EAST MORRISON IN MIDST OF ADVANCE

Vehicle and Implement District Forges Ahead With Rapid Strides.

FREIGHT HOUSE IS NEEDED

With Annual Trade of This Section Amounting to \$10,000,000 Denand for Better Handling Facilities Is Made.

One of the most striking points of commercial development in Fortland is the wholesale vehicle and implement

commercial development in Fortland is the wholesale vehicle and implement district centering on East Morrison street and extending several blocks north and eauth, a short distance from the waterfront. In 1852 this entire district was low, unsightly and covered for a large part of the year with hack water from the Willamette River. When implement and vehicle dealers first started to locate in that section it was about as uninviting for commercial purposes as could be found in the city. East Morrison street from the river front for some distance east was nothing more or less than a pier extanding several fost above the water grade. The first buildings erected stood on plies. As other establishments began to iceate in the district it became not estarty to improve the thoroughfares and to fill in the property adjacent to the streets. East Water, East First, East Second, Belmoot and other streets were in an almost impassable condition and it took several years and an immense amount of work to improve the traffic situation. traffic situation.

Improvements Are Made. Improvements Are Made.

As Morrison street was the bridge street, that theroughfare built up first. The firms located on that street and adjoining streets in the district began a movement some time ago to have the old plank boards removed and a modern pavement installed. After a long struggle the improvement district was organized and the new paving installed. The street between East Water street and Union svenue was improved with wood block paving, the work just having been completed. The hard-surfacing extends over four blocks and is one of the most substantial improvements

ing extends over four blocks and is one of the most substantial improvements made in the district recently. Some time ago East Water street was paved with Belgian stone and other side streets have been improved. A movement is now on foot to pave Belmont street in this district.

With these improvements and direct railroad facilities the district is now considered ideal for the wholesale handling of implements and vehicles. Among the firms first attracted to the locality were Studebaker Bros. and the A. H. Averill. Machinery Company. Since 1832 other firms which have been established in the district include the International Harvester Company. Mitchell, Lewis & Staver Company. John Deere Plow Company, Oregon-Moline Plow Company, Scott & Munsell, Oliver Chilled Plew Company, Parlin & Orendorff, J. A. Preeman & Son, Heall & Company, Rober Machinery Company, and Staver Company, Rober Machinery Company, and Several other firms, besides machine foundries.

Business is Large.

The implement and vehicle business of the district amounts to about \$10.eea.000 annually and is shawing a steady growth from year to year. To give an idea as to the importance of Portland as a vehicle and implement center, it is interesting to know that center, it is interesting to know that there are only three other cities in the United States that do a larger annual business. Kansas City heads the list, with Minneapolis second and Dallas, Texas, third. It is predicted that at the rate the Pacific Coast is growing. The implement business here will be-
