

WIFE TO TESTIFY TO SAVE HUSBAND

Trial of Slayer of Pugilist Affinity Is Begun at Prineville.

LONG CHASE BY AUTO TOLD

Mrs. Helen Riley, Over Whom Husband Shot and Killed Louie Long, to Tell Story of Boxer's Infatuation on Witness Stand.

PRINEVILLE, Or., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—Mrs. Helen Riley, on whose account her husband, J. P. Riley, shot and killed Louie Long, a pugilist, after a sensational pursuit of the couple in an automobile several months ago, will take the witness stand in an effort to clear him of a charge of murder.

There were several witnesses to the shooting, and all will be examined by the state. Riley, himself, may also go upon the stand in his own behalf.

SEWER PIPE IS UPHELD

GOAT HERD THIVES

George C. Brownell Has Thoroughbred Toggenburgs.

STABLE QUARTERS MODEL

Milk of Nannies Is Free From Tuberculosis, Does Not Sour Easily and Is Considered to Be Ideal Food for Infants.

OREGON CITY, Or., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—Probably the only herd of pure bred Toggenburg milk goats in Oregon are those owned by George C. Brownell at his "Oak Lawn" home at Concord, two of which are now giving from five to six quarts of milk a day.

Mr. Brownell has an ideal place for raising these animals. Since moving from Oregon City to Concord the goats have improved, as they are permitted to graze in parks constructed especially for them.

The barn in which they are kept at night was planned by Ambrose Brownell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Brownell. Four rooms lead from a hallway, which is used as a milking room and runway. In this room a platform has been constructed under the stairway leading to the second floor. During the milking hour the goat mounts the platform voluntarily, and is more easily milked than a cow.

The milk of the Toggenburg goats is exceedingly rich and nourishing, having the remarkable quality of being free from tuberculosis germs. It is considered far better for infants than cow's milk. Goat's milk is very palatable and nutritious and keeps sweet longer than cow's milk.

Mr. Brownell bought four goats—Blue Belle, Martha Washington, Hazel and Bonnavard—about three years ago from Howard & Hurd, of Redland, Cal. Blue Belle is of British-gray color, while the other three are of different shades of tan, resembling that of the deer. There are at present two kids among the flock, one of which, born June 1, has been named June Rose. The other is named Lassie.

The goats are great climbers, especially Martha Washington. Shortly before moving to Concord Mrs. Brownell heard a peculiar sound on the roof of her house, and going out to investigate, was horrified to see her most prized nannie standing on the ridge pole of the building and viewing the country from her elevated position. The animal was more than 40 feet from the ground. The goat could not be persuaded to leave its perilous position, seeming to enjoy the surrounding scenery, but Mrs. Brownell, fearing the animal would fall, sent her son to climb on the roof and take it down.

The goat, seeing the boy coming after it, took to its heels and scampered over the shingles as if it were walking on ground. After reaching the ledge of the roof it jumped to the ground, unhurt.

WOMEN OUTLINE VIEWS

MANY RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY CLUB DELEGATES.

Campaign Against Housefly and Protection of Forests Among Things Federation Urges.

ROSEBURG, Or., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—One of the interesting features of the annual convention of the Oregon State Federation of Women's Clubs just held at Roseburg was the stand taken by the delegates on questions of public interest. Several resolutions, outlining their position, were passed by the convention. Among them were the following:

Resolved, That the Oregon State Federation of Women's Clubs is responsible for the child labor law, and further, as the officers of the club, they shall endeavor to secure the enforcement of the child labor and the educational laws.

Resolved, That the club women do all in their power to advance the cause of the child, and to secure the enforcement of the child labor law, and to secure the enforcement of the educational laws.

Resolved, That there be created a State Board of Commissioners of Music, whose function shall be to examine and issue certificates to the teachers considered by them capable and eligible as private instructors in music, and to act as a committee on child labor, whose duty it shall be to assist the authorities, both of the schools and the commission, in the enforcement of the child labor and the educational laws.

Resolved, That we extend an expression of our appreciation to the citizens of this beautiful city of Roseburg, and especially to the merchants for their beautiful window displays, further, and especially to the speakers who have so ably assisted us in our programme.

Resolved, That the heartfelt thanks of this organization be extended to our esteemed president, Mrs. Sarah A. Evans, for the excellent and untiring devotion to the work of the Federation and her interest in and assistance to the clubs of the state.

Resolved, That the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs adopt the third Saturday of April as the state cleaning-up day, when every club in the state is asked to conduct a cleaning-up campaign in its city.

Resolved, That the Oregon State Federation send a letter of thanks to Mrs. Denison of California for the invitation to attend the biennial in June, 1912, upon our members the necessity of our meeting in the city of Roseburg, and that we go.

Resolved, That the public health committee of each club be urged to cooperate with the university of Oregon and make all possible use of the extension work prepared by them for the use of club and civic organizations.

RANCHERS ALONG CRATER LAKE ROAD TO PROTEST.

Residents Off Highway on Which Governor Would Work Prisoners.

Express Fear for Families.

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 20.—(Special.)—Residents in the vicinity of the Crater Lake highway, on which Governor West has promised to furnish convict labor during the winter, are not pleased with the Governor's suggestion.

According to reports received in Medford tonight the people of Trail and Prospect as well as the ranchers along the road are up in arms and intend to file a protest against the plan which, they say, will expose their property and wives and children to the depredations of criminals who are allowed to be in their neighborhood without guard and without restraint.

Governor West has submitted his offer and steps have been taken by the committee appointed by the Commercial Club and the County Court to import about 25 convicts by November 1.

The Governor has appointed Dr. J. F. Reddy to act as prison representative and take full charge of the men, Jackson County, if it agrees to the offer, will pay the men 25 cents a day and furnish them with board and lodging. The county will also have to pay the men's railroad fare. If the plan works the Governor declares the county can have men indefinitely.

He was rushed back to the city in an automobile, and the wound was dressed. The injury is not serious.
