

CHINESE REBELS GAIN CONFIDENCE

With Reinforcements, Revolutionists Say Only Republic Will Satisfy.

MORE PROVINCES IN MOVE

Nanking Is Proposed as Capital of New Government, Which is Carefully Mapped Out by Insurgent Leaders.

PEKIN, Dec. 5.—The Chinese rebels in the vicinity of Hankow are regaining confidence, according to consular reports received here today, and leaders of the revolution are not willing to consider any terms from the government except those providing for a republic. Reinforcements are marching toward Hankow from Wu Chang. The revolutionists announce the arrival at Hankow of representatives of eight provinces with the proxies of three other provinces, and assert that the delegates adopted a provisional constitution for the new republic. The President of the republic, it is asserted, will be elected by delegates appointed by the provincial Governors. Five boards will be created, namely: Civil, foreign, finance, war and communications. A popular convention will be called after six months have elapsed. The revolutionists hope to make Nanking the capital. In the interim the Hu Pei military administration will command the rebel provinces. It is believed a strong movement is on foot to substitute a Chinese regency for the present regent, who, with other Manchurian officials, fled from Peking. But it is unlikely that even this will satisfy the majority of the provinces.

STAND BACK! SAYS PERSIA TO RUSSIA

Ultimatum From Teheran Allows 30 Hours to Comply With Terms.

APPEAL MADE TO BRITAIN

London Hears That Teheran Would Welcome Services of Intermediary—Assembles Indorse Action of Shuster.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The Morning Post's Teheran correspondent says that Persia has presented an ultimatum to Russia demanding that the Russian troops shall not proceed beyond Kasbin, and that orders for further drafts of troops be countermanded. Unless these terms are conceded within 30 hours, Persia will take the offensive.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Persia has made an appeal to Great Britain to act as an intermediary in an effort to negotiate a settlement of the crisis with Russia, according to dispatches received here tonight from semi-official sources in Teheran. At the same time an appeal was received from the United Persia press, urging American newspapers to create sentiment with a view of reaching some solution of the situation compatible with the dignity and honor of Persia. The progress of Russian troops toward Teheran has been stayed temporarily. Troops proceeding from Resht toward Kasbin and Teheran will be halted at the former city as long as there are no disturbances there. The Provincial Assemblies, as well as the National Assembly, continue to insist on the withdrawal of Russian troops. There is said to be a shortage of food and there is suffering in many Persian provinces because of the cessation of all business.

FREE TOLLS OPPOSED

WARBURTON WOULD MAKE AMERICAN SHIPS PAY.

Washington Representative Says Proposal to Exempt Yankoes Sounds Like Subsidy.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Dec. 5.—Representative Warburton, of Washington, today declared himself in opposition to granting free passage through the Panama Canal to American ships engaged in coastwise trade on the ground that such a concession is subsidy. He favors a uniform system of tolls, to be charged against all ships, and the Secretary of the Interior, asking that they withhold final action on the West Umatilla extension until the Pendlton Commercial Club could be investigated. Warburton favors establishing a schedule of tolls for the Panama Canal rather than according to tonnage. He maintains it is not good business to exact the same toll on a cargo of lumber worth while, or a cargo of silk, fruit or other high grade commodities.

LIBRARY BRANCH OPENED

Speakers Discuss Its Scope at Appropriate Exercises.

The new East Portland Branch Public Library, built at East Eleventh and East Alder streets, on the site of the former library, which burned recently, was formally opened with appropriate exercises in the auditorium under the auspices of the Library Association and the East Portland Business Men's Club. W. L. Brewster presided. He said the new building was made possible by the gifts of Andrew Carnegie and W. B. Ayer, president of the association. H. H. Herdman, principal of Washington High School, said the library and public schools are closely related, and that the library is essential to the schools. Dan Kelleher, president of the East Business Men's Club, said 25 of Portland's 50 schools are on the East Side. County Judge Cleotson said the new building is only the first of branch libraries to be put up in the city. He said this branch will contain 12,000 books. Rev. T. L. Elliot, representing the Library Association, spoke briefly. He was followed by Miss Mary Isom, librarian, who told of the first story-hour held yesterday afternoon, when the room was filled with interested children. "We desire the library to be an educational center," she said. Miss Isom, Miss Lao E. Bailey, C. C. Hall, L. M. Lopper, Dan Kelleher, George Dilworth and members of the association received the guests, explaining the departments. The branch will be open at 9 A. M. today, and will be open each day till 9:30 P. M.

against the West Umatilla extension and endorsing the John Day project were presented by the Commercial Club of Stanfield, citizens of Pilot Rock, Echo and other neighboring cities and by the Umatilla County Water Users' Association, asking the Pendlton club to repudiate its former endorsement of the west extension.

The resolutions set forth the same objections previously published in brief were to the effect that the proposed extension would prevent irrigation on the Umatilla reservation, retard development and destroy land for a reservoir site more valuable than those which would be reclaimed.

Pilot Rock, Stanfield and other communities were represented by substantial delegations of citizens and many ranchers from the neighboring vicinity were present.

Attempts by Dr. C. J. Smith and Will Moore to postpone consideration until two weeks hence met with violent opposition from Fred Stelzer, representing Birch and McKay Creek, and other delegates of the section which would be benefited by the west extension.

The objection of the protesting water-users was that two weeks would give the lobbyists time to achieve their object in Washington.

After a heated debate the secretary finally was instructed to telegraph President Taft and the Secretary of the Interior, asking that they withhold final action on the West Umatilla extension until the Pendlton Commercial Club could be investigated.

Next Tuesday the subject will be considered at a general meeting to which the entire country will be invited.

GERMANS EYE BRITONS

DEEDS, NOT ASSURANCES, WILL COUNT, SAYS CHANCELLOR.

Von Bethmann-Hollweg Received With Cheers When He Makes Speech Before Reichstag.

BERLIN, Dec. 5.—The Moroccan question came up today at the final session of the Reichstag. Imperial Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg gave a calm and dispassionate exposition of the German case.

He made it clear that Anglo-German relations in the future would depend on deeds rather than on assurances. The Chancellor was generally applauded by members of the Social-Democratic party.

GERMAN IS ARRESTED AS SPY

Teutonic Sea Captain Said to Have Tried Into British Secrets.

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., Dec. 5.—Heinrich Grosse, a captain in the German merchant marine, was arrested on the charge of being a spy and arraigned today at the police court here. The magistrate remanded him for a week without bail.

Captain Grosse has been in Portsmouth several weeks, according to the statement of the attorney for the prosecution. He was interested mainly in the amount of the reserves of coal held in the naval docks here and also in the number of men stationed at the naval barracks in readiness to complete the complements of reserve ships of the navy.
