It will be fully fireproof and one of the most modern buildings for department slore uses in the North-west. The company has been capital-faed at \$600,000 and virtually all of the

stock has been subscribed by Portland capitalists and business men. "We now have everything in shape to go ahead with our enterprise," said Mr. Holtz last night. "We have ample capital available to construct a fine building and to stock the store with merchandise. It will be our policy to carry popular-priced lines.

Street Canopy Planned.

The building will occupy the full quarter block, will contain seven stories and full basement. As the location is one of the best transfer cor-ners in the city we will have a metal canopy extending for the full width on both streets to provide shelter for ped-estrians. The tenants now occupying the two-story frame building will move next Wednesday when the work of wrecking the building will be started. It is intended to have the new building

it is intended to have the new building completed and ready for occupany before June 1, 1912."


