

REPORTER REBuffs SALVATION ARMY "God Pity You." Says Gipsy Smith to 75 Members Who Attend Revival.

EVANGELIST SCORES GARB Preacher Tells Street Workers Christianity Doesn't Need Badge or Bonnet - Church Changes Needed, He Declares.

GISSY SMITH PROGRAMME OF MEETINGS FOR TWO DAYS. Tuesday. 12 noon—Meeting for men only. Express Theater. 7:30 P. M.—Gipsy Smith tabernacle.

With a delegation of 75 Salvation Army workers present in the tabernacle last night, Gipsy Smith said: "When I see you decorating yourselves with a special badge or bonnet, it makes me say, 'God pity you.' When God blesses your life with the sunshine of his love, it is eternal Spring, and you needn't set about decorating yourself as a Christian."

"You can't catch big fish in shallow water," he said. "You never saw anybody converted in an empty pond. The men will not come to you, you will have to go to them. Your churches that were here before the Salvation Army came ought to seek to save the people in the slums as well as the people on the heights. They will respond to common sense and refinement."

The evangelist took for a text the story of Christ's fishing boat, and the story of the miraculous draft of fishes. "The reason your relatives refuse to go to church with you Sunday is because they guess they aren't saved by you during the week," he declared. "The trouble is, some of you haven't had anybody to tell you about it. When you have Christ now, you need a badge on. Christ will shine through you."

"If I should take you out in England, when the bathwater was just coming out, the apple trees breaking their hearts out in beauty, the air filled with perfume and the songs of the happy birds, and the flowers dotting the ground as if God had broken up a rainbow into a million atoms and scattered the little bits at your feet—if you should see all this, and you should see a man with a brush, painting a great sign, 'This is Jesus,' would you ask, 'What's the matter with him?' When I see you decorating yourself with a special badge or bonnet it makes me say, 'God pity you.'"

"A man asked me, 'When are you going to preach the new theology?' I'm too busy to preach the new theology, it's over me. It reminds me of a bad photograph. It's over-exposed."

Gipsy Smith's Daily Sermon (Written for The Oregonian.) Yesterday I asked those who were mothers if the young man safe. To-day may I ask, "Where are the girls, and if they are safe? What is the moral standard and you are giving to the sweet, beautiful girls in your homes? Are you teaching them to prize their virtue, the most precious thing a woman ever possesses in the world? No one can tell your child what you can, and what she ought to know, but mother. Do you know, many girls have fallen before they realized the dreadful distance, just because they were not taught what they ought to know? And every mother should know, from her own personal experience, just how much her child would be told. No one knows better than a mother the temptations that await a girl almost before she is out of the home; as soon as she goes into the street and into the world, she is surrounded by the snares of the enemy. I know, and so do you, that there are young mothers at the ages of 13, 14 and 15, and if you wish to prove this to the Christendom and Salvation Army Rescue Homes, and look at the poor things who are only child mothers. I have seen them, and have heard their stories, stories of outraged innocence, until I have felt ashamed of my sex, and as though I would stop preaching and go and hunt up the fiend who was devil enough to despoil and damn such sweet young lives that I might hurl him to the first wild beast who would be mean enough to make a meal of him. Are not mothers often to blame for this sort of things? Many a girl is sent out while she is in her teens, with the strength of the Nation.

CONFERENCE IS IMPORTANT Second World's Christian Citizenship Convention Two Years Hence Promises to Be Most Attractive. Preparations Under Way.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 20.—(Special.)—In five states specific work looking to the organization and preparation of the world's Christian citizenship conference is being prosecuted with the utmost vigor. This vasty important gathering of men and women from all the countries of the world will be held at Portland, Or., June 25 to July 6, 1913, but as the workers and thinkers of the entire world, Christian and pagan, must be organized into a representative body, the work of preparation will not cease an hour.

Such organizations have already been perfected in Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Kansas, and within the year every state in America will be in motion with eyes front on Portland. Secretaries to Be Sent. Dr. Henry Collin Minton, president of the National Reform Association, sponsors for the world's Christian Citizenship Conference, is in charge of this phase of the world-wide movement, and is in constant correspondence with men in all these units of government, and is more than likely that secretaries will be sent into these countries to secure delegations for the Portland, Or., conference.
