HOUSE TIMBER BILL OPPOSED IN WEST

Measure Providing for Sale of Burned Growth Held Unfair to Settlers. QUICK BENEFITS WANTED. Western Senators and Representatives Will Undertake to Redraft Proposed Law When Congress Reassembles.

Interest in this legislation has concluded that the House bill is not satisfactory. In that it does not afford a full measure of relief to the settlers who lost heavily in the fires. They favor amending the bill so that each bona fide settler whose land was burned over, may sell all the killed or seriously injured timber on his entry and retain the receipts. They are opposed to having the money turned into a special fund in the Treasury, for this will mean delay in payments and many settlers, rather than go through the necessary red tape, will waive their claims. Hardship is Foreseen. Moreover, there is objection to holding back any of the money, for it is contended that the measure is intended to afford relief to deserving settlers, and the withholding of any part of this money when the settlers are in need will work a hardship that they think is not justified. At most, the sale of burned timber from a quarter section of land will not amount to a great deal, particularly on land that has been taken up under the homestead law. Senator Dixon, of Montana, is preparing to take up this fight as soon as Congress meets. Being a member of the public lands committee, he is in a position to help along the cause. Senator Smoot, of Utah, chairman of the public lands committee, is very much in favor of changing the House bill, for he believes the bona fide homesteader should get at once the full benefit of the sale of timber on his lands. He says, however, that the bill should be carefully drawn so that speculators or squatters who have no intention of acquiring title will not be able to realize on the sale of timber and then abandon their land. Senator Borah, of Idaho, has always been a strong advocate of selling this burned timber, and was the first Senator to propose such a bill. One bill which he introduced passed the Senate and failed in the House. That bill gave the settler full receipts from the sale of burned timber on his entry. Borah Opposes House Bill. Senator Borah will not accept the provisions of the House bill and will stand with other Western Senators in favor of a measure similar to that which once passed the Senate. He contends that if the settler is to be granted relief it should be granted now, when his farm has been swept by fire, his buildings burned and his property destroyed; he will not need it nearly so much two, three or four years hence, after he has made a fresh start, and once more gotten on his feet. Just what the House will do with a bill amended as these Western Senators propose is a matter of conjecture. There was considerable opposition to the Fray bill while it was before the House, and doubtless this opposition will be renewed to the Senate substitute.

ROOSEVELT TALK IS HEARD

Fear of Split Leads Many of Wisconsin Senator's Supporters to Advise Against Attempt to Fight for Recognition.

declared in favor of all nominations by direct primaries, except township and village officials; the initiative and referendum, the short ballot and a Presidential preference law; simplification of legal procedure; the submission of all matters of public policy to the voters. The difference of opinion arose when an added resolution to promise support to no candidate was recommended by the committee on resolutions. The committee of 19 members had entered into their deliberations, most of them declared, partially in favor of expressing themselves for La Follette. Their opinions had been changed after they had heard addresses by Pinchot and Fackler, and after the resolution, which was prepared by Houser and Pinchot, was described by the ex-National Forester as the best way of advancing Senator La Follette's interests. Senator Works Talks. The resolution was reported to the conference just after Senator Works had made an address urging the delegates to follow the example of California and to centralise their campaigning for one man. "Colonel Roosevelt should declare himself," he said, "both as to his principles and as to his stand on the principles that are accepted as progressive. If this movement attempts to center itself around its principles and not around a candidate, it will lessen its chances of success. "If Roosevelt should declare himself I would not hesitate to support him, and neither would Senator La Follette. La Follette has made the principles for which he stands an issue. Call-terme has induced him and felt that an attempt to evade it would have been cowardly." The committee report came at the end of Senator Works' speech and was followed by Pinchot, who defended the resolution. "It would be foolish to deny," he said, "that there is in Ohio as well as in other states a great number of men maybe a majority, who favor heartily the progressive principles, but who favor the nomination of Colonel Roosevelt as first choice and La Follette as second. Here let me say that there is no one who is working harder for the election of Senator La Follette than I am. "I believe, most intensely, that it would be foolish not to crystallize the Roosevelt progressive sentiment and the progressive sentiment of all other men, whatever candidates they may prefer, so that we can get delegates to the Chicago convention who will vote for the progressive candidate, which, we know, will be La Follette. Risk Held Too Great. "If we declare for a single candidate we run the risk of going to Chicago to find progressive delegates from different communities merely bound to support a half dozen candidates." Senator Clapp, in urging that the Wisconsin Senator be endorsed, argued in favor of concentrating as much as possible. "The sinister forces that are trying to dominate the Republican and Democratic parties will lose no sleep if the progressive movement satisfies itself with a declaration of principles," he said. Walter F. Brown, chairman of the Republican State Central committee, who a week ago was read out of the "progressives" by Fackler for his proposed Presidential preference plan, held a long morning conference with Pinchot, Houser and Fackler, and worked with them on the resolution which finally was adopted. The delegates, many of whom had come from counties which had no organization and were named by Fackler, appeared divided as to the action on the resolution. Ohio Men Disagree. M. S. Crandall and O. C. Lightner, of Cincinnati, disagreed on what Senator La Follette's wishes would be. Both professed to have talked with him recently and to have received their information at first hand. "Senator La Follette told me it would not be wise to endorse him as a candidate at present," said Mr. Crandall, "for fear of alienating the men who stand for his principles, but will work at first for another candidate." "I was the last man to talk with Senator La Follette in Cincinnati," said Mr. Lightner, "and he assured me he hoped the Ohio progressives would show their faith in him by giving him the endorsement."
