AFTERMATH OF SPORTSMEN'S MEETING IS INTERESTING.

Dissipation of Idea That English Pheasant Loses Life by "Balling" of Tail Feathers Is Heard.

The annual session of the state's

ever the bird's tail feathers get so badly weighted down as to prevent flight, the feathers very accommodat-'One gentleman told me he saw a pheasant with tall frozen solid to a tree trunk." added Mr. Simpson. Two Detectives and "Trustles" Are Injured With Opium Needle.

He was placed in a cell.
