Protests against possible increase of the round-trip convention rate from Chicago and cities west of Chicago to Chicago and office west of Chicago to Portland and other points in the Northwest yesterday were telegraphed to James Chariton, president of the Transcontinental Passenger Association, by the Portland Commercial Club, the Elks' grand lodge convention commission and others interested in keeping Portland in a position of advantage in seaking tourist attention.

The special rate committee of the passenger association, which embraces nearly all the lines operating west of Chicago, was in session yestering and had under consideration proposed raduced rates to the Elks' convention to be held in Fortland during the week of July 8, 1912, the Shriners' convention at Les Angeles in May, the Portland Bose Festival in June, the Seattle Golden Fortlatch in August, and other special occasions planned for the Pacific Coast within the coming year.

It was reported here that the committee would attempt to fix the convention rate on the same hashs as the regular Summer tourist rate, and that

regular Summer tourist rate, and that the only additional advantage offered to convention travelers would be the opportunity to purchase tickets on dates not provided by the tourist

Special Schedule Wanted.

The round-trip tourist fare is \$72.52 from Chicago, \$70 from St. Louis, \$60 from St. Paul, Kansas City, Omnha and Missouri liver common points, and \$50 from Denver and Colorado common points. It is virtually certain that these again will be applied for the 1912 tour-

lst business.

Herstofore special round-trip rates
of \$82.50 from Chicago, \$57.59 from St.
Louis, \$50 from Missouri River points
and \$45 from Colorado points have been
made for such occasions as the Rose made for such occasions as the fine Festival and other important events in the Northwest. It is to maintain this schedule of special rates that the Portland organizations are appealing to the passenger association now. C. C. Chapman, manager of the Com-mercial Club's promotion bureau, sent the following message to Mr. Charlton:
