Ingham with an address on "The Benefit Derived by Reeping in Close Touch With the Station and National Work." Mrs. E. H. Tate, president of the Oregon Congress of Mothers, will be the last speaker of the morning session, her subject being "What is Your Greatest Problem in Parent-Teacher Circle Work."
