

KIGGINS JOSES VANCOUVER FIGHT

Bitter Political Campaign Ends Disastrously for 4th-Term Man.

DENTIST'S MAJORITY 250

E. H. Wright is Nominated at Primary Election for Councilman-at-Large—Sugg Named for City Attorney—Election Assured.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—Following a most bitter political campaign, John P. Kiggins, for three terms mayor of this city and a candidate for re-nomination, which means election, tonight met defeat for the office at the hands of Dr. Charles S. Irwin, a dentist, who has been a resident of Vancouver for 19 years past. Irwin's majority will not be over 250 votes.

One of the most peculiar features of the fight today was the fact that Irwin entered "the enemy's country" and carried Kiggins' own ward, East Vancouver, by forty votes.

The fight put up by Irwin was masterfully aided by the women of the city who turned out in force to cast their ballots, a total of 3000 votes being cast, out of 3500 persons registered.

The other successful candidates for office follow:

Councilman-at-large, E. H. Wright.

Councilmen, outside of wards, in the first, second and third wards, Fourth Ward, F. H. Whelan; Fifth Ward, Roy M. Wilkinson; Sixth Ward, George B. Sinner; City Clerk, Charles A. Hanson; City Attorney, R. H. Sugg; Treasurer, James P. Goughgan.

DRYS GET TOWN OF WOODBURN

People Also Vote Charter Amendment Authorizing New City Hall.

WOODBURN, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—At the city election here today the incumbent administration was endorsed by a strong vote and all officials were re-elected. The city also went dry again by 81 votes, there being 211 votes cast against license and 140 votes for license. A total of 415 was cast.

The following officials were elected: For Mayor, W. L. Jerman, with 224 votes, against O. A. Nedel, with 185 votes; for Councilmen, J. F. Hutzler, 222 votes, and P. A. Linsley, 211 votes; George Beach was defeated, receiving 188 votes; For Recorder, J. J. Stanger received 215 votes, against C. F. Whitman, with 170 votes; For Treasurer, George Landon was elected, without opposition, with 213 votes.

Amendments to the city charter carried by good margins, the principal ones authorizing the city to allow the city to build a city hall, which carried by a vote of 188 to 142, and an amendment providing strict regulation for the sale of intoxicating liquors and allow a dog but one saloon for each 750 population in the event of licensing saloons.

The election is considered a victory for the administration and an endorsement by the people of the prosecutions against the "Bachelors' Club." Great interest was taken in the election and a hard fight put up by the wets and drys.

JUDGE WILL BE PASCO'S MAYOR

Real Fight Centers in Election of City Attorney—Driscoll Wins.

PASCO, Wash., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—At the regular city primary election at Pasco today Judge J. H. Sylvester was nominated Mayor. E. A. Crooka, a railroad man, who had been the regular candidate on the ticket resigned therefrom at the opening of the polls, and Sylvester was elected principal challenger through "tickers." His only opponent was J. B. Kerfoot, a hardware merchant. The new Councilmen for the coming year elected were: E. G. Kerfoot, hardware merchant; V. B. Cox, real estate man; and X. R. Sylvester, real estate and insurance man; Dr. H. P. Murphy, Councilman-at-large; H. B. McFarland, Deputy County Treasurer, was elected City Treasurer, and L. H. Koonin, incumbent, City Clerk.

The real fight was centered in the election of a City Attorney and the opponents were: L. Driscoll and Charles W. Johnson. Mr. Driscoll was elected by a majority of 10 votes. Mr. Driscoll's splendid work during the last year in handling the local department of the city through the vast amount of important city improvement work which has been carried on here, gained for him the nomination.

The regular city election will be held on December 7 and as there is no opposition to the Progressive League ticket the above candidates undoubtedly will be elected.

SPRINGFIELD GOES "WET"

Welby Stevens is Nominated Mayor by Compromise Vote.

SPRINGFIELD, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—By a vote of 213 to 183 Springfield voted wet at the election today under the home rule amendment. The campaign while active and interesting was marked by few picturesque features, was of a friendly nature and left no bitterness. The question of the legality of the election is already in the court before Circuit Judge L. T. Harris and will undoubtedly reach the Supreme Court.

The municipal election was held at the same time. There was a compromise ticket composed of wets and drys, each pledged to abide by the final result, a Socialist ticket and one independent Councilman candidate. The compromise ticket was elected by the following vote: Mayor, Welby Stevens (Compromise), 213; Mr. Morrison (Socialist), 82; Recorder, John C. Mullin (Compromise) 241; J. C. Kennedy (Socialist), 152; Councilman, one year, G. W. Carson (Compromise), 174; J. B. Male (Socialist) 50; Charles Rivett (Independent), 160; two-year terms, A. J. Henderson and W. J. Lapsley (Compromise), 241 and 297 respectively; F. A. Fisher and H. J. Larkine (Socialist), 84 and 79 respectively.

F. E. Morrison (Compromise), was elected City Treasurer without opposition.

CANDIDATES ARE LINGING UP

G. T. Baldwin and W. Lair Thompson Mentioned for Congress.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—Interest is growing keener

In the campaign for Congress in the new Second District, which includes Lake and Klamath, among seven other counties. So far, in the local field there seems to be one possible candidate for the nomination, a Democrat, George T. Baldwin, of Klamath Falls. Mr. Baldwin has lived in Klamath County virtually all his life, is an ex-judge on the local bench, a shrewd and a good-roads worker.

SPOKANE BONDS DEFEATED

City Faces Problem in Vote Against Building City Hall.

SPOKANE, Nov. 7.—The voters of Spokane today for the second time defeated a proposed bond issue of \$500,000 for the erection of a new city hall.

WOMAN HEADS TICKET

OLYMPIA SOCIALISTS WANT SCHOOLMAM FOR MAYOR.

Democrats Vote for Second Best Republican Candidate at Primary Election—Clergy Busy.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—At the municipal primaries today, Dr. W. L. Bridgford was nominated for Mayor of Olympia on the Republican ticket, winning by a vote of 484 to 476 over J. B. Hawkins. The results show that the Democrats, who have one of the members, J. Daily, on the citizens' ticket, voted for Hawkins, who is considered a weak candidate and one easy for them to defeat at the general election, according to statements made tonight by leading Republicans.

The only other fight was for Councilman in the First Ward, where Robert Elwell won, with a total of 45 votes, winning by two votes over the next best man.

The Socialists at a convention tonight nominated Miss Frances Sylvester, a school teacher, for Mayor and Miss Bertrice Sharp, a statehouse stenographer, for Councilman-at-large. Mrs. E. W. Eddings has been nominated for Treasurer on the citizens' ticket. There were no contests on that ticket.

Five preachers and half a dozen laymen, with two women, held a convention this afternoon and nominated a ticket to be known as Independent headed by A. S. Caton, former Prohibition candidate for Governor. Nearly all the others nominated have ordered their names withdrawn. The women's vote was light. Less than 1000 out of a registration of 1350 voted.

ROSARIAN MEETS PLANNED

The Portland Rose Society will begin a series of meetings today, designed to quicken public interest in rose culture and to help the Rose Festival committee in obtaining support of the citizens of Portland for the next annual festival. This plan was decided on at a meeting in the office of Secretary Tucker yesterday. The first of the proposed series of meetings has been set for Monday, November 13, in the Y. M. C. A. building.

Papers on rose culture in its various phases will be read and addresses made by Mrs. A. C. Panton, president of the Portland Rose Society; F. V. Holman, W. M. Ladd, W. B. Sisson, W. E. Sherbrooke, Dr. S. S. Sullinger and Arthur Tucker, secretary of the society. The date for the 1912 rose show will be determined upon at that time.

RAILROAD CLERKS TO WED

Miss M. F. Caraher to Be Bride of G. A. Abramson.

A romance that developed in the Harriman railroad offices in the Walla-Fargo building will result today in the marriage of George A. Abramson and Miss Margaret F. Caraher, employees of the O. W. R. & N. Company. The ceremony will be performed at the home of A. B. Gaffney, a mutual friend, on East Fifteenth street.

Mr. Abramson, chief clerk to the superintendent of telegraph of the O. W. R. & N. Company, while Miss Caraher, until she resigned a few days ago to become Mrs. Abramson, was chief clerk in the freight accounting department. They first met five days ago when engaged in the performance of their duties.

After a brief honeymoon the couple will be at home in the Grand Oaks apartments on Grand avenue.

New York Birth Rate Jumps.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—The annual statistical reports of the New York health department shows 11,125 births as compared with 6,371 10 years ago. Deaths and marriages show small increases. The actual death rate has declined from 20.3 to 12 per thousand. Ninety persons were killed and 455 injured in automobile and cab accidents in New York City streets during the past 10 months.

FREED MAN FORGER

Albany Court's Leniency is Betrayed by Prisoner.

OTHER CRIMES REVEALED

Child Borne by Wife Does Not Halt Fraudulent Activity of Prospective Purchaser of Restaurant. Mistake Permits Escape.

ALBANY, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—Released from jail and assisted in obtaining a good position that he might care for his wife and little baby, James A. Woodward telegraphed only until the charge against him was quashed by the grand jury to attempt further forgery, and is now a fugitive from justice. An attempt to secure \$100 on a forged telegram has made him an object of search by officers of Linn and Lane Counties.

Woodward came to Albany last summer from San Luis Obispo, Cal., where he left numerous creditors after failing in a restaurant business. On July 27, after being here for some time, he succeeded in securing \$70 on two forged checks at two banks, but the forgery was discovered in time for local officers to arrest Woodward last Friday. He was bound over to await the action of the grand jury on a charge of forgery, and less than a week after he was placed in the county jail. He was in a delicate condition and apparently without means, so with the consent of the banks he had endeavored to secure, Woodward was released from jail that he might support his wife and the baby born soon after he was set at liberty. He obtained a position as a cook in a local restaurant, and as he had apparently reformed the grand jury refused to indict him when it met last month and made his release permanent.

Woodward and a man named Baldwin, with whom he was working, bought the Bon Ton restaurant ten days ago. They purchased it from Gates Bros., who prepared to return to their home in Tennessee. Obtaining the address of the father of the Gates boys Woodward went to Eugene last Friday and telegraphed him, signing the name of one of the boys and saying in the message that they were in trouble and asking him to send a man to call him up at the Bon Ton restaurant when the money came.

Eates sent the money, but instructed the operator to have his son identified before payment. Baldwin and Woodward had a disagreement and Baldwin notified Sheriff Smith, who communicated with local officers and Woodward failed to get the money, but a misunderstanding among officers in the Lane County city jail kept the money that something was wrong he has disappeared.

Since Woodward's disappearance it has been learned that since he had been released he had secured \$125 on two notes, one for \$50 and one for \$75. These are worthless.

ACCUSED MOTHER GONE

NEWLY-BORN CHILD CREMATED IS WARRANT'S CHARGE.

Evidences of Crime Are Discovered in Basement of House Where Alleged Slayer Worked.

Charging her with the murder of her newly-born child by cremating the baby in the furnace of the home occupied by Mrs. George H. Kelly, 245 North Twenty-third street, Eugene, a warrant was issued yesterday for the arrest of Hilda Johnson, a domestic, who for the past two weeks has been in the service of Mrs. Kelly. The warrant was issued in Municipal Court to E. F. Smith, a detective, who up to an early hour this morning had not returned to Portland with the woman, who was, it is believed, in Warren, Columbia County.

Detective Smith says he found evidence of cremation in the furnace ashes. The Johnson woman was not seen Sunday, but it was noted that a large fire had been built in the furnace, which heated the whole house. As this furnace was in full blast at 2 o'clock, when the fire arose, it is conjectured that it was built at an early hour in the morning.

Hilda was in my service since October 25," said Mrs. Kelly last night. "I know nothing about her and am, indeed, horror-stricken that such an affair as this could happen in my home." A bottle of chloroform was found in the room occupied by the girl. Part of this had been used.

The Johnson woman worked some time ago at an Irvington home and left, she said, to go to Eugene. At detective headquarters last night nothing was known of the whereabouts of Detective Smith and it was not known whether he was at Warren or even if a warrant was in his possession.

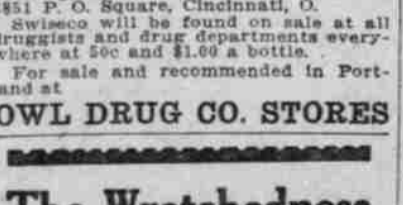
