

## MINNESOTA TALKS PRIMARY MEASURE

Senator Poindexter Expresses  
Confidence in Strength of  
La Follette Ticket.

## JEWISH FOLK ADDRESSED

Practices of Russia Are Assailed and  
Abrogation of Treaty Is Favored  
If Provisions Are Not Hon-  
ored by Slavs.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 30.—As a result of the conference today between United States Senator Poindexter, of Washington, and Minnesota "Progressive" leaders here, an attempt probably will be made to secure a Presidential primary for Minnesota. This statement was made tonight by George E. Loftus, one of the leaders in the "progressive" movement.

"Washington 'progressives' are circulating a petition to secure a Presidential primary, Senator Poindexter told us today," said Mr. Loftus, "and it is probable that steps will be taken immediately by Minnesota 'progressives' to secure the same for this state. All those present today were in favor of the plan, and it is to be taken up by the committee at the next meeting Tuesday night."

**La Follette Candidate Favored.**  
Senator Poindexter expressed himself as optimistic concerning Senator La Follette's Presidential chances in the West. He addressed a Minneapolis Jewish organization on the Russian passport situation tonight. If Russia could not be brought to honor the provisions of its treaty with the United States, Senator Poindexter declared himself for abrogation of the treaty.

"The question of the expulsion or discrimination against people of other countries who visit Russia is reactionary and out of the spirit of the times," he said. "We find that this question is part of the cause of the division in the United States between the 'progressives' and reactionaries."

**Ambassadors Held to Blame.**  
"A large part of this trouble with Russia is due to the attitude of former Ambassador Rockhill and others who take the part of the reactionaries. They take the ground that these are obvious abuses and not important enough for notice, or that they do not exist."

"The persecution practiced in Russia is the survival of medieval ignorance. Russia assumes the attitude that her domestic laws take precedence over the international laws and has grossly violated its treaty with this country. The United States is absolved from its agreements unless there is a new understanding."

Speaking of a promise made to be the most important question in Congress at the coming session, he said the one that was well to the fore was the "breaking of the power of monopolies."

## AUTO LICENSE PLAN SEEN

Washington's Secretary of State Proposes to Alter Present System.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 30.—(Special.)—I. M. Howell, Secretary of State, has just returned from a trip through Eastern Washington, where he has been checking up automobile licenses and as a result he has stirred up considerable comment. He says that every auto owner should pay up his license money and he advocates placing this money into a fund for road purposes. (Owing to the mixup over checking up licenses Secretary Howell proposes to have a bill introduced in the next Legislature which will provide that each year a different colored license be used. In this manner it will be possible to tell at a glance whether a car is decorated properly or not and will greatly aid in rounding up delinquent auto owners. In the past three years the number of auto licenses issued has jumped from less than 5000 a year to more than 10,000 every month and it is not believed that all machines in the state are licensed, for it is estimated that from 2000 to 5000 cars are not carrying a state license, at the rate of \$2 per license.)

## OPIUM WORRIES SPOKANE

Metaline Falls Chinese Believed to Be Smuggling Weed.

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 30.—(Special.)—Opium smuggling across the Canadian boundary line to Metaline Falls is being shipped to Spokane smugglers, according to the suspicions of Government inspectors who are now working in the vicinity of the border town.

Reports from Metaline Falls indicate that a number of Chinamen who have been making that place their home during the summer and fall are suspected of conducting the drug traffic, and that one of their number says a regular visit to Spokane each week supposedly with opium.

The numerous arrests for opium smoking and persons having opium in their possession during the last two months have aroused the suspicions of the police, and every effort is being made to ferret out the cache for the smuggled goods.

## IN WASTE RICH ORE FOUND

State Convict Quarry Dump Yields Gold and Silver.

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Nov. 30.—(Special.)—Two prospectors, attracted by dirt on the dump at the state convict quarry, north of Selah Gap, near this city, have discovered ore bearing both gold and silver. The pay dirt lies in three seams in the face of the rock in which the convicts are working.

The dirt which is being taken out now runs little more than \$5 to the ton, but the two mining men declare that indications show greater values at greater depth. They will try to make arrangements with the state for the dirt which is thrown on the dump as waste.

## SLANG TICKLES PRELATES

MacVeagh Says Western Hemisphere Can Make World Look Like 360.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—The interests of the United States are more

closely allied with the countries of the Western hemisphere than with any others; our sympathies are with them and in due time, working together, we shall make the nations of Europe look like 360 cents," said Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh tonight. His remarks were made in responding to a toast to the President of the United States at a luncheon tendered to a company of Government officials and diplomatic representatives by Monsignor W. T. Russell, following the third annual Pan-American Thanksgiving service at St. Patrick's Church.

Secretary MacVeagh's free use of the vernacular caused a smile to pass over the faces of the guests present. Among those who appeared to enjoy the salty most was the venerable Cardinal Gibbons, who later made a brief address in support of the President's peace policies.

"Taft," said Cardinal Gibbons, "is the embodiment of peace."

## YANKEE DEATH IS PLAN

RUSSIA IN PLOT TO ASSASSINATE SHUSTER, IS REPORT.

London Newspapers Criticize Treasurer-General of Shah's Domain for Lack of Tact.

LONDON, Nov. 30.—The police have discovered several bombs which are alleged to have been prepared for the assassination of W. Morgan Shuster, the American who holds the post of Treasurer-General of Persia.

It is said that a conspiracy was uncovered some months ago, but hushed up. It was said at the time that a Persian implicated in the plots swore that a Russian official in Persia urged him to assassinate Mr. Shuster.

The Times in an editorial says it regrets the peremptory action of Russia in Persia, but refuses to believe the United States will endorse Mr. Shuster's proceedings. It says it hopes British diplomacy at St. Petersburg will succeed in arranging a satisfactory settlement, because anything to bring about the partition of Persia is to be deplored and would be a serious strain on Anglo-Russian relations.

Mr. Shuster displayed a lack of tact, according to London morning papers. The Daily News says England's support of Russia probably will prevent the United States moving in Mr. Shuster's behalf.

## CALIFORNIA NEEDS MONEY

State May Be Forced to Call in Cash Lent to Banks.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Nov. 30.—(Special.)—That the state is facing a deficit of \$300,000 and that it may be necessary to call in the money scattered about the state as loans to banks was the announcement made today by State Controller Nye after an investigation he and Clyde L. Seavey, member of the State Board of Control, had made to ascertain the financial outlook in connection with the operation of Tax Amendment No. 1, which separates state and county taxation.

Of course there are provisions attached to the probability of this big deficit. Here are the provisions:

If one-half the amount provided in the general appropriation bill for the next two years is spent by the end of the first fiscal year—July 1, 1912—and if one-half the amount in the special appropriation bill is expended in the same time, there will be a deficit of \$300,000. In other words, the state will have exceeded its receipts by that amount. To this must be added the \$150,000 which the special session of the Legislature will cost.

## 40 HURT IN GRANDSTAND

Spectators at Football Game Fall When Supports Collapse.

JACKSON, Miss., Nov. 30.—Forty spectators of a football game were injured when a grandstand collapsed here today. It is said that 15 are seriously hurt.

The accident occurred at a game between the University of Mississippi and the Mississippi Agricultural College.

Eberhart Only One on Eastern  
Trip Not in Favor of Votes  
for Women.

## TOLEDO TOURISTS' HOST

Western Executives' Special Excursion Reaches Ohio City, After

TOLEDO, O., Nov. 30.—A round of entertainment, interspersed with speeches of thanks for their reception, marked the stay of seven executives of as many Western states who arrived here at 3:45 o'clock this afternoon for the night.

The visitors were taken on trips through the city, ending at the Toledo Club, where a reception was held until 6 o'clock.

When the Governors left the Toledo Club they proceeded to the Toledo Commerce Club, where a buffet luncheon was served. Here they were met by the Toledo Newsboy Cadets, resplendent in new uniforms. This feature of the reception apparently pleased the guests.

**Suffrage Is Indorsed.**  
All the Governors, with the exception of Governor Eberhart, of Minnesota, at their speeches at the Commerce Club, dwelt upon woman suffrage, advocating it strongly. At the conclusion, Frank Mulholland, vice-president of the Commerce Club, asked for an expression on the subject from the 400 business men present, and all but three raised their hands in approval.

The visitors were entertained at a theater party tonight.

**Peace Is Urged.**  
Governors Eberhart and Burke urged the ratification by the Senate of the pending arbitration treaties.

"When the United States and England have accomplished this step, the other nations will do likewise," said the chief executive of Minnesota.

"We are now spending money on army and navy that could be used for much more worthy causes, such as the peace of the world," he concluded.

"It is the man with the gun that gets into trouble," declared Governor Burke, referring to war talk and army and navy expenditures. "The man who looks for peace generally avoids trouble, and, to a large extent, I predict it will be the same with the nations."

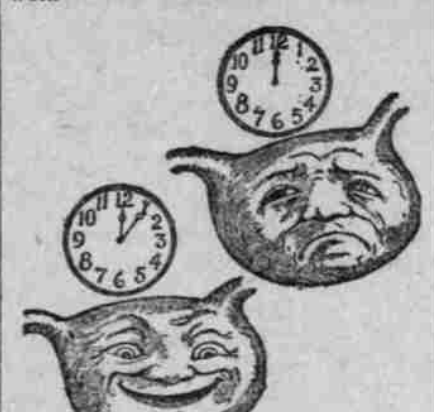
