

COLONISTS TO TRY COMMUNITY PLAN

Leroy Park Tells How Immigration Commission Will People Oregon.

FOREIGN CAPITAL SOUGHT

Corporation to Develop Power on Deschutes and Irrigate Lands on Columbia May Be Financed Abroad.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Nov. 17.—Leroy Park, Chief Immigration Commissioner for Oregon, who has been attending the annual conference of State Immigration Commissioners in this city, left tonight for New York, whence he will sail tomorrow for Europe to complete arrangements for financing a corporation which is to develop power on the Deschutes and irrigate lands on the south bank of the Columbia River, near Umatilla.

Mr. Park found that Eastern people had packed the convention of Immigration Commissioners and were not disposed to give ear to the Western Commissioners, whose first interest is Western farming. Rather, the recent assembly devoted its attention entirely to the problem of procuring more labor for the South.

Before leaving Washington tonight Mr. Park said that he was prepared for the first time to announce the plan upon which the Oregon Immigration Commission operates.

"We propose to act as agent for private landowners in Oregon," said he. "We shall receive no compensation for our services, but propose to find desirable settlers, ascertain their wants and then select for them suitable lands, and we shall see to it that proper contracts are made with landowners, under which they will acquire title in not more than ten years. We propose to place settlers on various kinds of desirable lands and we propose to bring to Oregon various classes of farmers, building up communities in favorable localities. We expect through agents of our own and with the cooperation of American Consulate in Northern Europe to interest a thrifty class of farmers, bring them to this country and locate them on Oregon lands. We shall try the community plan, establishing a Hungarian colony here, a Swiss colony there, a Swedish colony somewhere else, and so on, and we shall have small colonies in distinct colonies of their own. "But in doing this we shall not place any immigrants on lands that are held at exorbitant prices, nor will we be instrumental in operating for the benefit of speculators. We shall insist upon sales of lands at their present-day values. At present we are not planning to colonize lands on Government irrigation projects, but may take that up later."

Mr. Park said that this system of colonization was entirely new, but he believed that it would ultimately turn to Oregon vast numbers of desirable immigrants.

HAWLEY STARTS ON TRIP

Representative Will Visit Many Towns in District.

SALEM, Or., Nov. 17.—(Special.)—Representative Hawley left Salem today for a trip over portions of the First District. He gave addresses at Corvallis today.

His schedule up to and including December 1 is as follows: November 18, addresses rural high school at Oakville in evening; November 20, Forest Grove in day and Hillsboro in evening; November 21, leaves Hillsboro, arriving at Tillamook in the afternoon; November 22, leaves Tillamook in the morning by boat for Bay City and Garibaldi, spending short time at Bay City and inspecting waterway. Met at Garibaldi by team and driven to Nelsm Bay, where he will take the boat for inspection of the waterway. Remains at Nelsm in the evening; November 23, leaves Nelsm for Astoria; November 24, Astoria and Clatsop County; November 25, Columbia County; November 26, addresses Salem 8 o'clock Club; November 28, leaves Salem at 8 A. M. on Oregon for an inspection of the Willamette River, Clackamas, Clatsop and Oregon City locks, arriving at Oregon City in the same afternoon; November 29, Oregon City; December 1, Albany.

their belief that McNamara was guilty and should be hanged.

The excusing of McLain by the state and of Kenyon by the defense, and the failure of the defense to excuse Andre, were the surprises of the situation.

State Challenges Banker.

McLain, as a banker, is of a class supposed by the defense to be particularly averse to any unsettled condition in business and to people who make them so. Kenyon was thought to be marked by the state because of his expressed disapproval of General Harrison Gray Otis, publisher of the Times. His varied investments, in the opinion of the defense, might prove an unconscious influence and he was excused for this reason.

Andre, in his examination by the defense, said that he was favorable to unions. "If they keep within their rights, as they sometimes do," and believed that the Times was dynamited. The last few men of the seventh venire were summoned to fill the vacant places in the box.

De Rosier was excused for deafness. W. H. Gaynor was excused because of an unalterable opposition to capital punishment. William Nicholson, a grocer, was accepted as to cause by the defense after a brief examination.

Grover Found Acceptable.

Nicholson said that he was open-minded, having no views on the case. He declared that he could give the defendant a fair trial. Assistant District Attorney Horton examined Nicholson at length, found him satisfactory on the question of circumstantial evidence and likewise passed him for cause. Nicholson once owned a grocery store in Buffalo, N. Y. Before that he was conductor on a streetcar line between Buffalo and Niagara Falls. Examination of F. C. McCandless, a rancher, followed. He declared that he thought himself prejudiced against the defendant and would not, in justice

PASTOR RUNS A SALOON

SAN FRANCISCO CONGREGATION APPEARS CONTENTED.

Candy Store Added to Clergyman's Enterprises Causes Litigation, With Wife as Plaintiff.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17.—(Special.)—A prosperous saloon at 321 Howard street, and a church with a congregation of contented people are two institutions Rev. C. Tsapralis conducted at the same time for several years, so he testified in the Superior Court today.

Tsapralis is pastor of the Greek Church of San Francisco, and appeared in court as a witness in a suit brought by his wife, Ellen C. Tsapralis, against Sheriff Finn to recover \$2000 for alleged unlawful seizure.

Tsapralis, it was admitted in the pleadings, once owned a candy store at 3091 Sixteenth street. On the witness stand it was developed that he was proprietor of the store at the same time that he conducted the saloon and occupied the pulpit. He sold the candy store to Mrs. Tsapralis. But before selling he neglected to liquidate a bill of \$300 for a soda fountain and other fixtures in the shop. A collection agency sued, and securing judgment, had an execution issued against the candy store.

Now Mrs. Tsapralis wants Sheriff Finn to pay her \$2000 damages for unlawful seizure, alleging that the store was her property and not the preacher's.

MISSIONS TO GET MILLION

Methodist Board Votes to Appropriate Entire Year's Collections.

DENVER, Nov. 17.—The rule of the Manchus is one of the three causes of China's bankruptcy, was the statement of Bishop Lewis, of Foo-chow, China, in an address tonight before the Board of Foreign Missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church in session here.

"The opium traffic," he continued, "is a thing of the past and I firmly believe that the Manchus are a thing of the past. "If the Manchus are driven out, it is possible that the capital of the empire will be changed from Peking to Canton, which was the ancient capital and is deep-seated in the Chinese heart as belonging to China's classic age of poetry and song."

The Board of Foreign Missions voted tonight to appropriate its entire collections of last year, amounting to \$1,072,957, to the work, and to raise by a special offering the debt of \$171,000.

WOMEN DON'T SHIRK JURY

Berkeley Officer Encounters Only Two Who Refuse Subpoena.

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 17.—Officer John Boyd, completed a round up today of prominent suffragists whom he was serving with subpoenas for jury duty in the Justice Court. He found but two women who refused to accept the subpoenas. Among others subpoenaed was Mrs. William Keith, president of the Berkeley Political Equality League.

The case at issue is that of Antonio Zappanel, an Oakland baker charged with having struck Mrs. S. Silverman because she stopped buying bread of him.

NAVY NOT TO SELL "GUM"

Official Order Prohibits Inclusion in Ship's Stores.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—(Special.)—The sale of chewing gum as ship's stores has been prohibited by order of Acting Secretary of the Navy Winthrop.

The order was issued on recommendation of Captain William F. Fuller, commanding officer of the battleship Mississippi, which was approved by Rear-Admiral Hugo Osterhaus, Commander-in-Chief of the Atlantic battleship fleet. No reason is assigned for the order.

Coots Bay Improvements Extended.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Nov. 17.—(Special.)—The Commissioners of the Port of Coots Bay have decided upon a more extensive improvement of the channel of the upper bay than is being carried on by the Government dredger. Besides the Government project calls for, the Port Commission will have an additional 100,000 yards of dirt removed. This will be paid for by the Commission at the rate of 5 cents a yard. The removal of the additional dredging will straighten the channel as well as make it wider. The Commissioners have decided to postpone their action in calling for bids on the \$200,000 bond issue owing to the pending lawsuit.

Hunter Kills Decey Ducks.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 17.—(Special.)—For killing five mallard ducks, live decoys belonging to Hugh Mulligan and others, on Mulligan's Lake, yesterday, W. D. Overton, of this city, was fined \$15.

PRESIDENCY IS GOAL, NOW

New Movement Causes Uneasiness Among Hoosier Politicians of Old School—Past Enemies Will Be Revived.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 17.—(Special.)—Try as hard as they may, the Indiana Democrats who are behind the movement to send a delegation to the National Democratic convention that will be for Governor Marshall for President cannot stifle the talk over the state of men who favor the endorsement of United States Senator Kern.

It is said that Marshall himself has no fear of Kern, but his friends have been telling him that in the Senate Kern has the greatest danger to the Governor. Many of the older school of politicians, who judge politics largely from what they gather from the county and district chairmen, who consult with other politicians, declare that it would be impossible to get an Indiana delegation next year that would even go over to Kern if his friends were placed before the convention from some other state.

After Kern was defeated in 1909 by Benjamin Shively, Kern said some bitter things about the Democratic legislature, and the politicians have never forgiven him. It is on the unforgiving spirit evinced by these politicians that Governor Marshall bases his belief that Kern could not obtain any support from any delegation the state might send to the National convention.

Voters Believe Kern's Charges. Among the voters of the state Kern did not suffer from his accusations against the general assembly, which amounted, in effect, to a charge that certain members of the lower house who had promised to support him for the Senate were "induced" to desert him for Shively. Many of the voters believe that Kern told the truth, as is shown by the manner in which they instructed their delegates to the state convention in 1910 to pledge the general assembly of 1911, if Democratic, to elect Kern.

Kern's record of less than one year, in the special session of Congress and in the Lorimer inquiry, has further endeared him to the voters. Many declare that it needs only someone to start a real Kern movement to have the state desert Marshall and prepare to send a delegation to the convention. In the past few days, some of the Democrats who are not particularly friendly to Governor Marshall have received instructions from Washington and New York to begin a quiet Kern-for-President campaign. It is rumored, however, that at a recent dinner in New York, attended by 26 representatives of "big business," Marshall was discussed as a Presidential possibility, and that "big business" declared against him because of his well-known belief that corporations should not be permitted to merge without first dissolving the old organizations. It is not gathered that Kern's name was mentioned at the dinner as a possibility, but the Indiana who have heard of it and who have been apprised of the Kern-for-President movement believe "big business" talked about him either then or afterwards.

New England May Present Name.

A report now being circulated is that arrangements are being made for some New England delegation to present the name of Kern to the National convention. This will be done, it is known, that Kern has not lost votes in the East because of his association with Bryan in 1908.

Practical politicians of Indiana declare that there is little reason now to believe any other than that Taggart will control the state organization, which will be completed in January. It is said that National committee men has all the stakes set for controlling the 13 district chairmen and through them the state chairman and the organization. This will not mean the state will be at all likely to deliver a Harmon delegation, although Taggart is a Harmon Democrat, and it is known that feeling is so strong that Taggart would not dare to set about trying to obtain a delegation for the O. O. man. The sentiment for several months has been divided between Wilson and Marshall, and there would not be, it is declared, any chance for a delegation other than for Wilson if Marshall was not a candidate. Just what the new Kern movement will mean is conjectural, but experienced politicians declare that if it is properly handled it can be made sweep the state.
