

LUMLER EXPORTS SHOW INCREASE

Shipments to California Ports Gain 30,000,000 Feet Over Last Year.

COMPARISONS PROVE FACT

Prospects, However, Are That for First Half of Year This Season Will Lead Over That of Previous Months' Reports.

Comparative figures of lumber forwarded to California ports by water for the first quarter of the current year credit the present season with an increase of 30,000,000 feet over the same period in the preceding season and it is the gain of 30,572,964 feet over the first quarter of the 1910-11 season.

On the total shipments, foreign and coastwise, the present season leads that of the corresponding quarter in 1909-10 by 18,729,621 feet, but falls short of the initial quarter last season by 14,126,971 feet.

In shipping quantities little change is felt because of the decrease, as the 1910-11 season was a record-breaker for those months and at the outset of this season it is expected that the combined movement would be more than half as heavy.

With the clearance yesterday of the Norwegian steamer Guernsey for Alaska with 124,428 feet of lumber valued at \$41,934, November is already ahead of the corresponding period last year, for with the cargo of the British steamer Robert Dollar 481,423 feet has been exported, against 447,331 feet last November.

December was an average month, January decidedly poor and February shipments were not heavy, so the prospects are that for the first half of the year this season will lead.

MAYOR FAVORS MAIN SEWER

Outlet North of City Limits Is Advocated by Rushlight.

Pronouncing sewerage conditions along the waterfront as the worst he ever saw, Mayor Rushlight said on his return from a trip along the docks yesterday morning that he would recommend that a main outfall sewer be constructed along Fourth street into which all West Side sewage should be discharged, and the outlet beyond the northern limits of the city.

"Sewage from hospitals, hotels, restaurants and taverns not expected that the West side of the harbor the most unsanitary now, while the East Side has not such a general situation to contend with," he said.
