."

TURKS OPEN OUT

Italians Land at Benghazi After Sharp Battle.

VILLAGE TAKEN BY STORM

Expeditionary Force Gives Notice of Intention, to Which Garrison Refuses Reply—Town Is Held by 4000 Troops.

BENGHASI, Tripoli, Oct. 20.—The Italian fleet under Rear-Admiral Aubrey bombarded this city yesterday and landed 4000 men, who, after a brisk battle, occupied a portion of the town. The greater part of the troops, however, camped on the beach last night. The Turks refused to surrender and made stubborn resistance.

Wacker, the Mayor's new appointee, who was confirmed by the Council Monday night, to the police court, where Police Judge W. T. Nichols fined each man \$10 on his pleading guilty.

KLAMATH SCANS WATER

Ex-Postmaster Makes Investigation of Sources and Springs.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—Ex-Postmaster R. A. Emmitt, who was engaged by the city, at an expense of \$2500, to investigate the water sources for a purer Klamath Falls domestic supply a month ago, has at last made a report on his inspection. He examined a number of the best water sources of which he concludes the best is Sun Creek, altitude 200 to 600 feet, with a 5,000,000-gallon flow of pure water per day, mostly unappreciated.

TUALATIN PIONEER DIES

Nine Children Survive Mrs. Elizabeth Dooley of Banks.

FOREST GROVE, Or., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—Mrs. Elizabeth Hogan Dooley, 81 years old, a pioneer of the Tualatin Plains, died at her home, one mile south of Banks, Wednesday. Mrs. Dooley was born in Kentucky, October 14, 1830, and came to Oregon with her husband, Curtis Dooley, in 1869. They settled in one of the richest sections of the Tualatin Plains, where they resided continuously until their deaths. Mr. Dooley died in 1896.
