

23 STATE CONVICTS VIOLATE LIBERTIES

Prison Record for Year Shows That Seven "Honor Men" Have Escaped From Wall.

BIG PERCENTAGE IN CLASS

More Than Half of Men in Penitentiary Come Under Workings of West's Policy — Two Conditional Pardons Revoked.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 3.—(Special.)—According to records at the State Penitentiary so far this year, 23 prisoners have either escaped or have violated conditions, 14 of this number being men who violated the confidence reposed in them either by Governor West or the State Parole Board.

The seven prisoners who escaped were trustees allowed around the Penitentiary itself and all of them were more or less under supervision. Of the 14 who either escaped or violated the confidence placed in them, there was none who was placed under supervision, some of them being "honor men." Others frayed paroles, others paroled men and others who were out of prison on conditional pardons.

Of the men who received paroles direct from the Governor himself two violated their confidence. These were Fred Miller and John Magers. Miller was paroled March 3 and is now serving time in the Walla Walla Penitentiary. Magers was paroled from Multnomah County on a charge of forgery.

Women Are Attacked. John Magers was paroled by the Governor April 26 and violated his parole a short time after when he attacked two women in Polk County, across the Blamette River from Salem. He is now held at Dallas pending trial. He was sentenced to prison from Umatilla County for burglary.

Photo men, who were given leniency on recommendation of the parole board, have violated their paroles. Wilbur Bailey was paroled June 2. He was sent to prison from Multnomah County for obtaining money under false pretenses. He left the state and has not been heard from since.

Best Law was paroled July 25. He went to the Penitentiary from Douglas County on a larceny charge. He was at large for a few weeks when he was captured at Tualatin. Michael Burke was paroled August 23. He violated his parole by leaving the state and is still at large. He was sent to the prison from Multnomah County on a charge of larceny.

One trusty parole violated the confidence placed in him. This was George Simpson who was paroled from Multnomah County on a charge of larceny. He was arrested in Salem on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses.

Norris Release Revoked. Two conditional pardon men, who were granted conditional pardons by Governor West on August 22, had their paroles revoked. One is J. W. Norris, recently arrested in Portland for alleged forgery and drunkenness and the Oregon Naval Militia, his parole being revoked by Acting Governor Olcott. He was sentenced to the prison August 22. The other conditional pardon man was Charles S. Robinson who was granted his conditional pardon by Governor West on August 22. He was originally sentenced on a charge of larceny from a dwelling in Multnomah County. The honor man, Robinson, returned to the state on November 14 and is now serving time in the Washington Reformatory at Multnomah County for forgery. Jesse Hall escaped June 15 and was recaptured. He escaped from the Peelle-Minded Institute. He is now serving time for robbery in Multnomah County. George Griffith, who escaped from the asylum farm, is still at large. He escaped July 11. He was sentenced from Multnomah County for larceny from a dwelling.

MAN SHOT IN HEAD

Dispute Over Swag Believed to Have Prompted Attack by Yeggmen-Comrades.

SOUTHERN IDAHO IS SCENE

Officers Find Money Stolen From Postoffice at Picabo Cashed Near Camp of Robbers—Victim Expected to Confess.

BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 3.—(Special.)—His right cheek and jawbone blown away by the contents of a shotgun, the victim of a robbery over a division of the booty secured from the postoffice at Picabo, Idaho, is expected to confess to the crime. The victim, a man named Barton, was shot in the head by the robbers while they were in possession of a large sum of money. The robbers are believed to be members of the same gang that recently operated in the vicinity of the camp, and after Barton reached Picabo they followed, arriving in time to catch the train. Barton was taken to a hospital, and the robbers fled. Money and Stamps Taken. The postoffice at Picabo was entered by three men a few nights ago. The "worked" and \$1000 in cash and stamps taken. Fleeing to the isolated foothills near Picabo the three robbers struck camp and proceeded to divide the swag of the night's raid. The condition of Barton has prevented his making a statement, but the authorities are in possession of facts which support the charge that the three yeggmen quarreled over the division of the booty, and Barton was attacked by the other two, receiving the full discharge of a shotgun in the mouth, tearing away the jawbone and part of one side of the face. Then he was deserted.

He recovered consciousness the next morning, after wandering over the desert, and managed to make his way back to Picabo almost dead. His terrible condition, however, was not improved by the medical attention he received in the hospital at Boise. "Pals" Tender Assistance. Linn County Nonagenarian Passes Away at Lacomb, Or.

LEBANON, Or., Dec. 3.—(Special.)—Mrs. Ruth Clark, affectionately known as Grandma Clark, who died at Lacomb, November 6, was 90 years old. Her maiden name was Smith.
