## CABLEGRAM AIDS CUPID

Boston Man Proposes on Day After He Is Introduced, Gets Coveted Answer on Day After That, and Marriage Follows.

## NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—(Special.)—

The arrival of the liner Pennsylvania from Hamburg has revealed a romance that even the captain of that vessel, inured to the romances of ocean voyages, confesses is out of the ordinary. The romance, which involves a hard-headed, practical Boston business man of 30 and a young woman traveling alone under the protection of the captain of the Pennsylvania. It culminated in a wedding soon after the ship touched the dock at Hoboken.

The bridegroom is Dr. Elias Price, vice-president of the Rogers &amp; Wheel Company, of Boston, and son of W. A. Price, a wealthy dealer in music. Until November 12 he never had met his prospective bride, who was Miss Sophie Helfferich, a pretty brunette and daughter of a wealthy widow of Honesdale, Pa. Miss Helfferich had been touring Europe and sailed from Hamburg on the Pennsylvania.

Cable Message Sent to Fate. Mr. Price had left the United States for a two years' business trip to South America, preceded by a visit to some European cities, also on business, but fate, in the form of a cable message calling him home, decreed that he should not continue his long journey, but should win a bride instead. On receipt of the message he looked up the sailing dates and found that the Pennsylvania would be the most convenient steamer for him to take, and he hastened to Hamburg and made arrangements accordingly.

It was on the second day out that he caught his first glimpse of Miss Helfferich. There was an entertainment in the music room, at which the girl played on the piano and sang from a grand opera. Seeking out a young man who seemed to be a companion of Miss Helfferich, Mr. Price begged for an introduction.

## NAVY RUN WITH ECONOMY

ESTABLISHMENT LARGER, BUT COST OF UPKEEP LESS.

Economies of Manufacture and Purchase Show Value of Business Methods.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—With an appropriation reduced by \$400,000, the Government, the past two years, has been maintaining a Navy larger by 20 per cent than it was during the preceding two years. This was made possible by economies resulting from improvement in business methods, said Secretary Meyer in a statement made public today.

A reduction of 10 cents a pound in the cost of powder is reported by the Ordnance Bureau. 1,000,000 pounds having been made during the past year at a cost of 35.6 cents a pound. Purchasing hemp at Manila resulted in a saving of \$40 a ton, an annual saving of approximately \$30,000; by docking vessels at Navy yards the Department saved \$46,000 during the past fiscal year, a reduction of 20 per cent; and the use of substitutes for linned oil netted a saving of about \$40,000.

By manufacturing certain classes of goods at the Navy yards in which they can be purchased cheapest large savings have resulted. Particularly is this true of standard mess tables, the cost of which has been reduced from \$20 to \$11.94 at one navy yard.

## NEW FEARS BESET

Foss Apprehensive of Government Restraint.

## STATES WARNED TO ACT

Massachusetts Governor Declares Democrats Will Save Day With Reasonable Tariff and Agreements as to Trade.

## CHARLESTON, S. C., Nov. 30.—

A closer union of the states for popular government and the elimination of special tariff and other privileges as the only basis for constructive National progress were advocated by Governor Foss, of Massachusetts, in an address before St. Andrew's Society today. He declared the business interests of the country must be built up on constructive business lines for the benefit of the people and that the Republican party had failed utterly in this regard.

He outlined the "progressive" movement of the Democratic party, which, he said, furnished the necessary solution of National problems and declared this country was calling on that party to assume the leadership. He said the Sherman law had failed to safeguard and develop industrial prosperity and had acted injuriously on all business.

Relief from Busses Promised. "We now enter upon a new era in which progressive legislation on these lines will take the place of tariff juggling and its attendant evils," he continued.

"The era of the Payne-Aldrich tariff has also been the era of the political boss. It has witnessed the subversion of Legislatures, the dictation of Congressional action and the disturbance of executive duty, through forces that work in the dark against the public welfare. It has been the direct representation of popular will, supplanted by the dictates of political machines."

"Relief from present conditions can be, and will be, accorded by a Democratic administration and a Democratic Congress. These resources can be secured by our party through the twin policies of a reasonable tariff and settled programme of reciprocal trade agreements."

Important Step Remains. "But there is, in my judgment, a still more important step which remains for us to take. It is time for Congress, while upholding the principle that interstate and foreign trade shall be free from restraint, to define, so far as practicable, what specific acts shall be deemed lawful and what unlawful, in order that the legitimate business of the country may know to what the business conditions must conform."

"It is time also to reaffirm the principle that each state must do all for itself that all human action can accomplish to gain its constitutional powers."

The failure of the states to act effectively within their common sphere serves as a justification for undue extension of National authority. "We must now face a situation in which the fear of restraint by combination of capital has given way to

apprehension of greater restraint by the National Government itself."

## NEWSPAPERS BEST EDUCATORS.

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 30.—"Geography can be properly taught only from the newspapers," declared Dr. A. E. Winslow, of Boston, in an address to the Utah Educational Association on "Education for Prosperity." He declared newspapers were the greatest textbooks in the world, as no other publication could keep pace with the rapid changes of modern life.

## MRS. J. S. ROBBINS DIES AT ALBANY.

ALBANY, Or., Nov. 30.—(Special.)—Mrs. J. S. Robbins died at her home in this city Tuesday, aged 55 years. She was a native of Iowa and had lived in this city for several years. She is survived by her husband and two children, Albert Robbins, of Portland, and Mrs. Jennie Beall, of this city.

## HOLDUP MEN ROB MAN OF TURKEY.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 30.—(Special.)—While carrying a turkey to his home last night, A. B. Koplin was held up by one who asserted himself to be a police detective, and relieved of his bird. The victim reported the case to the police, but no clue as to the identity of the highwayman has been found.
