MOUNT SCOTT LOOP CHANGES.

This change of route for Mount Scott streetcars is due to the congestion on Washington street and it is believed that by looping on Alder street considerable delay will be avoided and better time made between the city and the Mount Scott district.

COFFEY CONTINUES POLICY

Monthly Transfers of Patrolmen Arranged, Despite Criticism.

Undeterred by the opinions of police officials, Chairman Coffey, of the police commission of the Executive Board, is going ahead with his schedule of monthly transfers of all patrolmen and was busy yesterday putting the finishing touches on the first general shift, which is set down for November 1. The Commissioner sets at rest rumors that more than a transfer of policemen is contemplated. Chairman Coffey bases his reform upon the apparent justice of distributing impartially the desirable and undesirable jobs on the force by turns. He hopes by it to do away largely with favoritism. The policemen who are to be benefited are most opposed to the proposed change. They say that it will disorganize the force by taking men away from those places wherein they have proven themselves qualified and will detract from the flexibility which permits of changes to meet incidental conditions. Question now going about is what the chairman will do with the mounted squad. It has always been difficult to find men to ride the horses, and if these are to be affected by the monthly transfer, their successors are expected to do some fancy work in riding the fractious horses owned by the department.

PIONEER NUN IS DEAD

Sister Mary Febronla, One of Academy Founders in 1859, Is Called.

Sister Mary Febronla, a member of the Sisters of the Holy Names, died yesterday morning at Holy Names Convent, at Villa Maria, near Oswego, Or. Sister Febronla was one of the "pioneers" who founded St. Mary's Academy in Portland in 1859. The funeral mass will be said at 8:30 o'clock this morning. Interment will be made in Villa Maria Cemetery at 10 o'clock this morning.

The folk who sit on this side of the incandescent, applauding their favorite actor, who read all they can find about him, who often go further and seek his acquaintance or, less venturesome, write for his photograph, have really strange ideas of the inside affairs of the profession. Over those "on the outside looking in" is cast a spell of enchantment. To them the actor is surrounded by a glamour and they never dissociate the stage man from the characters he plays.

The public idea of him is a romping, harum-scarum chap, who splutters on little English constantly, makes wry faces and is eternally a "funny man." PULPIT IS QUITTED

Rev. A. J. Adams Intimates That Jealousy Prompts Step.

STORE POST OFFERED HIM

Declines to Discuss Trouble With Congregation—Employment as Collector Not Taken.

Rev. Andrew J. Adams, pastor of the Kern Park Christian Church, has resigned his position because of unpleasantness between him and church members. Mr. Adams declined last night to say what led to the separation, save that it was not serious. "There was a little jealousy in the church," he said. It is said that Mr. Adams resigned after repeated urging of his wife, but the clergyman denies that version. "Mrs. Adams wanted me to continue my pastoral work," he said. "I have not decided yet what I shall do. I have been offered a position as collector for a Portland department store, but have not yet accepted the place. I shall supply the pulpit of the Kern Park Christian Church for a few days, but shall not accept another permanent position as a preacher."

Mr. Adams remarked that he had undergone an operation a month ago, but when asked if his resignation came as a result of ill-health, he said that it was not wholly so. He said the question of salary did not enter into the case. The position pays \$1000 a year. The Kern Park Church, at East Sixty-ninth street and Forty-sixth avenue, is now seeking to obtain a minister from Cedar Rapids, Ia., the pastor there having been recommended by Rev. W. M. White, pastor of a large church in Cedar Rapids, and a friend of Rev. W. P. Reager of the First Christian Church in Portland.

LEWISTON NEXT GOAL

75 BUSINESS MEN TO JOIN IDAHO EXCURSION.

Plans Are Made at Commercial Club Luncheon for Junket in Behalf of League, November 5.

Portland business men will depart Sunday night, November 5, by special train for Lewiston, Idaho, to cement ties between Portland and the cities of Idaho. At least 75 business men will join the excursion, plans for which were made at a Commercial Club luncheon yesterday.

A movement has been on foot in Eastern Washington and Western Idaho for some time to organize a development league among the cities in that territory, and delegates from the different towns will meet in Lewiston November 6 and 7, to organize.

Tom Richardson has been visiting cities of Eastern Washington and Western Idaho in behalf of a unification of the cities. Mr. Richardson writes from Lewiston that Lewiston citizens plan to raise \$25,000 with which to construct their part of the work, and that \$21,000 has already been pledged. The league most likely will be centered in Lewiston.

It has been two years since Portland business men as a body visited the Lewiston territory, the occasion of that call being the opening of the bridge across the Snake River, between Lewiston and Clarkston.

Leaving Portland Sunday night, the excursionists will arrive in Lewiston the following morning, Monday, and Tuesday will be passed in and about Lewiston. They will leave Tuesday evening and arrive in Portland the following morning, if it is decided not to stop off Wednesday in Walla Walla. If Walla Walla is visited, the return to Portland will be delayed until Thursday morning.

A committee, at work yesterday arranging a schedule of costs, announced that accommodations and transportation might be less than \$30 for each person making the trip.

The meeting yesterday was called by C. C. Chapman, secretary of the Commercial Club, and W. E. Burrell was elected chairman of the committee in charge of the plans. Fund for Entertainment of Arctic Brotherhood Is Growing.

Returns from the committee that began canvassing for funds for the entertainment of the Arctic Brotherhood, its annual convention in this city, November 14-16, showed yesterday afternoon that the funds had reached a total of more than \$1000. A \$250 fund is required and the members of the committee hope to be able to raise the full amount within the next three days.

The convention of the Arctic Brotherhood will bring to Portland between 200 and 300 delegates, who are representative business men of British Columbia and Alaska.

DISPLAY CALLS OFFICIAL

Fred W. Graham of Great Northern to Attend New York Lapid Show.

Fred W. Graham, Western Industrial and Immigration agent of the Great Northern Railway, will leave tonight for New York, where he will attend the first annual land show to be given in the metropolis. The show will open November 3, and will continue until November 12.

The Great Northern has contracted for a display booth more than 100 feet in length, in which specimen products of Oregon and other Northwestern states will be exhibited. Agents of the road have been busy gathering these samples for the last three months and have succeeded in collecting a representative display from the agricultural, horticultural, dairying, stockraising

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and gardening districts of the state. In addition to the display the Great Northern will advertise the Northwest further by giving lectures in a room adjacent to the main exhibition hall. The collection of products will be taken from the New York show to Chicago and then to St. Paul, where similar exhibitions will be held.
