With Reinforcements, Revolutionists Say Only Republic Will Satisfy.

MORE PROVINCES IN MOVE

Nanking Is Proposed as Capital of New Government, Which Is Carefully Mapped Out by Insurgent Leaders.

PEKIN. Dec. 5 .- The Chinese rebels. in the vicinity of Hankow are regaining confidence, according to consular reports received here today, and leaders of the revolution are not willing to consider any terms from the government except those providing for a re-

Reinforcements are marching toward Hankow from Wu Chang. The revolutionists announce the arival at Hankow of representatives of eight provinces with the proxies of three other provinces, and assert that the delegates adopted a provisional constitution for the new republic.

The President of the republic, it is asserted, will be elected by delegates appointed by the provincial Governors.
Five boards will be created, namely:
Civil foreign, finance, war and communications. A popular convention
will be called after six months have
elapsed.
The revolutionists have

The revolutionists hope to make Nan-king the capital. In the interim the fu Peh military administration will ommand the rebel provinces.

It is believed a strong movement is on foot to substantiate a Chinese re-gency for the present regent, who, with other Manchu Princes, will retire from Pekin. But it is unlikely that even this will satisfy the majority of

Ultimatum From Teheran Allows 30 Hours to Comply With Terms.

APPEAL MADE TO BRITAIN

London Hears That Teheran Would Welcome Services of Intermediary - Assemblies Indorse Action of Shuster.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—The Morning Post's Teheran correspondent says that Per-sia has presented an ultimatum to Rus-sia demanding that the Russian troops in demanding that the Russian troops shall not proceed beyond Kasbin, and

that orders for further drafts of troops be countemnanded. Unless these terms are conceded within 30 hours, Persia will take the offensive.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Persia has made an appeal to Great Britain to act as an intermediary in an effort to ne-gotiate a settlement of the crisis with

gotiate a settlement of dispatches re-ceived here tonight from semi-official sources in Teheran.

At the same time an appeal was re-ceived from the united Persia press, arging American newspapers to create sentiment with a view of reaching some sentiment with a view of reaching some solution of the situation compatible with the dignity and honor of Persia. The progress of Russian troops to-ward Teheran has been stayed temporarily. Troops proceeding from Resht toward Kasbin and Teheran will be halted at the former city and held outside of Teheran so long as there are

outside of Teheran so long as there are no disturbances there.

The Provincial Assembles, as well as the National Assembly, continue to indorse the actions and position of W. Morgan Shuster, the American Treasurer-General of Persia.

There is said to be a shortage of food and there is suffering in many Persian provinces because of the cessation of all business.

MOTHER OF 6 IS SUICIDE Tacoma Woman, Divorced, Kills Self for Love of Married Man.




