IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT TO BE FORMED A large street improvement district has been formed in North Mount Tabor known as the East Sixty-seventh-street district. The district takes in East Sixty-seventh street between the Barr read and Tillamook street, East Six-ty-ninth between the Barr road and Tillamook street, East Sixty-ninth be-tween the Barr road and the right of way of the O.-W. R. & N., and also between Tillamook street and the O.-W. R. & N. East Seventieth from the O.-W. R. & N. right of way to Tilla-mook street. Seventy-first and Seven-ty-second between the Barr road and Tillamook street. The other streets are Broadway and Hancock streets. The improvements are to be made in the Jonesmore Addition, and are to consist of grading the streets. The cost is estimated at \$7715. 

Plummer, chairman of a re-cent meeting to plan a meat-inspection ordinance, consisting of Dr. Calvin S. White, State Health Officer; Dr. C. H. Wheeler, City Health Officer; Dr. C. H. Wheeler, City Health Officer, and Dr. R. J. Chipman, will present to the Board a draft of the proposed ordi-nance. This ordinance will provide only for inspection of meat, to which lungs, heart and liver must be attached. It will provide for the appointment of a veterinary and an assistant veterin-ary to act as inspectors and will give them the power to locate places where meat will be inspected before being sold.




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
