

EAST MORRISON IN MIDST OF ADVANCE

Vehicle and Implement District Forges Ahead With Rapid Strides.

FREIGHT HOUSE IS NEEDED

With Annual Trade of This Section Amounting to \$10,000,000 Demand for Better Handling Facilities Is Made.

One of the most striking points of commercial development in Portland is the wholesale vehicle and implement district centering on East Morrison street and extending several blocks north and south, a short distance from the waterfront. In 1902 this entire district was low, unsightly and crowded for a large part of the year with back-water from the Willamette River.

When implement and vehicle dealers first started to locate in that section it was about an undevoted for commercial purposes as could be found in the city. East Morrison street from the river front for some distance east was nothing more or less than a pier extending several feet above the water grade. The first buildings erected stood on piles. As other buildings began to locate in the district it became necessary to improve the thoroughfares and to fill in the property adjacent to the streets.

Improvements Are Made. As Morrison street was the bridge street that thoroughfare built up first. The firms located on that street and adjoining streets in the district began a movement some time ago to have the old plank boards removed and a modern pavement installed. After a long struggle the improvement district was organized and the new paving installed.

The street between East Water street and Union avenue was improved with wood block pavement just having been completed. The hard-surfacing extends over four blocks and is one of the most substantial improvements made in the district recently. Some time ago East Water street was paved with Belgian stone and other side streets have been improved. A movement is now on foot to pave Belmont street in this district.

With these improvements and street railroad facilities the district is now considered ideal for the wholesale handling of implements and vehicles. Among the firms first attracted to the locality were Studebaker Bros. and the J. H. Averill Machine Company. Since 1902 other firms which have been established in the district include the International Harvester Company, Mitchell Lewis Slater Company, Peck and Pilew Company, Oregon-Moline Plow Company, Scott & Munsell, Oliver Chilled Plow Company, Parlin & Orendoff, J. A. Freeman & Son, Beall & Company, Advance Thresher Company, Garr, Scott & Company, R. M. Wade & Company, Buffalo Pitts Machinery Company, Robor Machinery Company, and the other firms, besides machine foundries.

Business Is Large. The implement and vehicle business of the district amounts to about \$10,000,000 annually and is showing a steady growth from year to year. To give an idea as to the importance of Portland as a large part of the business center, it is interesting to know that there are only three other cities in the United States that do a larger annual business. These are Minneapolis, St. Paul, and Chicago.

MARQUAM DENIED TITLE

Judge McGinn Scores Litigator for Trying to Dispossess Owner. Judge McGinn yesterday refused to allow P. A. Marquam, Jr. to dispossess W. H. Ray of lots which he has held for nine years in actual possession by tax title. The property in question

is composed of three lots in block 13, Willamette Addition. Mr. Marquam obtained title from a man who held power of attorney from the original owners. The lots were originally owned by Georgia, Tommy and Annie Riley, who left Portland in 1891. Later a man who had what purported to be a power of attorney from the owners mortgaged the property for \$75 and in 1909 Mr. Marquam obtained a deed from him. The judge held that the power of attorney, the validity of which had not been proved, he declared, had been terminated by mortgaging the property. Incidentally he scored Mr. Marquam for instituting suits to gain possession of property held by tax titles. Marquam has 14 suits of the same character pending.
