Wheat Stronger at Chicago Because of Snow in Canada.

THRESHERS ARE STOPPED

Improved Demand for Winter Wheat Flour Also Adds to the Strength of the Grain Market-Close Over a Cent Higher.

CHICAGO, Nov. R.—Snow and cold, stopping threshers in the Canadian Northwest and making farmers offerings light at elevator points in the Spring crop states, gave a lift today to the price of wheat. The close was steady at a net advance of %c to 1%c. Latest figures showed corn 1-16c off to %c

Wheat finished at nearly the top point of the day, in addition to the effects of the Northwest storm, an improved demand for Wintor wheat flow appeared to be an underlying cause of strength. The chief immediate influence was the covering of considerable quantities of short wheat in a pit that had previously been well sold out. Benimmed in favor of the bull side received more or less impetus from talk of large sales of cash wheat pending here, though no such transaction was reported brought to completion. TELEPHONE TAX FOUGHT

Dallas Company Says State Commission Is Unfair.
