JOHNSON SAYS HE HAS TWO MATCHES

Champion Will Meet McVey in Paris and Flynn in New York or Nevada.

OTHER RUMORS PUNCTURED

Heavyweight Belt-Holder Complains That Every Obscure Pugilist Is Talking of Bout With Him for Publicity's Sake.

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—"I'll fight Sam McVey in Paris on the night of the Grand Prix, I think June 23, and I'll fight Flynn in some place that either is New York or Nevada."

There has been so much stuff published, it is hard to tell where I am at, continued Johnson, "and I want to straighten it up. Every manager of a fighter who by the widest stretch of the imagination might be called a heavyweight has been seeking publicity for a few days and the remaining articles would be signed in legal form tomorrow and that the Flynn contract would be signed soon after."

FIGHT DETAILS ARE ARRANGED

Other Bouts May Interfere With Johnson-Flynn Bill.

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—It appeared today that there might be delay in signing the formal articles of agreement for a fight between Jack Johnson, the world's heavyweight champion, and Jim Flynn, who aspires to that title.

Findings Due Friday.
