Indignation in England at Alleged Atrocities by Italians Grows.

REPORTS DECLARED TRUE

Voluntary Member of Turkish Army, in Message to News Agency, Deplores Acts of Invading

LONDON, Nov. 3.-The agitation against alleged atrocities by Italians Tripoli, which has sprung up in the British press and is supported by a few members of the House of Comme since unconsored reports arrived here English newspaper correspond-received fresh impetus tonight through a telegram received by a news agency from Herbert Montague, a Lieutenant of the Fifth Fusiliers, with the Turk-Arab forces Lieutenant Montague telegraphed from Honkel Yohma by way of De Hibal, on the frontier, as follows:

"I feel it my duty to send to you the following telegram and heg you in the name of Christianity to publish it throughout England. I am an English officer now voluntarily serving in the Turkish army here.

Italy's Enemies Brave.

"As you know aircady about the ferocious resistance which the Turks and Arabs are offering the Italians, I will only express my admiration for their bravery and fortitude, which would warm the heart of any Englishman or any true soldier in the world.

Timagine my feeling on entering and driving the Italians out of Arab houses which they had fortified and were holding, we discovered the bodies of some 120 women and children with their hands and feet hound, mutilated, pierced and torn. Later on at—the name of the town was lost in transmission—we found a mosque filled with mission—we found a mosque filled with hodies of women and children, muti-lated almost beyond recognition. It was impossible to count them, but there must have been 200 or 400.

Englishman Is Indignant. To this European war are such crimes to be committed? Cannot England do something to stop such horrors? In our civilization and time, you can hardly believe it, but it is true nevertheless. I myself have seen it, so I know.

"Even now we are getting news of further massacres of women and chil-dren who were discovered on different farms lately occupied by Italians. The idea of the Italians when they slaugh-tered the innocent obviously was one of revenge for their heavy losses in battle.

"We are at this moment under a heavy shrapnel fire, so you must excuse me if those sentences are somewhat disjointed. There is an accoplane circling over our position and directing the enemy's fire on us."

Inventors Consider It Will Be Best Thing of Its Kind for Several Years to Come-Stability Device Substillary.

DATTON, O. Nov. 1 .- (Special)-The Wright brothers, aeroplane in-

satisfactory, said orvine wight, encounting his flight. They have been far beyond my expectations. I went to Kitty Neck simply to carry out some ideas I had worked out here at home concerning gliding machines. As a matter of fact, I was not very optimistic about extensive success. But after I had rearranged a number of defirst I had rearranged a number of after I had rearranged a number of tails, I succeeded in keeping the craft in the air for such a long period. Our success is due to the fact that the craft is exceptionally efficient. By efficiency, I mean that all its parts are balanced so as to make a parfect lift ing vehicle.

"Efficiency" Is High. "When an aviator speaks of affi-ciency, he means the capability of an aeroplane to fly with the least amount of motive power. He has in mind the souring qualities of an aeroplane. I can truly say that our craft is enormously efficient. I don't mean to claim that we can fly without power, but I do mean that our machine can fly

but I do mean that our machine can fly
with less power than any other.
"Under certain conditions I am certain that the ideas we have developed
during the past few weeks would enable us to build a machine which
would fly with even less horse power.
I know that we could fly for an hour
without power, given proper atmospheric conditions, and I see no reason
why we cannot fly for 10 hours if we
have flown for one minute. It is sim-

why we cannot fly for 10 hours if we have flown for one minute. It is simply a question of the time, the place, the wind and the machine.

'In order to make extensive power-less flights, however, the craft would have to be built more strongly. At the present time such construction is now economical. Owing to the state of the economical. Owing to the state of the skill of aviators it would cost them too much to pay for the frequent breakage of an expensive craft.

Present Type Is Good, "But I don't wish to give the impression that I think the present machine in use is defective. It is my opinion that our late type of biplane is about as good as any craft will be for many years to come. It files with less power than any craft in existence: it is strong and durable, and it is succeptible of almost perfect control. When some of

most perfect control. When some of the things I have discovered here are incorporated in the craft, I don't think it will easily be surpassed.

"I do think that the future of the asreplens depends to a cettain extent upon the future of the motor. Not that I want to say that the present motor is lacking in any serious manner. I think the meter of the present is just as perfect as the human machine. But I do believe that, with natural evolution, motors will be made to deliver more power and will be built more compactly. There are many features compactly. There are many features of the motor that will be refined.

Stability Device Subsidiary. "Our experiments have been very satisfactory," said Orville Wright, discussing his flight. They have been far beyond my expectations. "I think it is now about the time for every Italian to protest against the dally knocking on the part of some of the American press in regard to the Turko-Hallan war and I feel it my duty

Turko-Italian war and I feel it my duty as an Italian and as a lover of what is usually called 'a fair deal,' to do so. "Those of us who are able to read the American newspapers (and we are many) have laughed so far at the reports of cruelty committed by Italians towards Turks and rebel Arabs, because we know our own people and we know the sense of generosity and kindness characteristic of the Italian soldiers in time of war.

"The Italian army is known all over the world to be one of the best disciplined, and cruelty in this case would be nothing else but the effect of complete lack of discipline.

"Italy has occupied Tripoli to establish there after centuries of oppression a better and more humans government.

a better and more humans government, abolishing slavery, helping commerce, developing by means of her unsur-passed farmers the fertility of the land.

passed farmers the fertility of the land, and trying to make that land what the ancients used to call 'the granary of Rome.'

"Henceforth we who are able to read and understand the American newspapers cannot but smile at the cable-grams of the 'United leased wire' which have already misled its readers in one recent instance by announcing the marriage of our Dowager Queen Margherita with a post of world-wide reputation, who passed away many years ago. The only explanation we can give
