J. FORBES ROBERTSON SPEAKS AT HIRSCH HOME.

In Address Eminent English Player Declares He Is in Favor of Votes for Women.

The cause of woman's suffrage re orived encouragement resterday afternoon when J. Forbes-Robertson, the eminent English actor, gave an address at the home of Mrs. Solomon Hirsch. An audience of representative men and women of Portland listened to Mr. Robertson's eloquent appeal.

He ended his talk by saying that if by his efforts he had succeeded in converting one man or woman to the cause, he would be satisfied.
