Oregon City's ex-Mayor III for Several Months.

FUNERAL IS FOR FRIDAY

Graduate of Harvard College, Well-Known Physician Long Practiced Profession in Clackamas County-Public Spirited Citizen.

OREGON CITY, Or., Nov. 19 .- (Spe sial.)-Dr. Walter E. Caril, one of the leading physicians of Oregon, whose home has been in this city for many years, died today after an filness of several months. Dr. Carli was well known throughout the county, and was me of Oregon City's most public-spir-

ited citizens. He looked out for the in-terest of the people as well as the city, while he was Mayor of Oregon City, an office he held three years. He was also a member of the Oregon City Board of School Directors, member of the State Board of Health, and was an ex-president of the State Medical Association. He was the first exalted ruler of Oregon City Lodge of Elks, and also a member of the Masonic order and of the Sons of the Revolution.

Dr. Carli was born in Chicopee. Mass. October 25, 1858, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jason L. Carli, of English ancestors, who sattled in this country previous to the Revolution.

Dr. Carli attended the public schools of his native city, and later Harvard where he took the special medical course, and from that institution he graduated in 1855. He came to Oregon in 1886, settling at Portland, where he passed two years, coming to this city in 1885. He had practiced medicine here ever since. He was formerly a member of the State Board of Charities. The body will be incinerated at the Crematorium in Sellwood, and the members of the Commercial Club, Elks and Masons will attend in a body.
