

# BRITON TELLS OF CRUEL MASSACRES

### Indignation in England at Alleged Atrocities by Italians Grows.

## REPORTS DECLARED TRUE

Voluntary Member of Turkish Army, in Message to News Agency, Deplores Acts of Invading Force in Tripoli.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The agitation against alleged atrocities by Italians in Tripoli, which has sprung up in the British press and is supported by a few members of the House of Commons since uncensored reports arrived here from English newspaper correspondents, received fresh impetus tonight through a telegram received by a news agency from Herbert Montague, a lieutenant of the Fifth Fusiliers, with the Turk-Arab forces. Lieutenant Montague telegraphed from Souk Yehma by way of De Hibal, on the frontier, as follows:

"I feel it my duty to send to you the following telegram and beg you in the name of Christianity to publish it throughout England. I am an English officer now voluntarily serving in the Turkish army here.

### Italy's Enemies Brave.

"As you know already about the ferocious resistance which the Turks and Arabs are offering the Italians, I will only express my admiration for their bravery and fortitude, which would warm the heart of any Englishman or any true soldier in the world.

"Imagine my feeling on entering and driving the Italians out of Arab houses which they had fortified and were holding. We discovered the bodies of some 120 women and children with their hands and feet bound, mutilated, pierced and torn. Later on at the name of the town was lost in translation—we found a mosque filled with bodies of women and children, mutilated almost beyond recognition. It was impossible to count them but there must have been 300 or 400.

### Englishman is Indignant.

"In this European war are such crimes to be committed? Cannot England do something to stop such horrors? In our civilization and time, you can hardly believe it, but it is true nevertheless. I myself have seen it, so I know.

"Even now we are getting news of further massacres of women and children who were discovered on different farms lately occupied by Italians. The idea of the Italians when they slaughtered the innocent obviously was one of revenge for their heavy losses in battle.

"We are at this moment under a heavy shrapnel fire, so you must excuse me if these sentences are somewhat dejected. There is an aeroplane circling over our position and directing the enemy's fire on us."

Lieutenant Montague's message is dated November 3.

## RECALL OF MAYOR ASKED

### Colorado Springs Executive Charged With Neglect and Incompetency.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Nov. 3.—An affidavit asking for the recall of Mayor Avery was filed with the City Clerk this afternoon. It was sworn to by C. J. Tiffany, who affirms that he is a qualified elector of the city and also affirms eight grounds on which he asks that Mayor Avery be recalled, as follows:

"Incompetence and unfitness for said office; abuse of the appointive power by selecting, for municipal positions, persons most unfit for office; refusal and neglect to enforce the criminal laws of the city; failure to enforce, especially, the laws and ordinances; that his continuance in said office is a detriment to the business interests and welfare of the city; in polluting and draining, and allowing to be drained, and wasted, large quantities of the water of the city; usurpation of power not legally possessed by him; failure to carry out the provisions of the charter of the city."

## INVALID WOMAN TO VOTE

### Vancouver Suffragist, Although Paralyzed, Registers.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 3.—(Special.)—Desiring to register to vote at the coming municipal election, the campaign of which is the warmest and most vigorously fought in many years, Mrs. Sarah Hahn, of East Thirtieth street, through family and political acquaintances, wrote her name, was taken to the City Hall today to register.

When she was asked the questions she answered them, but when asked to sign her name she merely touched the pen with a cross "her mark (X)" being made by Miss Kathleen Clancy, Deputy Clerk. Mrs. Hahn was taken to the City Hall in an automobile and friends assisted her to the registry window.

## WATER PROJECT ABSORBS

### Prosper Falls Irrigation System Enters Sunny-side Unit.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Nov. 3.—The secretary of the Interior has formally approved the transfer to the United States of the irrigation system of the Prosper Falls Land & Power Company, in Benton County, Washington, together with 24 second cubic feet of water. The property is to be incorporated into the Sunny-side unit of the Yakima project. No cash consideration was involved in the transfer being made on the basis of credit on water rights under the Government system.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 3.—(Special.)—The members of Kuntuz Tribe No. 3, Redmen, tonight formally dedicated their new hall in the Covert & Carter building, on Main street, between Fourth and Fifth streets, by holding a pow-wow. A. Padden, J. J. Sexton and E. H. Wright. A. W. Calder is sachem of the local tribe.

## GLIDER IS SUCCESS

### Wrights Satisfied With Kitty Neck Experiments.

## MACHINE MOST EFFICIENT

### Inventors Consider It Will Be Best Thing of Its Kind for Several Years to Come—Stability Device Subsidiary.

DAYTON, O., Nov. 3.—(Special.)—The Wright brothers, airplane inventors and aviators, are highly gratified with the results of their recent experiments with their new glider at Kitty Hawk, N. C. They believe that the experiments conducted there will have a vital influence on the future of aerial transportation.

The climax of the gliding, pain-taking tests occurred when Orville Wright caused his motorless biplane to hover over a spot only 12 feet in diameter for more than 10 minutes. "Our experiments have been very satisfactory," said Orville Wright, discussing his flight. "They have been far beyond my expectations. I went to Kitty Hawk simply to carry out some ideas I had worked out here at home concerning gliding machines. As a matter of fact, I was not very optimistic about extensive success. But after I had rearranged a number of details, I succeeded in keeping the craft in the air for such a long period. Our success is due to the fact that the craft is exceptionally efficient. By efficiency, I mean that all its parts are balanced so as to make a perfect lifting vehicle.

### "Efficiency" is High.

"When an aviator speaks of efficiency, he means the capability of an aeroplane to fly with the least amount of motive power. He has in mind the soaring qualities of an aeroplane. I can truly say that our craft is enormously efficient. I don't mean to claim that we can fly without power. But I do mean that our machine can fly with less power than any other.

"Under certain conditions I am certain that the ideas we have developed during the past few weeks would enable us to build a machine which would fly with even less horse power. I know that we could fly for an hour without power, give proper atmospheric conditions, and I see no reason why we cannot fly for 10 hours if we have flown for one minute. It is simply a matter of time, the place, the wind and the machine.

"In order to make extensive powerless flights, however, the craft would have to be built more strongly. At the present time such construction is now economical. Owing to the state of the skill of aviators it would cost them too much to pay for frequent breakage of an expensive craft.

### Present Type is Good.

"But I don't wish to give the impression that I think the present machine, as it is, is my opinion that our late type of biplane is about as good as any craft will be for many years to come. It flies with less power than any craft in existence; it is strong and durable, and it is susceptible of almost perfect control. When some of the things I have discovered here are incorporated in the craft, I don't think it will easily be surpassed.

"I do think that the future of the aeroplane depends to a certain extent upon the future of the motor. Not that I want to say that the present motor is lacking in any serious manner. I think the motor of the present is just as perfect as the human machine. But I do believe that, with natural evolution, motors will be made to deliver more power and will be built more compactly. There are many features of the motor that will be refined.

### Stability Device Subsidiary.

"Concerning the automatic stability device which has been so over-emphasized in the press, I can only say that we regard it as subsidiary. Our machine is practically automatically balanced now. It can't turn turtle if properly arranged. The pendulum device and the aileron contrivance, operated by compressed air, are old ideas which we had no purpose of trying out at Kitty Hawk.

"The device we wanted to try is a simple affair which can be rigged up out of any material in 10 minutes. We will test it here at Dayton."

### Whitman Practices at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 3.—(Special.)—Whitman College football squad of 15 players and Coach Hahn arrived this morning from Walla Walla and held signal practice on the Vancouver High School athletic field for an hour. William Nell, right tackle, lives in Vancouver. Edson Johnson, one of the Whitman stars last year, was not allowed to play this year because he has become a professional by trying out in the Northwestern League during the summer vacation. The Whitman team left this afternoon for Eugene, to play the University of Oregon tomorrow.

## STEINER "AHEAD OF GAME"

### Insane Hospital Shows \$6000 to Good Over Maintenance Fund.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 3.—(Special.)—According to a statement given to the State Board today by Superintendent Steiner, of the asylum for the insane, that institution is \$5988 ahead of its maintenance, proportionate to the month-to-month maintenance based on the original appropriation, but this excess will be eaten into with the advance of the winter months.

The original maintenance appropriation was \$678,000 and of this \$231,510 has been expended, leaving a balance on hand of \$238,489. On this basis, for the remaining 14 months of the biennial period, if a similar rate of expenditure were followed, there would be \$14,000 remaining at the end of the two years, but this is doubtful, owing to the necessity of increased expenditures.

"There will be no deficit," said Dr. Steiner. The board has declared there should be none and, if necessary, some of the patients will have to be turned out and others refused.

During the last month a decrease of five patients is shown from the previous month, 45 having been discharged or died and 40 being received. The total number of patients is now 1285.

## 600 STORES CONTROLLED

### Five and Ten Cent Chain to Be Under One New Corporation.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—F. W. Woolworth announced today that a new corporation is about to be formed under the name of F. W. Woolworth Company, to take over the business conducted in various cities under the corporate or firm names of F. W. Woolworth & Co., S. H. Knox & Co., F. M. Kirby & Co., E. P. Charlton & Co., C. S. Woolworth, W. H. Moore and W. H. Moore & Son, and also a controlling interest in the English business of F. M. Woolworth & Co., Limited. This company will own and control more than 600 5 and 10-cent stores, doing business in the United States, Canada and England.

The capital is to be \$15,000,000 in 7 per cent preferred stock, and \$50,000,000 in common stock.

## RED HATS WAIT IN ROME

### Newly Appointed Cardinals Must Visit Holy See in Rome.

ROME, Nov. 3.—Pope Pius has decided that all of those to be created Cardinals November 29 must come to Rome to receive their red hats; that is, all except the Spanish and Austrian candidates, who by the laws of their countries must receive the azzurra through their sovereigns.

The Pope wishes to avoid the period between this constituency and another later, during which, otherwise, the new Cardinals would hold the office without the formal and official sanction.

## EXTRA SESSION IS CALLED

### California to Enact Laws to Fit Amendments Recently Passed.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Nov. 3.—After a conference with leading members of the State Senate and Assembly, Governor Johnson decided today to call a special session of the Legislature, to begin on December 10.

### Dunlway Motion Overruled.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 3.—(Special.)—Judge Kelly in Circuit Court yesterday overruled the motion of State Printer Dunlway's attorneys in the forcible entry and detainer case brought by Secretary Olcott to oust the State Printer from the State Capitol, the motion being for the plaintiff to distinguish between the Secretary of State Olcott and the State of Oregon in the pleadings, or in other words, to make the complaint either come from Olcott or from the State of Oregon. He gave 10 days in which to answer.

## WAR NEWS SOUGHT

### Portland Italians Arrange for Special Service.

## PART OF PRESS CRITICISED

### Fund is Raised by Local Colony to Get Direct Communications From Premier—Army Invading Tripoli is Extolled.

Arrangements have been completed by the local Italian colony for direct telegraphic communication with Premier Giolitti at Rome, to get direct information regarding the progress of the war with Turkey. The colony has raised a fund to bear the expense of the messages. The first cable message was sent Thursday and the following message was received in return:

Rome, Nov. 3.—Mario Montezza, Portland, Or.: News published there absolutely false. Italian arms always victorious by sea and land. After October 28, date on which a real battle was fought and in which enemy lost ground, there has been no other battle. (Signed) Premier Giolitti.

The fund is in charge of Mario Montezza, editor of L'Italia, the local Italian newspaper. The direct communication system was inspired by the reports published in a local newspaper that the commander-in-chief of the Italian troops, General Canova, had been taken prisoner and that Tripoli was about to be retaken by the Turks.

### Portland Resident Protests.

The following letter has also been received by The Oregonian from Umberto Cervello, of Portland:

"I think it is now about the time for every Italian to protest against the daily 'knocking' on the part of some of the American press in regard to the Turko-Italian war and I feel it my duty as an Italian and as a lover of what is usually called 'a fair deal,' to do so.

"Those of us who are able to read the American newspapers (and we are many) have laughed so far at the reports of cruelty committed by Italians towards Turks and rebel Arabs, because we know our own people and we know the character of the Italian soldiers in time of war.

"The Italian army is known all over the world to be one of the best disciplined and bravest in this case would be nothing else but the effect of complete lack of discipline.

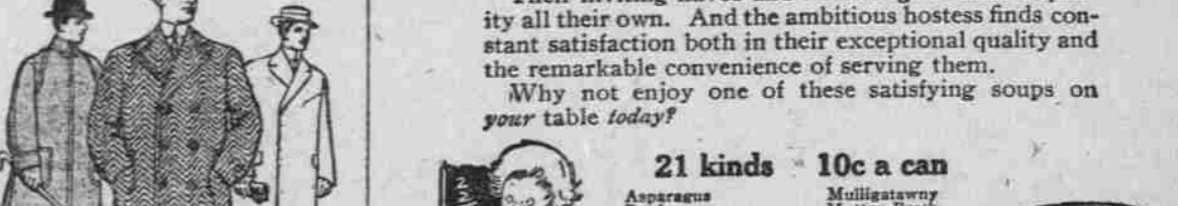

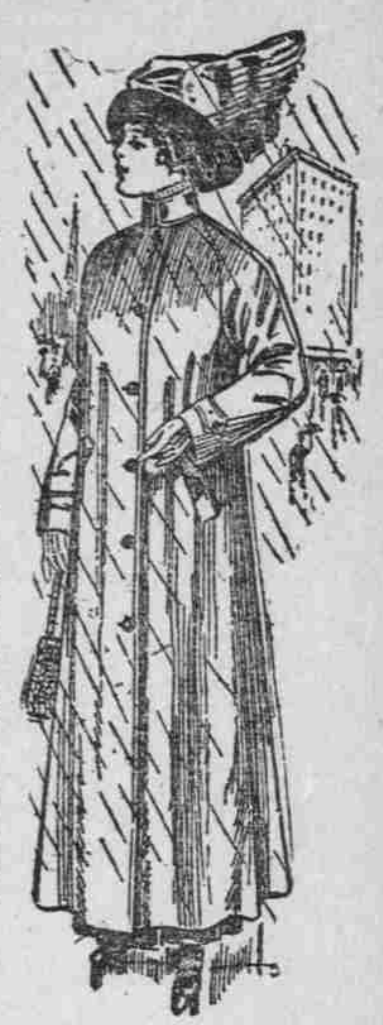
