J. E. Godfrey, Democratic candidate for State Printer in the state election last year, was in Portland yesterlay from Salem on his way to Canyon City, where he will institute a Masonic lodge. Before leaving for Eastern Common last night he suprounced that Oregon last night be announced that he would be a candidate for election as one of the ten delegates Oregon Democrats are entitled to name for their National convention.

Bryan Favored Lender. "I am not necessarily for Bryan as the Democratic nomines for Presi-dent," explained Mr. Godfrey, "but I shall support for President in the con-vention only that candidate whom Bryvention only that candidate whom larg-an wants if he is himself not a can-didate. Democrats feel that they will next year have a chance to elect a Fresident and, in my optnion, Mr. Bryan is entitled to first consideration in determining upon the party's nami-

nes.
"If Bryan does not want to be the nomines himself, his choice should be accepted as the logical candidate, as we can only expect to win by naming as the candidate a man who is ac-ceptable to Bryan and who can count on the enthusiastic support of the Ne-

on the entiminatio support of the Sebraskan."

It is understood that C. L. Roames, of Medford, a prominent Southern Oregon Democrat, will also be a candidate for election as delegate to his party's National convention. Although he has not announced his position, it is reported that Mr. Reames entertains similar views to those of Mr. Godfrey.

Democrats are pretty much agreed that Senator Chamberlain and Governor West will be two of their delegates to the National convention, regardless of the choice of the Oregon Democracy for the Presidency. Chamberlain and West are understood to favor Wilson for the Presidency.

Other prominent Democrats whose

Other prominent Democrate whose names undoubtedly will appear on the ballot as candidates for delegates are; Dr. Harry Lane, Alex Sweek. John B. Ryan, John H. Stavenson, C. E. S. Weed, F. V. Holman, Oglesby Young and R. D. Imman, of this city, and Dr. C. J. Smith, of Pesideton. The record shows that 11 places were alleged to be disorderly, as against 15 the proceding month; ten inmates were arrested, as against 51 in September, while three men charged with being parasites and two with taking the sarnings of immoral women were in custody, compared with ten arrests for these of-

fenses in September.
