lowss "Our attention has been called to your efforts to relieve the congestion formed by shopping during the holiday season in the downtown district. This company is heartily in sympathy with your object and desires to call to your notice the fact that the streetcar employee are worthy of your further consideration in this connection.

"During the rush hours of the holiday season, and for that matter any morning or evening of a work day, the demand made upon the streetcar employes to handle the crowds is of a very streamous nature. It is true that the vast majority of American workmen quit their labors of the day at nearly the same hours—from 5 to 6 P. M. Immediately they seek transportation home on the streetcars. This vast army consumes to a considerable extent the available capacity of any vast army consumes to a considerable extent the available capacity of any streetear system, no matter what city may be picked out for comparison. To add to this difficult undertaking the movement at the same hour of an army of shoppers seeking holiday purchases produces a burden which falls heavily upon the energy of the train crews. The company believes that all that is necessary is to call the attention of the good women of Portland to this circumstance and they will rendily join
