OTHER DELAYS POSSIBLE

Attorney-General Wickersham Does
Not Hope for Return to Com-
petitive Conditions Prevail-
ing Years Ago.

its, and that the Oil and Tobacco cases could fairly be called "models" for solving the trust question.

Mr. Wickersham was asked today if he hoped to see business return to conditions of competition which prevailed before the first trust came into existence.

"I do not," he replied. "I cannot, because I do not think it possible. We cannot return to our awfully clothes. We must readjust to a new set of conditions entirely."

"Do you think that can be done with-
in the present laws, without further up-
setting business?" he was asked.

"I hope so," replied the Attorney-
General, "but I do not know."

"It ought to be made clear," con-
tinued Mr. Wickersham, "that there is no conflict in the Steel case between the Department of Justice and the Stand-
ard Oil Company. The House of Repre-
sentatives, which has been investigating
the Steel Corporation. That com-
mittee has been conducting its investi-
gations to determine what legislation
may be desirable to meet the economic
question raised by trusts and combina-
tions; the suit filed by the Department
of Justice is a legal proceeding to com-
pel the observance of the law."

Consolidation Not Expected.
When the Attorney-General was
asked if he hoped the Steel Corporation
would voluntarily to adjust its organiza-
tion and avert a further prosecution, as
has been done by the International
Harvester Company, the Electrical
Trust, the Southern Grocers' Trust and
some other combinations, he intimated
that he expected no such conciliatory
move.

Some comment was occasioned by the
fact that the name of Solicitor-General
Lehmann does not appear on the com-
plaint. Rumor had it that Mr. Leh-
mann had not been identified in the
Government's bill because he was be-

ing considered for the vacancy in the
Supreme Court and that as a Justice
he might be called upon to sit in the
case.

"Rubbish," was Mr. Lehmann's only
comment when he heard this rumor. It
was pointed out that the office of Soli-
citor-General is so heavily taxed with
Supreme Court cases that it was impos-
sible for Mr. Lehmann to take charge
of the case, though he will be associ-
ated with it.

Dickinson's Position Like Kellogg's.
It was declared today that Jacob M.
Dickinson, ex-Secretary of War, who
has been engaged as the Government's
special counsel, would occupy the same
position against the Steel Corporation
that Frank B. Kellogg did in the
Standard Oil case.

Official Washington is still wonder-
ing how the preparations for the filing
of the bill were conducted with such
secrecy. The bill was not set in type
in the Government's printing office, as
such petitions usually are, but was
printed by the private concern that
prints the decisions of the Supreme
Court.

It was indicated at the Department
of Justice today that the Government
considers its case virtually complete.

LOWER COURT'S VIEWS KNOWN

Decree Dissolving Powder Trust Is
Guide to Future.

TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 27.—The legal
machinery set in motion here by the
Government against the United States
Steel Corporation was laid aside today,
awaiting word from Washington.

Three score of subpoenas to be served
upon defendants had not reached the
office of the United States Marshal.

Fourteen of the defendant corpora-
tions have officers or agents within the
state, and these will be served by the
Marshal of this district. Other sub-
poenas for individual defendants and
the remaining corporations outside the
state will be sent to the proper Mar-
shals.

District Attorney Vreeland was not
especially optimistic regarding the
prospects for a speedy decision of the
suit. In the present action there are 61
defendants and the amount of testi-
mony, he pointed out, would be great.

In the Powder Trust case, Judge
Lanning clearly indicated the position
of the three Judges who will sit in
this case. He said:

"If a corporation arbitrarily uses its
powers to force other competitors or to
coerce them into a sale or union with
the combination, it puts a restraint on
interstate commerce and in a sense
violates the anti-trust act. Our decree
must forestall future violations and
compel the dissolving of the combina-
tion now existing."

Tobacco Trust Sells Cigar Concern.
NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 27.—Announce-
ment was made today that the Her-
mann Company, Limited, of this city,
manufacturers of cigars, had been dis-
posed of by the American Tobacco Com-
pany. This is said to be the first actual
severance of a subsidiary company
from the corporation now in process of
dissolution.

PEOPLE SELL STEEL

Wall Street in Flurry Follow-
ing Official Action.

SUPPORT IS IN EVIDENCE

Stock Drops to 50, but Rallyes at
Close—Other Issues Show Ef-
fect of Public Uncertainty
Over Outcome.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—There was a
wild rush to sell United States Steel
stock at the opening of the market to-
day as a result of the Government's
dissolution suit.

The common stock opened with the
sale of 28,899 shares and fell to 53 1/4,
a loss of five points. The preferred
stock fell 5 1/2.

Orders to sell the stocks had poured
in over night from every part of
the country who were alarmed by
the dissolution suit. When the gong
was sounded to announce the opening
of the market, such a din was made by
the shouting, struggling traders that it
was impossible for several minutes to
learn the course of the market.

The preferred stock, after breaking
5 1/2, rallied two points. The bonds
opened with a block of 100,000 at 100 1/4,
a decline of 1 1/4.

The general market was upset by the
excited trading in the steel securities.
The storm broke with renewed fury
after the first recovery in prices. The
selling being on an enormous scale and
the market became demoralized.

Stocks fell to lower prices than at
the opening. United States Steel
dropped to 51, a loss of 7 1/2 points, and
a new low record for the year, and near
the close declined to 50.

The preferred stock of the common
fell back to 103 1/4. Sales of the common
stock in the first hour of trading were
290,000 shares. Standard railway issues,
such as Union Pacific and Reading,
were forced down about three points.
Industrial stocks of all classes were
extremely weak.

The news of the dissolution suit
came yesterday sometime after the
stock market had closed, but it
brought many of the brokers back to
their offices in a hurry to play plans
for today's market and take advantage
of the earlier opening of the
foreign exchanges. Dealers in put and
call privileges were busy all night
sending orders to London.

Steel common stock closed yesterday
at 53 1/4 and the preferred stock at
103 1/4. As a basis for comparisons of
today's expected fluctuations, it was

remembered that in May, 1904, steel
common sold as low as 3 1/4, and that
about a year ago it touched 9 1/4 at
the culmination of a bull movement
based on the expectation of an advance
in the dividend.

SHAREHOLDERS ARE WARNED

One Thing to Bring Suit. Another
to Win It, Says Steel Director.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 27.—James H.
Reed, chairman of the board of direc-
tors of the Carnegie Steel Company
and a director of the United States
Steel Corporation, today said:

"I hope the thousands of small stock-
holders of the corporation will not be
stampeded into selling their stock at
a loss because of the suit, for they
must know it is one thing to bring a
suit and an entirely different thing to
win it."

"The corporation has tried to obey
the law and treat everybody fairly and
that ought to count for something in
a court of law not influenced by the
exigencies of politics."

Berlin Not Much Surprised.
BERLIN, Oct. 27.—News that the
United States Government has begun
its suit for the dissolution of the United
States Steel Corporation created little
surprise here. Skepticism is expressed
as to whether, in the long run, the
financial world will be seriously dis-
commoded by the anti-trust suits.

LAND GRANTS ARE SOUGHT

Teachers of Josephine County Adopt
Resolution at Session.

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 27.—(Special.)—
Resolved, That in the event of the
Oregon & California Railroad grant re-
verting to the United States Govern-
ment this organization respectfully re-
quests our Representatives in Congress
to use all honorable means to have said
lands granted in Oregon set aside for the
benefit of the public schools. Such
was a resolution passed by the teachers
of Jackson and Josephine counties at
the last session of the teacher insti-
tute in this city today. The adoption of
the resolution was unanimous.

The railroad grants in question are
those made to the railroads under the
name of the Oregon & California Rail-
road by the Government several years
ago. The action between the Govern-
ment and the railroads is now pending
in the Supreme Court and should they
revert to the Government, the teachers
of the state will ask that Congress
grant the land for school purposes.

Salem Greets Rail Chiefs.
SALEM, Or., Oct. 27.—(Special.)—
President Spruille and Vice-President
McCormick, of the Southern Pacific,
were the guests of Salem business men
and Governor West today. They were
taken about the city in automobiles
and later entertained at the Marion
Hotel.

3 OF CABINET QUIT

Criticism by Congress Leads
Mexicans to Resign.

ZAPATISTAS AT BOTTOM

One of Disgruntled Officials Min-
ister of War, Is Slated for Same
Berth When Madero Takes
Government.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 27.—Three Min-
isters tendered their resignations at an
animated meeting of the Cabinet last
night. It was learned today. They were
the Acting Minister of War, General
Gonzales Salas; the Minister of the In-
terior, Alberto Garcia Granados, and
the Minister of Public Instruction,
Francisco Vasquez Gomez.

Their action was a direct outcome
of the attack made on the Ministers of
War and the Interior at Wednesday
night's session of Congress, when an
explanation of the government's failure
to suppress the Zapatistas was de-
manded. It is believed that President
De la Barra will accept the resigna-
tions.

The resignation of General Salas was
not unexpected, in view of the hostile
reception given him in the Chamber of
Deputies, where he was charged with
the responsibility for the success of the
Zapatistas. Salas is slated for the
Ministry of War in the Madero Cab-
inet.

Madero Overtures Denied.
LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 27.—Deny-
ing that his trip from Mexico City to
the United States has political or diplo-
matic aspect, and declaring that if he
sees President Taft it will be merely
a personal call, Luis de la Barra, who
passed through Little Rock today, de-
clined any knowledge of reports that he
came to this country to make overtures
to President Taft in behalf of Francisco
I. Madero.

WOMAN WRITER SUICIDE

Marjorie R. Paine Ties Irons on
Self and Leaps Into Lake.

PROVO, Utah, Oct. 27.—Rowing out
alone into the deep waters of Utah
Lake to a spot where her craft was
observed from the shore line, Marjorie
R. Paine, prominent in literary circles

in Utah and for many years a dramatic
critic and special writer for the papers
of Salt Lake City, leaped from her
boat today and was drowned. The
woman had bound about her waist
strong cords to which was attached a
heavy railroad iron.

The empty boat drew the attention
of a launch party and the body was
recovered.

Dependancy is said to have been the
cause of the suicide.

VETERAN MARINER DIES

James T. Wayson, First in Steam
Revenue Service on Coast.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Oct. 27.—
James T. Wayson, 74 years old, chief
engineer in the United States Revenue
Cutter Service, retired, died today at
his home here.

Mr. Wayson entered the Revenue
Cutter Service in 1861, and in 1896
came around the Horn on the cutter
Lincoln the first steam cutter sent to
the Pacific Coast. He retired in 1892.
While stationed at Baltimore during
the civil war, he was one of the guard
of honor to protect President Abraham
Lincoln when he visited that city.

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador, Oct. 27.—Sev-
eral arrests have been made at Quito,
following the discovery of what is be-
lieved to have been a conspiracy in-
volving the assassination of President
Estrada and ex-President General
Plaza.

General Plaza was once Ecuadorian
Minister to the United States.
