Presidential Possibility Confers With Wu Ting Fang on Reaching Shanghai.

REBELS PLAN GOVERNMENT.

Campaign Now Constructive Repub-Beans Say They Have Control and Will Take Time Subduing Pekin-Yuan Shi Kai Silent.

SHANGHAL Dec. 25 .- Dr. Sun Yat Sen, one of the leading promoters of the revolution, who may be named president of the proposed republic, boarded a launch soon after his arrival lare this morning and was escorted

down the river by two warships.

After landing he went by automobile to the residence of Wu Ting Fang, the foreign secretary in the revolutionary provisional cabinet, to discuss

So far as known, no reply has yet been received from Yuan Shi Kai, the imperial premier, with regard to the establishment of a republic, as insist-ed upon by the revolutionists.

Sun Commands Respect.

Dr Sun is quartered in a large med-ern residence in the French concession. He said today he preferred to make no statement until he had reviewed the entire situation. His conference with Wu Ting Fang and other leaders shows that he is evidently commanding the greatest respect and attention.

Dr. Sun said the entire movement was united and there will be no serious difficulties. It is evident that the revolutionaries are preparing for the constructive work of government and are not counting on Yuan Shi Kai. They are even disregarding Pekin, which they confidently assert they can take at leisure.

Nanking Permanent Capital.

It has been definitely decided that Nanking shall be the future capital. Even after the abdication of the Em-peror and the recognition of the new government the leaders assert posi-tively that Pekin will not be consid-

In the minds of the revolutionists the movement has been entirely success-ful. One of the highest officials said

Fourteen provinces have absolutely declared for a republic. We control 12 divisions of the army; two more are coming. We hold the entire navy. Two provinces remain imperial and two are neutral. There is no government in Pakin. Yuan Shi Kai, the Premier, is its only representative, except the in-

The sooner the powers recognize the real situation instead of clinging to harmful and intangible sentiment the sooser will order be secured in China. Hesitation to recognize the Republican cause will certainly prolong the stag-mation of trade and will be responsible for much bloodshed, should fighting begin again."

GENERAL'S SON DISAPPOINTED

Young Reyes Asserts Father Was Unfairly Dealt With by Madero.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 25.—Rodolpho Reyes, son of General Bernardo Reyes, seemed much broken tonight when he was informed of his father's surrender in formed of his tather's surrencer in Nuevo Leon, the soone of former triumphs. The son is at a hotel here on his way to San Antonio. He said he had no word from his father and that unless he received a message from the General he would not neces-sarily depart for Texas until tomor-row night.

He is an attorney and instructor in international law in the university in Mexico City. Young Reyes says he left Mexico November 17, and crossed into Texas one month before his father en-tered their native land. He came here

from New York.

"The Federal authorities in Texas are violating the neutrality laws between Texas and Mexico as has never occurred within the history of the two. countries, and I may be arrested when I get back to San Antonio," Rodolpho Reyes was quoted today as saying. "I expect to go to Washington to talk over the matters with the authorities

there.
"The people of the United States do not fully understand the conditions in Mexico. Two years ago when Diaz resigned the Presidency of Mexico, he declared he wished to retire to private life. The people of Mexico selected my father as Diaz' Governor of Nuevo Leon and a candidate to succeed Diaz as President of the Republic.

Then Dias changed his mind and said he wished to be re-elected. During the last days of the struggle Dias remembered that my father was the most popular man in Mexico and appealed to him for support.
