

BLOW AT MORMONS IS AIMED IN GIFT

Foes of Denomination Present
Battleship Utah With
Silver Tray.

USE IS STRONGLY URGED

Representatives of American Party
in State Whose Name New Craft
Bears Offers Substitute for
"Brigham Young" Dish.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—There was another presentation ceremony aboard the battleship Utah this afternoon when the National anti-Mormon committee gave the ship's mess a silver tray which they hoped would be used instead of one bearing a small picture of Brigham Young, early leader of the Mormon Church.

The "Brigham Young tray," as the committee has called the piece in its appeal, was presented yesterday with 111 other pieces of the magnificent service given by the people of Utah.

In place of the pictures of Brigham Young and the Mormon Temple, which appear on the original tray, the substitute bears the symbolic figure of a young girl, representing Utah. The tray bore the following inscription: "Presented to the United States battleship Utah by members of the American party in the State of Utah, as an expression of their loyalty to the state and to the Constitution and democratic customs of the United States of America."

The ceremony was in the main salon of the Utah, at the Navy Yard. Mrs. Erna von R. Owen, chairman of the committee, made the presentation. Speeches were made also by Dr. Walter Laidlaw, of New York; Josiah Strong, president of the Society for Social Service, and Mrs. Donald McLean, president of the Daughters of the Revolution. The committee today gave out copies of a telegram sent to the Secretary of War and the reply. The first telegram read:

"George von L. Meyer, Secretary of the Navy, United States ship Mayflower. The undersigned, as a committee representing citizens and the American party in Utah, respectfully request you to authorize the commanding officer of the battleship Utah to receive at their hands a silver platter presented as an expression of loyalty to the state."

This was signed by Mrs. C. E. Allen, Helen Miller Gould, Alexander M. Hadden, Mrs. Gilbert Jones, Walter Laidlaw, Mrs. Cunningham Story, Ida Tarbell, Mrs. Donald McLean, Mrs. C. H. evil. I see a good many well-fed lawyers here and have fear of the future. I am coming back to compete for business with Governor Harmon and Senator Foraker."

In Music Hall Mr. Taft spoke at length in behalf of the proposed arbitration treaties with Great Britain and France. He said there was nothing inconsistent in his demand that the Panama Canal be fortified and that the Senate ratify these treaties.

Fortification is Common Sense. "We ought to use common sense in everything," said the President. "We ought to fortify the Panama Canal to keep it for ourselves and to prevent it from falling into the hands of the enemies."

The President reiterated his theory of peace at the session of the Arbitration Society. The conference was opened with an address by John Hays Hammond.

"In time of peace, prepare for war," was the opening sentence of Mr. Hammond.

The great Christian nations of the world were today spending for armed peace upward of \$1,500,000,000 annually, Mr. Hammond said. He added:

"It is a futile expenditure in that it serves no useful purpose. It is indeed a foolish expenditure, in that the object for which it is designed, navy supremacy, is not gained, since no radical changes are permanently effected in the relative strength of the armaments of the competing countries."

Treaties Are Step Forward. "Present conditions, however, preclude the possibility of international disarmament, and, indeed, render extremely improbable even the limitation of armaments."

The ultimate solution of this great problem is unquestionably the establishment of a permanent court of arbitration; but this cannot be done except as we solve, step by step, the intricate problems that confront us."

Continuing Mr. Hammond said: "In the Anglo-American and Franco-American arbitration treaties a long step has been taken in the right direction. While it is true the Senate has not ratified these treaties, the pressure of popular demand undoubtedly will induce favorable action at an early date."

Jacob Gould Shurman, president of Cornell University, advocated the ratification of the treaties.

CHESTER DOES NOT TARRY

American Consul at Tripoli Says He Is Not in Need of Help.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—The scout cruiser Chester, which was sent from Malta to Tripoli by the State Department for the avowed purpose of ascertaining the extent of the cholera outbreak, has completed her mission and is on her way to Marsailles.

American Consul Wood, at Tripoli, said he stood in no need of help and rather than jeopardize the health of the ship's company, Commander Decker sailed for Marsailles, which is reported free from cholera.

ONE OF DISCOVERERS OF RADIUM WHO HAS BEEN AWARDED NOBEL PRIZE FOR CHEMISTRY.

MME. CURIE WINS

One of Discoverers of Radium Gets Nobel Prize.

CHEMISTRY AWARD MADE

Remarkable Woman Is Chief Professor of Sciences in University of Paris—Recent Success Was Polonium Production.

STOCKHOLM, Nov. 7.—The Nobel prize for chemistry has been awarded to Mme. Marie Sklodowska Curie, of the University of Paris.

Mme. Curie is the chief professor of sciences in the University of Paris. She was the discoverer, with her husband, Professor Pierre Curie, of radium, and in 1903 shared with him half of the Nobel prize for physics, the other half being awarded to Professor Antoine Henri Becquerel. Each of the five Nobel prizes awarded annually amounts to \$40,000.

Recent announcement was made of the success of Mme. Curie in producing polonium, "a new element possessing a radio-activity superior to radium."

HATS USED AS FILTERS

Frenchman Gains Idea for Invention From Sister-in-Law.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—(Special.)—A dainty woman's hat of the fashionable plover shape has led to the invention of an ingenious military filter which may save lives on active service. The idea was first suggested to Dr. Frederick Alexander, the medical officer of health for Poplar—who has patented this improved apparatus for straining water—by the hat his sister-in-law wore.

Four or five cone-shaped bags like plover hats are suspended upside down, one above the other, in an easily portable pyramidal frame made of four uprights of wood or metal in Dr. Alexander's invention.

Muddy or dirty water, which is frequently the only supply available to troops on active service, can then be poured into the topmost hat with the certain knowledge that by the time it has trickled through all the straining-bags it will be as clear as crystal.

"The idea of these cone-shaped bags," said Dr. Alexander, laughing, "was given to me by my sister-in-law's plover hat after I had been reading a book on military requirements. It is quite simple."

WHEAT HOLDER LETS GO

Lichstein Sells 100,000, After Refusing Bid for 5,000,000.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—A. J. Lichstein, who is credited with being one of the largest holders of cash wheat in the United States, today sold 100,000 bushels of No. 2 red winter wheat to millers at 54c under the May option. These are his own terms after having refused a remarkable offer from the millers for 5,000,000 bushels under his price. It was announced that within the last week he had disposed of 4,000,000 bushels without being forced to alter his terms.

The 5,000,000-bushel bid, possibly the largest ever made for a single transaction in wheat, was refused by Lichstein because the figures did not meet his views by 1/2 of a cent a bushel.

There is no local government worthy of the name. The soldiers recognize no authority, but remain quiet. Public sentiment is revolutionary, but apparently peacefully disposed. Several hundred young men of good families have banded together and assumed the responsibility of maintaining order.

GENERAL MURDERED IN TENT

Manchus Slay Officer They Believe Was in League With Rebels.

PEKIN, Nov. 7.—General Wu Lu Chang, a brilliant young military officer of Shensi province, was assassinated at 1 o'clock this morning. He was asleep in his tent at the military encampment at Shikui-Chuan when 30 Manchus rushed in past the guard and murdered him.

When officers of the General's staff arrested the Manchus the latter said Wu had gone over to the revolutionists and was secretly betraying the Manchus.

General Wu was educated in Japan and had risen rapidly since his return to China. He was liberal in his views and was always credited with sympathy with reform movements, although he was not an extremist.

Dispatches from Nanking say the Viceroy of Nanking committed suicide tonight.

The Viceroy's instructions from Peking had ordered him not to resist the revolutionists by force but to surrender peacefully. The Tartar General commanding the Manchus refused to obey these orders. A condition of panic prevails and the condition is serious.

DRAWBACK HELPS MILLS

FOREIGN PRODUCT ON EXPORT GETS REFUND OF DUTY.

Grain May Be Used in Conjunction With Domestic Purchase—One Per Cent Held Back.

LA CROSSE, Wis., Nov. 7.—Official interpretation from the Treasury Department of the details of the new provision of the Federal laws regulating the importation of wheat to be manufactured into flour for export was received here today. It construes the tariff act of 1909 in a manner gratifying to flour manufacturers of the Northwest.

The department ruling, contained in a letter to Representative Enoch and the Listman Mill Company, of this city, in its important provisions in part is as follows:

"Wheat may be imported, the duty paid thereon and the flour and by-products produced therefrom exported, with the benefit of a drawback equal to 99 per cent of the duty paid, under section 25 of the tariff act of August 5, 1909. In operating under this section it is not necessary to bond the mill, but the duties must be paid on the wheat imported. This wheat may be milled in conjunction with domestic wheat and the drawback obtained. The amount of duty paid, less 1 per cent, which is retained by the Government, is distributed to the flour and the by-products, according to the relative values thereof. If the flour and all by-products are exported, the entire 99 per cent of the duty is refunded. If the flour alone is exported and the by-products are retained in this country, only a portion of the duty is refunded, the amount refunded depending on the relative values of the flour and the several by-products."

"Wheat also may be imported and milled in conjunction with domestic wheat and the tariff act of August 5, 1909. In this case no duty is paid on the imported wheat, but the mill must be bonded and the milling done under Government supervision. A storekeeper should be provided."

SINGLE VOTE FOR EACH MAN FAVORED

Asquith Announces Intention to Introduce Suffrage Bill in Parliament.

WOMEN'S CAUSE PLEADED

Prime Minister Will Not Include Other Sex in Terms of Measure, but Room Will Be Left for Amendment.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—Premier Asquith announced in the House of Commons today that the government intended to introduce a manhood suffrage bill at the next session of Parliament.

Manhood suffrage means one vote for every adult male, with the exception of aliens, the insane and other persons usually disqualified by law. Under the present system, men maintaining several residences have the right to vote in each place.

A deputation composed of 80 members of Parliament memorialized Premier Asquith tonight in favor of adult suffrage for both sexes. Arthur Henderson, member of Parliament for Durham, pointed out that only 1,944,655 persons were enfranchised out of 45,000,000.

The Prime Minister said that the government was pledged to manhood suffrage and would introduce a bill to that effect, but it would not include women. The bill, however, he said, would be in such a form that the House could extend it to include women if the House so pleased.

HENWOOD GAINS DELAY

SUPREME COURT GRANTS WRIT, PENDING HEARING.

Charges That Perjury and Political Influence Caused Conviction Are Considered.

DENVER, Nov. 7.—The State Supreme Court granted a superadvisory today to Frank H. Henwood, convicted of second degree murder for the killing of George F. Copeland, a Cripple Creek smelterman, in the barroom of a Denver hotel last May. Copeland, a bystander, was struck by two of the five bullets fired by Henwood at S. I. VonPhul, the St. Louis balloonist, whom he also killed. Henwood was tried first on the Copeland charge and sentenced to life imprisonment.

Sensational charges of perjury and allegations that powerful political influence had been brought to bear in the trial in order to further the interests of John W. Springer, a leading Denver banker, in his divorce action, which grew out of revelations following the shooting of VonPhul, were contained in Henwood's application to the Supreme Court.

WEATHER BAD FOR GRAIN

Corn and Wheat States Suffer, but Cotton Is Benefited.

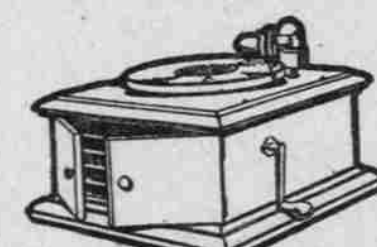
WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Unpromising weather in the corn and wheat growing states and favorable conditions in the cotton belt prevailed throughout October, according to the National monthly bureau bulletin, issued today. It says:

"In the principal corn and wheat-growing (winter) states, there was a great excess of cloudy weather which delayed Fall seeding to some extent and interfered somewhat with the curing and gathering of the corn crop, especially in portions of the Ohio Valley. No killing frosts occurred until too late to cause any material damage and the generally warm weather was favorable for the growth of Fall pasture and wheat."

"Over the Spring wheat section the weather was partly cloudy and too wet at times for outdoor work. No severe frosts were general until toward the latter part of the month."
