A small report from San Francisco, dated last Saturday, said:

"It has not yet been positively ascertained just what the extent of the damage to the California citrus crop from the re-cent frosts has been. The effects have been more or less spotted and have been such more gevera in some sections than in others. If a rapid thraw had followed the frest of Christmas night it is estimated that at least half of the crop would have

that at least hair of the crop would have been ruined, but for several days the mercury continued low.

"There is a wide difference of opinion even by the best-informed experis as to the amount of damage done. Some good authorities estimate that the injury to the crop will amount to about 20 per cent and this, basing the expected output on the 80,000 carload estimates, would mean that about 10,000 carigads less, or 40,000 car-leads in all, would be the amount of the season's crop.
