PLAN IS INDORSED

Secretary Urges \$814,000 for Tillamook Bay.

PORT TO BEAR ONE-HALF

Channel of 16 Feet at Bay City is Contemplated—Large Sawmill, to Cost Million Dollars, to Follow.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Dec. 21.—The Secretary of War today transmitted to Congress with his approval the report of the Army engineers, recommending the construction of the north jetty at entrance Tillamook Bay and the dredging of a channel 200 feet wide and 16 feet deep from the entrance to Bay City at an estimated cost \$814,000, on condition that local interests bind themselves to defray half the cost.

As the Port of Tillamook and the Port of Bay City have pledged themselves to raise half this amount, the engineers recommend that Congress this session appropriate \$400,000 cash to start the work and adopt a continuing contract for the remaining \$200,000 of the Government's share, it being understood that local funds will be made available as needed, so that work, once begun, can be carried forward rapidly to completion.

Original Plans Modified.
The original report of engineers recommended two jetties, at the entrance to Tillamook Bay, a 16-foot channel to Bay City and a 14-foot channel to Tillamook City, at an estimated cost of \$1,204,450, but this plan was rejected by the Rivers and Harbors Board as being too expensive. The plan was then modified to cut out the improvement above Bay City, reducing the cost to \$1,744,000 on condition that local interests bear 25 per cent of the cost, but this also was rejected and only recently one jetty plan on the half-and-half basis was submitted and approved. It is said in the report that if one jetty proves inadequate, the question of building a second jetty will produce the desired 25-foot depth across Tillamook Bay and if this proves to be the case no further project will be necessary.

Early Consideration Likely.
This modified report will be considered by the rivers and harbors committee and included in its new bill this winter.

As soon as the appropriation for the deepening of the channel from Tillamook Bay is made by the Government a large sawmill will probably be erected at Bay City, in cost probably \$1,000,000. Russell Hancock, of the Whitney Company, was in the East yesterday, but in a former interview he has said that his company would spend \$1,000,000 as soon as the Government appropriation was available.

There are now two small mills and a saw and door factory at Bay City. A channel of 16 feet at low water from the bay to the open sea will mean that the 25,000,000 feet of saw timber tributary to Tillamook and Bay City can be profitably shipped by water to Pacific Coast points, and, as soon as

the Panama Canal is opened, to Eastern points.

Stumpage Values Enormous.
Scott Bosworth, who is interested in Bay City property, said yesterday that the stumpage value of the lumber tributary to Tillamook Bay was about \$350,000,000, and that the lumber when saved, should be worth about \$1,500,000,000.

Bay City, being 160 miles nearer San Francisco and other southern points than Portland, has an advantage of from 10 to 12 hours in the shipping time by water to these points. Some of the land in that section has as high as 20,000,000 feet of timber to the section upon it.

PRIMARY LAW CONFUSING

Conflict in Reapportionment Threatens Wisconsin Delegation.

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 21.—Consternation reigns in political circles here over the discovery of a technicality in the reapportionment act which threatens the reelection of Wisconsin delegates to National party conventions.

The Wisconsin primary is to be held on Tuesday, April 3, 1912, and the latest day on which names may be submitted to the County Clerk to make up the ballots is March 19. It is, therefore, necessary to certify the names according to the old Congressional districts, as outlined prior to the passage of the new reapportionment act.

On April 1, one day prior to the election for delegates, the new reapportionment act goes into effect. The delegates to the National convention chosen under the old law might be held as irregular, as the new law went into effect before the vote actually was cast.

BACHELORS IN CATALOGUE

Kansas Men Adopt Systematic Methods for Securing Wives.

ULYSSES, Kan., Dec. 21.—Scarcity of marriageable young women in Grant County, Kansas, has caused the bachelors of the county, which is 25 miles from a railroad, to band together with the purpose of obtaining wives. The catalogue of the organization, which is known as the Grant County Bachelors' Club, published today, gives the names and qualifications of each of the 25 members. In a foreword the catalogue says:

"The purpose of the club is to present a list of good, honest men for the women of single blessedness to look over and pick from, assuring them that only prizes will be drawn."

The catalogue, which contains photographs of each of the members and a list of the property he owns, is to be sent all over the United States.

EXPLOIT YEAR LOOMS

PLANS OF NORTHWEST DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE LARGE.

Members Are Pledged to Strenuous Activity in Securing Settlers for States in Organization.

ST. PAUL, Dec. 21.—Officers of the Northwest Development League have perfected a propaganda of exploitation for the coming year, which in its comprehensiveness is unique.

All the talk of booming "back to the farm," to which the people in this part of the country have been treated since the Governor's special started East, was crystallized and whipped into practical shape by prominent business men from St. Paul and the Northwest who make up the league.

Resolutions were adopted in support of the immigration bill, now being prepared by the Northwest League of Nebraska and which will be presented to the Senate soon after the holidays. The league was a definite domestic immigration policy for the whole country.

There will be a series of state development meetings held during the Spring throughout the Northwest. The league will make an effort to get each state to raise a fund of \$5000 to be called the Publicity and Immigration Fund. The various members of the league have pledged themselves individually to a strenuous activity in getting settlers on the lands and helping them to succeed. They intend to purchase exhibit cars of their own for various "booming" tours next year.

The officers of the league will leave St. Paul May 24 in a body for Seattle, Wash., where the Northwest Development Congress will be held June 5. After the Congress they will go to the Rose Festival in Portland for a week and then start out on a tour of the entire Northwest.
