Health Board Formally Accepts Crematory. The new city crematory was formally accepted yesterday by the Health Board and a recommendation made to the City Council that the balance due the Public Works Engineering Company be paid, along with interest on the balance due from January 3 to yesterday.

Balance Due of \$39,960 Recommended to Be Paid Engineering Firm and Company Is Penalized for Working Too Slow. The controversy led to a compromise. WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—President Taft, who began his Christmas shopping in New York yesterday, made a trip through the downtown section late today and selected several gifts.

The President's objective point was a book store, where he made several purchases. His advent into the shopping district was made in the quiet way in which Mr. Taft moves about the streets of the capital and hundreds among whom he went missed seeing him.

While in the book store, a young Army Lieutenant, intent on his examination of some editions de luxe, pushed against the President, oblivious of the fact that he was jostling his Commander-in-Chief. Mr. Taft was equally absorbed with Major Butt in selecting some volumes and failed to observe the officer's presence.

The President confined his purchases to standard works. He returned to the White House shortly after 8 o'clock.
